In addition it is estimated that 2000 new families (natural increase) require houses each year.

3. Question:

Do the families qualify in terms of the Regulations Coverning the Control and Supervision of an Urban Bantu Residential Area (R.1036 of the 14th June, 1968).

Answer:

- (a) The 784 families in Pimville and the 379 families in Eastern Bantu Township will be re-settled in terms of policy directives.
- (b) 3667 Male heads of families on the waiting list qualify in terms of Section 10(1)(a) or (b) of the Act and therefore qualify in terms of the Regulations.
- (c) 8194 Male heads of families are lawfully employed in Johannesburg but may not be housed in terms of the

784

Regulations until they have been employed for 10 years or have lived lawfully in Johannesburg for 15 years or the written approval of the Chief Bantu Affairs Commissioner has been obtained. It must be noted that the families of these Bantu are also lawfully in Johannesburg.

(d) 1759 Female heads of families are lawfully in Johannesburg but may not be housed in terms of the Regulations except with the approval of the Chief Bantu Affairs Commissioner.

4. Question:

What is the number of unproductive families who in terms of policy directives will lose their right of accommodation in Soweto if re-settled in the Bantu Homelands and the number of houses that will be available when they have been re-settled.
