CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT:

CHRISTIAN AGRICA follows a consistent policy in regard to the racial problems in South Africa.

Immediately the news was received of the arrest of 140 South Africans (European and Non-European) on charges of treason Christian Action, with the support of the Hovement for Colonial Freedom and other interested bodies, established a Fund for the following purposes:-

- n) To provide for legal defence for the accused.
- b) To give practical assistance to the dependants of those arrested, the majority of whom are Africans.
- c) To ensure, as far as possible, a fair trial for the arrested persons.

In pursuit of the third purpose, Christian Action invited (r. Gerald Cardiner, Q.C., to visit South Africa as an observer of the preliminary hearings in Johannesburg, and provided the money necessary for this purpose.

se are in the closest touch with those responsible for the Fund now being raised in South Africa under the inspiration of the Bishop of Johannesburg. Pistribution of money subscribed to the Christian Action fund will be effected in co-operation with the Committee of the South African Fund.

The total required is not yet known: but it is likely to be not less than 200,000. Christian Action is alming to rusie, as its first target, 210,000.

The total ruised for the Christian Action fund has already passed a £1,000.

SOUTH APRICAN YELASON TRIALS

THREE SOCIETIES OF LAWYERS SEND OBSERVED

MR OBBALD CARDINER Q.C. IN JOHANN LEGRO

It was announced in London this evening that/three politimaxi -cal societies of lawyers in England had united to send Mr Gerald Gardiner . To Johnson the preliminary hearing of the treason trials which open on Sednesday, 19th Ecompter.

Mr Gerald Cardiner, who is an Executive member of the General Council of the Bar of England, is authorised to say that he is also observing on behalf of that body.

Er Cardiner left London on Saturday morning for discussions in Amsterdam with the International Commission of Jurists. He flew on from Amsterdam on Sunday morning accompanied by Dr A.J.M. van Dal, Secretary Coneral of the International Commission and reached Johannesburg this (Monday) afternoon.

There is no possibility of Mr Gardiner or any other Commonwealth lawyer appearing for the defence, since by the rules in South Africa a barrister must pass an examination in Afrika no before being allowed to appear in Court. Mr Cardiner will however attend the preliminary hearing as a legal observer and will on his return report back to the organisations concerned on the charges against the accused and on the evidence adduced to support them.

It was made clear that Mr Gardiner was attending solely in a legal capacity and does not intend to make any statement in South Africa while the trial is 'sub judice'.

The action taken by the three eccieties of lawyere is indicative of the interest and concern fult throughout the world. Altogether 149 men and women have been arrested and held in custody during the last 10 days on unspecified charges of treasons. Among those arrested are two advocates briefed for the Defence of those taken into custody during the first raids. These barristers are Mr Sokwe, the only African barrister allowed to practice in the Transvaal, and Mr Blove, who appeared in the applications for call before Mr Justice Erector.

Mr. Gerald Gardiner Q.C., who has returned from Johannesburg where he has been watching the opening of the preliminary proceedings of the South African treason trials, said to-day:-

"I have not expressed any opinion whatever in South Africa. I have merely been watching the proceedings on behalf of Christian Action, of which I am a member, the Bar Council, the Inns of Court Conservative and Unionist Society, the Lociety of Labour Lawyers, and the Association of Liberal Lawyers. I have seen and talked to leading members of the Johannesburg Bar, the Bishop of Johannesburg and others representing different points of view.

While I can express no personal opinion on the subject the view of those best qualified to judge is that the Nationalist party now in power in South Africa has made some judicial appointments otherwise than on merit, I did not meet a lawyer who was not gravely disturbed at what he regarded as the consequent lowering in the standard of the Bench. Moreover the definitions of "communism" and "communist" in the Suppression of Communism Acts are so vide that the Acts could be used to oppress any citizen who opposes the policy of apartheid - that is to say who opposes the party in power. In addition, if a man is put on certain lists - a process which results in the loss of fundamental civil rights - he is presumed by law to have been rightly so listed unless he proves the negative. Then in addition trial by jury is abolished in a case such as the present, and the Government is entitled to have it tried by a special Court, it will be realised how far what we ordinarily call civil liberties are in question.

The accused include a number of prominent Christians both European and non-European, and the Bishop of Johannesburg has organised a fund (the Trustees of which are the Bishop, Mr. Alan Faton, author of "Cry, The Beloved Country", the Hon. Frank Lucas, a former Judge, and Mrs. Ellen Hellman of the Institute of Race Relations) supported by the Archbishop of Cape Town, the Bishop of Durban and others in order, to use their own words, "That all the accused should be able to secure the best legal representation available and that during the course of what probably will be lengthy proceedings, their families and dependants may be protected from hardship and suffering".

While most of those who have so far subscribed to the fund in bouth Africa have felt obliged to do so in pound notes, because no one knows which of the opponents of the party in power will be the next to be attacked, it is hoped that no one in this country will feel similarly obliged.

Christian action, which is in close touch with the bishop of Johannesburg, has opened a fund here to provide legal defence, to help the families and to assist to secure a fair trial, and contributions may be sent to them at 2 Amen Court, E.C.4."
