An act of faith

RANDJESLAAGTE (JOHANNESBURG) JUBILEE MEMORIAL

THE CHAIRMAN REPORTS

There is an old, but true, Scottish saying "that the best laid schemes of mice and men gang aft agley". A second saying, not quite so dependable in its outcome, is "that everything comes to him who waits". Both these sayings can be applied to the heroic and at times herculean — task undertaken by the Randjeslaagte (Johannesburg) Jubilee Memorial of providing a Clinic for the benefit of ageing people living within the north-eastern districts of Johannesburg.

The John Fotheringham Clinic was planned in 1967. It was designed and erected to the approval of the Transvaal Department of Hospital Services and by resolution of the Administrator-in-Executive Committee No. 649 on the 18th March, 1968 was approved as an out-patients Clinic under the control of the Edenvale General Hospital.

A building contract was drawn up and hopes were high for a speedy inauguration of this sorely needed district amenity. Once functioning, the Clinic would not only save travelling to the distant Edenvale Hospital but would also alleviate the hardship and delay of queueing at the busy Out-Patients Department of an overworked General Hospital. Construction was completed in June 1969. Builders vacated the

site. Everybody looked forward to the official opening on the 1st July, 1969. This day came and went and so did the 1st August, 1969 and the 1st September 1969 and, eventually, 1970 arrived with a fine purpose-built building still unoccupied and no services being rendered. Doubt crept into everybody's minds as to whether this Service would ever be instituted, but on the day that the preparation of this letter commenced (June 8th, 1970) a communication was received from the Transvaal Department of Works stating that the hire of the Clinic had been referred to the Department for finalisation and asking "kindly give this matter your urgent attention". What matter the frustration of the past months? At long last this badlyneeded amenity is to be brought into operation for the benefit of our ageing folk. (At the time of going to press, August 31st, 1970, no word has been received as to when the Clinic will be open.)

The cost of this Clinic, which has been paid by Randjeslaagte, is of the order of R30 000. This money has had to be taken from our investments and involves a reduction of interest income to the Estate of about R2 400 a year. The Province will pay an annual rental for the hire of the building but it would appear that this will nowhere near cover our loss of income which might be as much as R1 750. More about the Clinic later.

FRAIL AGED HOME

As indicated in last year's Report of our Executive Committee, it was decided to proceed with the erection of a Home for the Frail Aged and the plans proposed by our Architects have been finally approved by the City Council of Johannesburg. There will be accommodation for twenty feebleaged and forty ambulant frail-aged. Building work has started and it is hoped that the building will be completed, and the first residents admitted, before the middle of 1972. Here again investments will have to be realised to the extent of approximately R400 000. These investments are high interest-bearing and the loss of interest income to the Estate will therefore be of the order of R32 000 per annum.

It will be seen, therefore, that the two developments, the Clinic and the Frail Aged Home, will result in a reduction in interest income, so far as Randjeslaagte is concerned, of between R33 000 and R35 000.

Our accounts for 1969 show that rentals charged to our residents, all of whom are pensioners, cover less than 40 per cent of the total cost of administering and running the Estate. This involves, among other things, the provision of supervisory nursing services to the 150 residents in their flats and rooms as well as full nursing services and provision of meals to 30 residents no longer able to care for themselves and who are accommodated in the Rest Home.

The annual expenditure in running Randjeslaagte amounted to R76 000 in 1969. Against this, income amounting to R63 000, excluding donations and bequests, was received, leaving a shortfall of R13 000. If the loss of interest on withdrawn investments relating to the Clinic and the Frail Aged Home is taken into account, the annual deficit in future years, again excluding donations and bequests, can be expected to be of the order of R45 000.

The question immediately arises as to whether Randjeslaagte is justified in incurring this considerable additional expenditure involving, too, a heavy reduction in its interest income. Can Randjeslaagte really afford to face up to what is involved in providing these essential amenities for the ageing of our city? This aspect of the development of the Estate was given very serious consideration by the Committee. In its opinion the Clinic is an absolute necessity and we really had no option but to take the action we did, not only in the interests of our own residents but also to benefit ageing people living in neighbouring Homes catering for the ageing and for many other people in the district who need the services of an Out-Patients Department attached to a General

Hospital and who find access to the Edenvale Hospital particularly difficult.

A NECESSITY:

In the opinion of your Committe, provision for a Home for the frail aged is also a vital necessity. Not only is the Rest Home at Randjeslaagte at times quite inadequate, in size, to serve Randjeslaagte itself, but accommodation is required for residents of Rotary Park as they reach the stage when they need institutional care. One of the tragedies of Johannesburg, and indeed of most great cities, is that there is proportionately little accommodation for the frail and feeble aged when they can no longer care for themselves. Your Committee, with some knowledge of the tremendous need in the city for a Home of this nature, felt that there was no justification in building up reserves for the benefit of future generations when the need is a very present one. There was no hesitation in the minds of your Committee that they were entitled, even obliged, to proceed with these two developments despite the financial position.

How then is the shortfall to be met? Present donations are of the order of R8 000 per year. This figure must be at least trebled. Your Committee believes that there are many hundreds of citizens of goodwill in Johannesburg who will contribute to Randjeslaagte if they are appraised of what the Estate is doing. A subscribers' list of 500 is unrealistically small.

