BIO- INTERVIEW ON STERLING TUCKER DONE BY PA WRITER MARY BUTLER:  
WASHINGTON, JAN. 25-- STERLING TUCKER, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF  
THE WASHINGTON URBAN LEAGUE, BELIEVES THERE IS MUCH IN THE AMERICAN  
EXPERIENCE THAT COULD BENEFIT THE PEOPLES OF SOUTH AFRICA,  
ESPECIALLY THE ROLE THAT ORGANIZED LABOR HAS PLAYED IN PROVIDING  
EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR BLACK AMERICANS.

MR. TUCKER WILL HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY IN THE NEXT TWO WEEKS TO  
TALK ABOUT THE LABOR MOVEMENT IN THE UNITED STATES WHEN HE ADDRESSES  
A MULTIRACIAL MEETING IN CAPE TOWN SPONSORED BY THE ABE BAILEY  
INSTITUTE OF INTERRACIAL STUDIES. MR. TUCKER ALSO HOPES TO AND THE TRADE UNION  
MEET WITH LEADERSHIP GROUPS OF "ALL SHADES" WHO ARE INVOLVED IN COUNCIL OF SOUTH  
THE MAKING AND SHAPING OF THE SOUTH AFRICAN SOCIETY. HE LEAVES AFRICA (TUUSA)  
THURSDAY FOR CAPE TOWN.

"WHEN I WAS FIRST ASKED TO ATTEND THE MEETING IN SOUTH  
AFRICA, I WAS NOT AWARE OF THE SIGNIFICANCE OF IT," SAID THE  
49-714-1-1-1 BLACK SOCIOLOGIST. "NOW THAT I'VE READ ABOUT THE PROBLEMS

THERE, I AM AWARE THAT ONE OF THE MAJOR PROBLEMS IS ORGANIZED  
LABOR, THE WHOLE QUESTION OF TRADE UNIONISM. I BELIEVE IF THEY  
HEAR THE AMERICAN STORY, THEY CAN DETERMINE WHAT OUT OF IT  
WOULD BE APPLICABLE TO THEIR SITUATION.

"I HAVE PREPARED A PAPER. I HOPE THAT BEYOND THE PAPER I WILL  
HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY FOR DIALOGUE SO I CAN LEARN AS I SHARE."

MR. TUCKER SAID HE INTENDS TO POINT OUT THAT EFFORTS WERE  
MADE IN THE EARLY DAYS OF THE INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION IN THE  
UNITED STATES TO DIVIDE BLACK AND WHITE WORKERS AND TO DIVIDE  
WORKERS FOR DIFFERENT REASONS.

"AS LONG AS THAT WAS HAPPENING," HE SAID, "IT WAS DIFFICULT  
TO DEVELOP A STRONG LABOR MOVEMENT. I WANT TO TALK ABOUT WHAT  
WAS DONE TO END THE FIGHTING BETWEEN THE WORKERS. WE HAD TO  
SAY TO BOTH CLASSES OF WORKERS TO GET THEMSELVES ORGANIZED IN  
SUCH A WAY THAT THEY COULD DEVELOP JUST DEMANDS, PRESENT THEM WELL,  
AND OFFER SOMETHING IN RETURN FOR THOSE DEMANDS IN A UNIFIED  
FASHION. THAT IS THE SECRET OF THE SUCCESS OF THE LABOR MOVEMENT  
IN THE UNITED STATES AND IT CAN EQUALLY APPLY TO OTHER COUNTRIES."

MR. TUCKER IS IMMINENTLY QUALIFIED TO DISCUSS ECONOMIC AND  
SOCIAL PROBLEMS FACING THE RACES. FOR YEARS HE HAS BEEN INVOLVED  
IN THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT AND IN ENDEAVORS TO IMPROVE THE  
ECONOMIC POSITION OF BLACK AMERICAN CITIZENS. HE HAS BEEN  
WHERE THE ACTION IS AND HAS KNOWN THE ANGER THAT BLACK  
SEPARATISTS FEEL. BUT HE ARGUES FORCEFULLY THAT THE SEPARATIST FLING  
IS PURE FOLLY.

"WE WILL NOT ADVANCE BY DOING THE SAME THING TO THE WHITE MAN THAT HE DID TO US," HE ADMITS. "EXCLUDING HIM IS DEPRIVING OURSELVES, BECAUSE HE STILL HOLDS THE TRUMP CARDS. NOR IS THAT THE KIND OF SOCIETY WE WANT TO BUILD. WE DO NOT SEEK TO TURN THE TABLES. WHAT WE WANT IS RATHER TO PUT ALL THE LEGS ON THE TABLE SQUARELY ON THE FLOOR SO THAT WE CAN PROCEED TO BUILD A SOLID SOCIETY ON THE ONLY FIRM FOUNDATION AVAILABLE TO US -- THAT OF ULTIMATE EQUALITY AND INTEGRATION."

