
# WORKER CULTURE IN DURBAN IN THE 1980s A PHOTOGRAPHIC ESSAY

#### INTRODUCTION


In South Africa, the mid-1980s through to 1990 was a period of high drama, violence, and much secret political intridue and negotiating. This culminated in State President FW de Klerk's State of the Nation address to parliament and the unbanning of political organisations and the release of political prisoners, including, most famously of all, Nelson Mandela. These pivotal events are but the backdrop to a quite remarkable public culture which developed in Durban, and to a lesser extent in Pietermaritzburg, during the period. In a city which had long pioneered racially segregated residential and public spaces, there now developed mass-based and predominantly black expressions of an assertive new public culture. Certain venues become synonymous with this new culture. There was the municipal-owned Curries Fountain stadium and various trade unions and community halls in central Durban. Then there was the Rainbow Restaurant - during the weekdays a shabby black commuter fast food tavern adjacent to a PUTCO depot in Pinetown. Here, transformed on Sunday afternoons, were jam packed raucous multiracial shebeen-style musical celebrations of township cultures - from township and big band jazz to isicathamiya - and, always, dance. Yet, with hindsight, there was another singular feature to this seizethe-moment public culture which developed in the midst of violent political cultures, including necklacing and night-long vigils before the execution of political prisoners. And from posterity's sake, this point is vital. These cultural events were being photographed by a quite remarkable group of young locally trained photographers.

The examples of this work in this photographic essay were given to me in the early 1990s by a small worker advocacy and education non-governmental-organization - the Culture and Working Life Project - then in the process of closing down. It is not known if other collections of this and other similar work exist.






