ANNUAL REPORT OF MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

For the Year Ending 31st DECEMBER, 1929

The Hospital has now been open for 18 months, and during that time the work has increased rapidly, as can be seen from the statistics. There have been numerous distinguished visitors during the year, all of whom have expressed keen appreciation of the equipment and the work done. Her Royal Highness, Princess Alice, Patroness of the Hospital, visited it on 10th April, 1929, and showed great interest in all the details of the running of the institution.

There have been various changes in the Staff since the first Annual Report was issued. Miss M. E. Johnson, Matron, left at the beginning of August, 1929, to the extreme regret of the Staff. She had given very valuable service to the Hospital in helping to buy the Hospital equipment, in putting the Hospital into good running order and in the training of the nurses. Our good wishes go with her.

Three probationers sat for the Examination for Midwives held by the South African Medical Council, and of these one was successful in passing.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD

The truest and most interesting kind of report of the Hospital for the year would be a write-up, by someone who had been in intimate contact with its work, of the human-interest stories with which the work abounds.

The Hon. Secretary has not had the privilege of such close relations with the work, but from a few such stories that have come within his knowledge he is led to wish that instead of sitting down to cull the items of his report from the Minutes of Board Meetings, the reports of the faithful Hon. Treasurers and the Medical Superintendent's statistics, he might have before him a golden book of the stories of happy mothers who, after a fortnight in the clean, roomy haven (one had almost said Heaven) of the Hospital, have gone away taking with them the first living child after, in some cases, as many as eight or ten tragic experiences of disappointment. I had the privilege of conveying to one father, who had very despondently made the venture of sending his wife in after a series of such disappointments, the news that the Hospital had given him good returns on his small investment of faith and his wife would be bringing home twin boys.

If anyone has the imagination to picture to himself the misery and agony that would have been represented by the 81 abnormal cases had they taken place in the patients' slum-yard homes under the ministration of the average available midwife, the statistics contained in the Superintendent's report will mean not mere professional figures, but a beautiful human ministry. These abnormal births represent approximately 37 per cent. of the total.

But the mere statistics of the year show a quiet but steady growth in the Hospital's service. For the six months' period, July-Dec., 1928, the total admissions were two hundred (200). For the full year 1929, the first full year of the Hospital's service, they were six hundred and sixty-five (665). This figure includes 251 infants.

The highest number of admissions for any one month was fifty-one (51), in October, and that month also holds the record for the largest number of live births, viz., twenty-four (24). On several occasions the Hospital was full to the capacity of its equipment; therefore, during the year, six new beds have been equipped and four new baby beds. The average daily number of patients during the fourth quarter, 21.3, as compared with 12.1 for the first quarter, is another indication of progress. The growth of the out-patient department is most graphically indicated by the fees taken, which for November were £34 9s. 6d. as compared with £10 4s. 6d. for January, or £7 6s. 6d. for May, which was the smallest for any month in the year.

We find in the thermometer of finance an equally satisfactory reading. At the last General Meeting, a year ago, £1,100 was still owed on building and equipment, and £1,500 of Endowment Fund had been borrowed for current expenses. At the May meeting the Hospital was running behind about £60 per month, and the close of the half-year showed an excess of expenditure over revenue for the entire period of working of £198 0s. 5d.

It should be noted, however, that the actual cash position is not so favourable, as £516 3s. of fees earned has not been paid.

The financial report at the end of the year shows an excess of revenue over expenditure of £406 9s. 11d. for the entire period. To cover the deficit on building and equipment referred to above, the Board, in February, 1929, negotiated a loan of £1,500 from the Griqualand West Board of Investment, and while no repayment has been made, a sum of £800 is to be invested as an offset to this indebtedness. The improvement in the financial position is due:—

- 1. To the increase in Annual Subscriptions, which now stand at £673 10s. 6d. The chief credit for this splendid achievement is due to Mrs. Bridgman. The Hon. Secretary has been glad to accompany her whenever possible on her rounds of solicitation and to render such help as he was able. Mrs. Noble is another member of the Board who, both with Mrs. Bridgman and also on her own, has been an effective money raiser. They would like to take this opportunity to express their appreciation for the kindly way they have been received in the city's shops and offices, and for the splendid response to their solicitations.
- 2. To the improvement in the amounts collected in patients' fees. The percentage of collections, as compared with fees charged, is 61 per cent. for 1929, against $56\frac{1}{2}$ per

cent. for the previous half-year. The total fees earned (charged) for the year are £1,329, of which £812 16s. has been paid. The amount of £500 was set down as the expectation from patients' fees when our budget of £3,000 was drawn up. Although this was a conservative estimate, it is gratifying that it is already exceeded, and praise is due to the Staff, and especially to Miss Rogers, our faithful clerk of records.

3. To substantial further contributions received from America in response to Mrs. Bridgman's solicitations by letter.

The financial position is all the more satisfactory when it is remembered that the salary scale has been increased very substantially for the entire medical staff.

Let it not be supposed, however, that the Hospital no longer needs financial assistance. We have attained a position where we are somewhat freed from immediate anxiety. Income about balances expenditure, but it must be borne in mind (a) that no sinking fund exists to provide for renovations and repairs which must become necessary shortly; (b) that special gifts from America cannot be counted upon hereafter to the same extent; (c) that some shrinkage of annual subscriptions has to be allowed for when personal solicitation slackens; (d) that we are still in debt.

We urge, therefore, that all those friends whose names are on our lists continue their support and that others, without waiting to be solicited, send in subscriptions and share with us in this worth-while service to the community.

There have been a few minor improvements made in the buildings during the year, viz., the alteration of the laboratory into a second labour room, the provision of a separate bath and lavatory for out-patients and for cases on admission, and the erection of a brick room for the garden boy.

Attractive brass plates have been placed on all endowed beds and on the doors of wards provided by special gifts and as memorials.

Dr. Ethel Smith, who as Medical Superintendent has piloted the Hospital through the first two years of its existence, has resigned to be married. The Board extends to her its most cordial good wishes for her happiness and its most sincere appreciation and gratitude for the splendid service she has rendered. What the Hospital is to-day in its professional efficiency and in the spirit of Christian service that prevails within its walls is due, in large measure, to her.

The Hospital is fortunate in securing as her successor Dr. Janet Robertson, whose service in the Anglican Mission Clinics on the Reef, and especially at Benoni, have made her widely known amongst the native people.

The Board also wishes to place on record its most hearty thanks to Dr. Gordon Grant and Dr. James Black, who have continued to give freely of their high abilities as our Consultant Staff, and to Dr. Crawford, our Anaesthetist.

We close the year with thankfulness to God, who has enabled us to make progress thus far in a task inspired by the spirit of Christ, in commemoration of one whose life was full of kindly ministries to the native people whom he loved, and one of whose dearest hopes has been realised in this service to native women and children.