MR. TUCKER DOES NOT BELIEVE, HOWEVER, IN RACIAL INTEGRATION FOR INTEGRATION SAKE. HE BELIEVES THAT INTEGRATION IS A MEANS TO AN END.

"THE END IS WHAT I CALL AN OPEN SOCIETY WHERE PEOPLE CAN MAKE CHOICES BASED UPON THINGS WHICH CONCERN THEM OTHER THAN A MATTER OF RACE. A SOCIETY WHERE RACE WILL MAKE NO DIFFERENCE," HE COMMENTED.

MUCH OF MR. TUCKER'S PHILOSOPHY ABOUT RACE RELATIONS IS REVEALED IN HIS BOOKS, INCLUDING HIS MOST RECENT ONE "FOR BLACKS ONLY: BLACK STRATEGIES FOR CHANGE IN AMERICA," IN WHICH HE CALLS ON BLACK AMERICA TO UNITE ONCE AGAIN BEHIND THE DRIVE FOR AN INTEGRATED SOCIETY.

STERLING TUCKER, BORN IN AKRON, OHIO IN 1923, BEGAN WORK WITH THE NATIONAL URBAN LEAGUE AS A STUDENT AT THE UNIVERSITY OF AKRON, WHERE HE RECEIVED A MASTER'S DEGREE IN SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY. HE WENT TO WASHINGTON TO HEAD THE LEAGUE'S CHAPTER IN 1956. UNDER HIS LEADERSHIP THE LEAGUE HAS ESTABLISHED NEIGHBORHOOD DEVELOPMENT CENTERS, SETTLEMENT HOUSES, RECREATION CENTERS AND HAS SPONSORED A CULTURAL EXCHANGE PROGRAM BETWEEN WHITE AND BLACK YOUTH, ENABLING THEM TO SEE HOW EACH OTHER LIVE.

MR. TUCKER HAS CONTACTS WITH BOTH BLACK AND WHITE POLITICAL AND COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS. IN 1964, FOR EXAMPLE, HE WAS THE FIRST BLACK TO RECEIVE THE WASHINGTON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE'S "OUTSTANDING YOUNG MAN OF THE YEAR" AWARD FOR HIS WORK ON JOB TRAINING AND MERIT HOUSING. HE ALSO WAS VICE CHAIRMAN AND AN ORGANIZER OF THE BIG 1963 MARCH IN WASHINGTON.

IN ADDITION MR. TUCKER HAS SERVED ON THE SPECIAL DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA AFFAIRS COMMITTEES OF PRESIDENTS KENNEDY AND JOHNSON, AS WELL AS ON THE WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH. IN 1969, PRESIDENT NIXON APPOINTED HIM VICE-CHAIRMAN OF THE D.C. CITY COUNCIL. HE RECENTLY WAS REAPPOINTED FOR ANOTHER FOUR-YEAR TERM.

THE NOTED SOCIOLOGIST ALSO IS INTERESTED IN INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS. AND THE LIBERIAN GOVERNMENT HAS CITED HIM FOR HIS CONTRIBUTION TO "THE IMPROVEMENT OF RACE RELATIONS IN THE UNITED STATES AS WELL AS INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS BETWEEN RACES."

"I'VE ALWAYS BEEN INTERESTED IN INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS," HE COMMENTED. "I BELIEVE THAT THE PROBLEM OF PEACE IN THE WORLD BEGINS

AT HOME, ON MY STREET, NOT SO MUCH IN A FAR OFF PLACE. I BELIEVE THAT AS I WORK IN PROBLEMS AT HOME THAT I AM REALLY WORKING IN PROBLEMS OF PEACE AND BROTHERHOOD IN THE WORLD." ITEM

His Excellency The President,

The Black Peoples' Convention hereby registers in the strongest of terms its protest against recent deportation to racist South Africa of Mr Beck.

After thorough perusal of the South African Press and ultimately finding no refutation of these reports we are convinced that the position as reported is correct.

The B.P.C. is fully aware of other somewhat similar instances met only by the Government of Botswana but by those of Lesotho and Swaziland. To us such an action against a banned person is not only calons but causes great concern.

In the case of Mr Beck we see clearly the naked collaboration with a racist power. We further view with deep regret your failure to find an alternative country to deport Mr Beck to especially because of your awareness of the probable consequences to him and his family.

