The Native families who have been removed from the slums of Sophiatown, Johannesburg, are happy in their new separate brick houses and have no intention of ever going back to Sophiatown.

They never had such decent housing in their lives. Many of them have moved from and shelters in the primitive bush, to slums in Sophiatown, to nice houses at Meadowlands.

Strangers in the sluas have made friends since settling down as respectable neighbours at Meadowlands.

The families were not forcibly removed from the slums. The police were there to protect the Natives from outside agitators but there were no incidents.

Overseas press representatives who expected a so-called blood-bath expressed surprise that everything had gone off smoothly and with enthusiastic acceptance of the Bantus who had been resettled.

Natives are keen to move to Meadowlands for two reasons: The new township offers trading facilities for Native traders only and lodgers and tenants in the slum areas are anxious to get proper brick houses for about 12 to 12.10s. per month which in many cases is less than they were paying at present for hovels and shacks.

A 1951 survey showed that in those slum areas 32 per cent of the inhabitants were tenants, 16 per cent sub-tenants and only 2 per cent of the families actual owners. The tenants were mercilessly exploited by the landlords. Very often they have to pay so-called goodwill just to get the right to lease. This sum varies between \$10 and \$15 and then sometimes it is repeated after six months. The person is not even sure that he will not be given notice, that he will have to move again unless he again pays \$5 or \$10 to acquire his right to lease. The tenants are at the mercy of the landlords practically from month to month.

Fairly high prices were paid by the Government to Native and Coloured owners of plots in the slum areas. A few examples:

The density of the slum dwellers is more than 300 per morgen (one morgen is 2.1 acres) while the greatest density at Meadowlands, where provision is made for wide, open spaces, will be 50 per morgen, at least six times less.
