





There is a crisis on the railways which can only lead to pay cuts and sackings.

NO SOLUTION

caused by its own crazy policy, but ugly signs of the way the Labour Department may try to deal with unemployment came to light last week.

Garment workers queuing for the unemployment pay-out at the offices of the Labour Department were called to one side by officials and told to look for jobs in the sweet and laundry industries. Those willing to work in these industries were asked to hand in their names.

Industrial Council and trade union officials in the laundry and sweet industries said that telling garment workers to look for jobs in laundries was "sending them on a wild goose chase," as there were very few vacancies.

European garment workers who queued outside Johannesburg's biggest laundry were told there was not one job going. The only jobs some garment workers were placed in last week were temporary relief jobs in dry cleaning depots, that will last only as long as the permanent staff members are on leave.

RACE REPLACEMENT

Most sinister, though, are the designs the Labour Department seems to have on the sweet indusstry. Here, it is reported, Labour Department officials have been approaching sweet factories about replacing Non-White labour with White.

This is called "making room for unemployed Europeans".

Finding jobs in any numbers for garment workers in the sweet in dustry can only mean sacking Non-Whites in the sweet factories. An official of the Industrial Council for the Sweet industry told New Age there were some vacancies in some factories and some unemployed garment workers had been placed.

"Will you take jobs in other industries?", they were asked.

GOVT. BAFFLED

The Minister is clearly at his The government cannot solve the wits end about what to do with crisis in the clothing industry unemployed garment workers. Deputations from both the Garment Workers' Union and the Germiston workers, worst hit of all and under Nat leadership, have seen him but got nothing out of him.

The Garment Workers' Union saw the Minister of Labour in Cape Town on February 23 and later submitted a long memorandum to him.

The union laid a plan before the Minister for:

Scrapping job reservation;

No further registration of new labour last week-end. clothing factories in uncontrolled areas;

Extension of Industrial Council agreements to factories everywhere in the country;

Strict control of dumping of ready-made clothing from overseas;

• Government contracts should be handed to Transvaal factories. There are as yet no signs that the Minister will act on any of these points.

2,000 DURBAN DOCKERS

DURBAN.

FOLLOWING their refusal to work overtime, which resulted in the port of Durban being crammed with ships which could not get their cargoes loaded and unloaded in the usual time, the entire labour force was sacked and replaced with

The workers were demanding an increase in wages and the reinstatement of workers dismissed as a result of the ending of the togt labour system.

It will be recalled that a strike by the dock workers early last month, even though it was broken by brutal police action, resulted in a victory for their demand for a weekly wage contract. It was then pointed out (see New Age, March 5) that the wages offered to the workers were far too low and that further struggles for better wages were inevitable.

One of the workers interviewed by New Age said that the "employers want to kill us with overtime. In the past we used to take off a day or two whenever we felt tired but now that we are employed on a weekly basis we could not do this.

"We' feel that more workers should be employed by the stevedoring companies and at the same time we should be paid a decent wage for the hard work we do," he

"SOL" KLAASTE-A GREAT **JAZZ PIANIST**

SALISBURY ("Sol") Klaaste, the pianist and co-arranger in the jazz opera "King Kong," is one of South Africa's most accomplished pianists. He swings hard and all the timea rare accomplishment. His melodic line is decisive-the listener never feels that he is groping for the next note; it always flows easily from the previous pattern. His comping (backing of the soloists) is good too, and he possesses an excellent harmonic sense.

Sol was born in Kimberley about 30 years ago. His father insisted that his children study music, and from the beginning Sol was keen, though his brothers did not like it very much.

In 1940 the family moved to Johannesburg, and soon Sol was involved in variety-he worked with the "Merry Blackbirds," among others. Then Sol enrolled for the de-

gree of B.Mus. at Wits University, and struggled through his course in the face of great

difficulties, playing in his spare time to raise the money for his fees. During this period he was studio pianist for Trutone, and as a result made many records.

The wickedness of the University Apartheid Bill is fully brought home when one realises that it will deprive men like Sol, willing to undergo no end of hardship in order to study, of the right to enrol at Wits in future.

Sol has no special idol amongst jazz pianists, but he did mention that he has drawn much inspiration from Stanley Glasser, "King Kong's" musical director, for whom he has tremendous admiration.

It is not surprising that Sol, with his high regard for formal classical theory and technique, produces immaculate musicyet his art has lost none of the virility which is characteristic of jazz. South Africa can rightly acclaim him as one of her great sons.