We are further in no doubt that this action was taken with the blessing of your government and their acceptance of responsibility for the repercussion thereof.

Handing Mr Beck to the South African officials at the border can be equated to throwing a man into a hungry lions den. Unless there are mitigating factors the handling of Black refugees by your government in this manner is deplorable.

Perhaps we should add that Botswana's Independence is meaningless if South African Blacks are not free. If our struggle is to succeed then we should rely on your not to frustrate it, that is if our impressions of your attitude to the racist and oppressive white minority regime are correct.

It is our further intention to communicate this information to the organisation of African Unity as soon as clarification on the issue of Mr Beck is obtained from you i.e. if forthcoming.

Dear Mr. Fox,

Your letter dated the 2nd of July in reply to ours sent to you on the 9th of May refers. We understand the delay and therefore accept the reasons advanced.

I shall try herein to answer to some of the questions you have asked in your letter. We could not arrange any Bail locally for Nkotsou Motsau, and our hopes have -for various reasons- been forced to rest with sources from beyond our borders. Attempts to raise funds locally have met with little or no response at all, and hopes were further dashed by raids to our offices as from the 13th of May. The raids were aimed at nothing but to retard our efforts of raising funds for Mtsau. Please find enclosed information the raids and other related matters.

With regards to his Appeal, no word has been heard from the Chief Justice in the Appellate Division in Bloemfontein. It is understood that the judge who presided over his trial is away on leave and therefore, the Appeal is being sent from pillar to post. But, we hope to hear from them very soon. All I can say is that there has been a delay in the hearing of his Appeal.

We could also be grateful if you could clarify us the whole issue of having Mkoysou being 'adopted' by an Amnesty group. I have just received a letter from his father and it would be opportune -with information from you- to outline the proposition about 'adoption' fully to him. I also intend seeing in the immediate future. Nevertheless, I shall try to give you a brief outline about Nkotsou's personal and family life. I first met him last year in Jun/Jul after he had been rusticated from a high school where he was attending  
because he was .../ 2

because he was considered a "bad element". He then offered his services to be a convener of our (B.P.C.) branch in Sharpeville. He was at the same time the Organising Secretary of the Sharpeville Youth Club. Shortly before his detention together with some of his colleagues, they came to our offices and reported of police harassment and intimidation to the Secretary-General then. On the 5th of October he was detained for six months until his trial at the Supreme Court that culminated in his being sentenced to five years imprisonment on the 26th of April. Prior to his trial he had been making formal appearances at the local magistrate's court only to be remanded.

After his conviction and subsequent sentence, his elder brother became the next victim from the family in the line of harassment. He was dismissed from work without any tangible reason being advanced. Every attempt he has made to find employment elsewhere met with no success. He was utterly frustrated at every place, or rather prospective, of employment by being reminded about his 'outside activities'. This has been obviously the manifestations of the police intimidation that abounds. His elderly father has been left with the burdensome task of being the sole breadwinner. May I appeal to you, once more, to speedily attend to this matter and treat it as very much urgent.

With regards to Bail money, any sizeable amount less than R5-000-00 could certainly go a long way. We also hope you are accordingly dispatching disbursements for legal costs and would also appreciate it if you could send tentative information about such. We are hoping to hear from you very soon by return post and to keep you informed on the latest developments.

On behalf of the National Executive Committee I seize this earliest opportunity of maintaining contact with your Organisation which contact shall be restricted to the exchange of research material. I wish to refer you to the binding resolution hereunder;

RESOLUTION 15/72;

"That this Congress noting the existence of multi-racial organisations which are directly/indirectly involved in the Black Community and further noting that the work performed by these organisations in terms of research material may be useful to the projects that the Convention is envisaging to embark upon in the future; Therefore resolves;

1. To maintain contact with such Organisations at our terms where it will be beneficial to the realisation of the aims objectives of the Convention;
2. that such co-operation shall be limited to the exchange of research material;
3. and that such contact shall be renewed annually at the Convention's Congress."

It is with the sole aim of renewing this contact that I write this letter to you and also taking into cognisance the effective way of implementing the Convention's resolutions as taken at its Congresses. This can only be achieved by working with the current National Executive Committee of that respective year.

I, therefore, wish to appeal to you that you take note of the current National Executive Committee of the Convention as elected at the last Congress in Dec., 1973.

REPORT BY SECRETARY - GENERAL ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE BLACK

PEOPLES CONVENTION - FEBRUARY, 1973.

### A. HEAD OFFICE:

The main difficulty with which the Head Office is faced is lack of permanent accommodation. Attempts to settle this issue have been made by applying for four (4) offices with the Christian Institute. This, however, has been hampered by the interference of the system with the SASO office which is accommodated in the buildings belonging to the Christian Institute. On this issue Head Office should await the action that will be taken by the Christian Institute which could entail the submission of an application with the Department of Community Development or any relevant state department.

The problems arising out of lack of permanent accommodation amounts to lack of a permanent postal address and has delayed progress to a notable address. Our letter head, for instance, cannot include the postal address as well as the telephonic one.

Finance is also a major problem and it affects the general administration of the Convention. There are hopes, however, that the situation may change in the near future.

### B. PROPERTY OF THE CONVENTION:

It is my feeling that receipt books and membership cards of the Convention were not properly cared after by the Interim Executive Committee. According to records the following receipt books and membership cards were issued:

The following list of receipt books were received from Drake Keka:-

Letters were written to all the recipients of the above-stated articles on the 17th January, 1973 to confirm whether they were possession of such articles. Julius Malinda is the only person who has confirmed being in possession of receipt book no. 130I-1400 & cards 626-650.

Saths Cooper the P.R.O. of the Convention confirmed that he has a number of receipt books with him. I have however, not been able to get these receipt books.

Since the aim of the Convention is to arrive at a target of 1 million members in 3 years I recommend that more membership cards be printed by Head Office - I recommend thousand as a start.

There is also a need for the National Executive to protect the books all material from being confiscated by the system either from branches or Head Office.

I recommend that all B.P.C. documents and material viz. Receipt books, and membership cards be submitted to Head Office on or before the end of the financial year for stock-taking by the Secretary-General.

#### FUND -RAISING:

A campaign for overseas fund-raising was launched, as from the beginning of January, 1973, by correspondence. So far there has been no response, but one has hopes of some turnover shortly.

Local fund-raising has been engineered by the National Organisation and this too has not as yet yielded any positive results. Fund-raising has been mainly done with doctors per Resolution No. 12/72.

The Secretary-General has attempted to raise a loan with the following: SASO, B.E.P., IDMASA, ASSECA, AICA, DRS. NKOMO, NYEMBEZI, MOTLANA, & GUMEDE, BISHOP LEKGANYANE, C.S.F. ETC.

The B.E.P. has helped to start Head Office going with a small token R50.00 of this has been repaid to C.S.F. Idamasa has expressed regret that it cannot help financially. No positive answers have been received from other organisations.



**B D. OFFICE STAFF:**

Lack of typists permanently employed by the convention has had serious repercussions. The material that has been produced by Head Office has been of an inferior status. This aspect of faulty management can perhaps be ascribed to the Secretary-General who bears the sole responsibility in this Department. There are however limitations associated with this, viz. the Convention presently due to lack of financial resources cannot cope with the expected standards. Furthermore, it is not an easy job to find personnel who are committed to the Black struggle. Attempts are however made to improve the situation.

**E. BRANCHES:**

The campaign on the consolidation of Branches that are already existing as well as the formation of new branches in major as well as remote areas shall be embarked upon by the National Organiser at the beginning of March. This delay in this field has been partly caused by lack of private transport and funds for this project. The National Executive has decided to embark on the drive towards mere membership during the first half of 1973. Signs of increasing membership are however evident. Many committed Brothers and Sisters are working hard in this regard.

**F. LITERACY, SEMINARS AND LEADERSHIP TRAINING PROGRAMMES:**

1. The National Organiser shall be responsible for these projects and Branches should work hard on this as soon as they have had contact from the National Organiser. Literacy and campaigns depend mostly on volunteers who should come from members already trained in this field. It is therefore desirable that volunteers should contact the office of the National Organiser and present themselves with suggestions concerning this matter.

2. Seminars on topical issues shall be embarked upon by the National Executive Committee in conjunction with Branches. Paper work on seminars shall be prepared and participants should be notified in advance for preparations for such seminars at regional and National level.

3. Leadership training programmes shall also be organised by the National Organiser and the procedure to be followed will be geared towards the recommendations of the Planning Commission (HAMMANSKRAAL CONGRESS DEC. 1972).

**G. PUBLICATIONS AND NEWSLETTERS:**

It is recommended that articles be invited from Branch members for our first Newsletter and these should be submitted to the Secretary-General. The Secretary-General will then forward these articles to the Editor at the time which will then be convenient for him.

It is recommended that these articles should be submitted before mid-March.

**H. GENERAL:** I recommend that in order that the work of the Head Office be more up to date recommendations and/or suggestions should be made in writing to the Secretary-General.