An appeal has been addressed to all Attorneys, to Boards of Executors, to the Estate Departments of the Banks and to others, expressing the hope that as they are consulted by clients regarding the preparation of their Wills, they will be so kind as to draw the needs of Randjeslaagte and its Frail Aged Home to their attention. Randjeslaagte is well aware that almost every person of goodwill has innumerable and persistent demands made on his pocket by the many worth-while charities for the ageing, the young, the handicapped and others carrying on such good work in

Johannesburg. With the best will in the world there must be a limit to the generosity of the firm and of the individual. However, few will be found who will not be prepared to provide a bequest for the ageing in their Wills if their attention is drawn to a particular need and if this suggestion is made to them. Admittedly, this falls under the category of long-term optimistic financing, but the need for the work and further development of Randjeslaagte and the Frail Aged Home will go into the years that lie ahead. We, on our part, must ensure that we can carry on until our present programme of trying to build up our finances again by way of increased donations, where possible, and through bequests from kindly disposed people and Trusts bears fruit.

DEDICATED NURSING STAFF:

We all grow old. Some of us have the means to provide for our own old age. Experience shows that money cannot buy the care and attention needed by the ageing and the frail. When three generations are housed under one roof, where frailty makes demands beyond the capacity of even the most loving and considerate family, Homes such as Randjeslaagte and its new Frail Aged Home are essential. Randjeslaagte is staffed with dedicated and trained nurses. It is run by a committe made up of men and women of good will obeying the old injunction; "Honour thy father and thy mother". Unfortunately, money is needed to create and run them and it is not enough for any of us to sit back and say, "The Government should do it". The Government does not, as many people with ageing parents, relatives and friends have found to their sorrow. Randjeslaagte gladly acknowledges, however, the per capita subsidies given by the Department of Social Welfare and Pensions toward the cost of maintaining ageing persons in certain definite categories of health.

Your Committee has gone forward in the belief that as it endeavours to provide service for those of the older generation, so will the present generation and generous public of Johannesburg respond to the challenge and ensure that lack of funds will not be a contributing cause to the possible reduction of the dedicated service which Randjeslaagte and other similar Homes are giving to this section of our population.

TO OUR FRIENDS

The Annual Report of the Committee of Randjeslaagte has never pretended to be a formal document but rather an endeavour to give, in a readable and acceptable way, an impression of Randjeslaagte and its work to those who have not at any time visited this beautiful Estate. Facts and figures are given in the Reports, but the essential need is that something of the spirit, the happiness and the security which underlie the Estate, which has passed its thirty-seventh anniversary, should convey themselves to our readers and friends. Only if they visualise the work being done, only as they realise the extent to which the Estate is dependent on their support, only if they know that the great needs of the ageing are security, loving care and the feeling of being wanted and only as they feel a personal interest in the Estate and that they are making a contribution to easing the latter days of so many fine old folk, can we expect them to continue and increase their much appreciated support. We hope that this letter may give them such an insight.

TO NEW FRIENDS

The Committee trusts that you will find these notes of interest. They hope that you will take an opportunity some time to visit Randjeslaagte and to see this lovely place for yourselves. It accommodates some 180 men and women, all of whom have resided in Johannesburg for over 20 years, with ages ranging between 61 and 96, all with limited incomes, some with families who

still care for their well-being and others with no families at all. This is indeed a gracious Home in a lovely setting ensuring that its residents pass into the twilight years of their lives surrounded by affection and care. It is well worth a visit. It is, if I may say so, worthy of generous support.

New friends will wonder where it got its name "Randjeslaagte". "Randjeslaagte" was the farm on which Johannesburg was built. It is in the shape of a triangle. The apex of the triangle is at the Fire Station in Louis Botha Avenue, Houghton. The base runs along Commissioner Street from End Street to Diagonal Street. "Randjeslaagte" was created to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of Johannesburg and as a memorial to the old pioneers; hence the period of qualification (twenty years residence in Johannesburg) before admission as residents. It was thought appropriate, therefore, that the name of Randjeslaagte should be attached to this Home — it serves as a constant reminder of the earlier days of Johannesburg and the courage and endeavours of the men and women to whom the present generation in Johannesburg is so much indebted.

THE NEED OF THE AGEING

Randjeslaagte is not unique in having an unduly long list of names of ageing folk who are desperately anxious to secure the care and security of a Home. On our list we have three hundred and eighteen names and it grows monthly. Under the statistical section of this letter it will be seen that the number of vacancies occurring is of the order of 15 a year. All applications are treated without exception in the order in which they appear on our Waiting List. It is a matter of simple arithmetic to calculate the length of waiting for all those on the list until their turn for consideration comes round. As it is, the Committee is only now dealing with applications lodged at the beginning of 1965. Six or seven years is a long time to wait for admission to a Home, especially when one is getting on in years and health is becoming a problem.

Strangely enough our experience has been that the great demand for accommodation comes from the widow and the single woman. Married couples are a little tardy in coming forward. In the great majority of cases single men find a warm acceptance in the homes of their folk as they are not to be found in the kitchen, doing household chores, bringing up the children and becoming, unwittingly, a barrier between the second and the third They are more tolerant, generations. apparently, of the mini and maxi skirts, the wireless, the telephone and the ways of the younger generation.

AMENITIES AVAILABLE TO RESIDENTS

The provision of a well-built and furnished building is just the beginning of the road insofar as the caring for the aged is concerned.

To a large extent the residents are great readers — a library is essential. For this the Estate is grateful to the Public Library of the City Council of Johannesburg for a most excellent service on the Estate.

At Randjeslaagte where residents live an active life doing their own shopping, cooking their own meals and so on, shops must be accessible. Here we appreciate the services of the Congregational food van which calls at the Estate regularly each week where residents can re-stock their larders. The butcher, the baker, the grocer and the general merchant are less than a quarter of a mile from the Estate and are easily reached by making use of the Estate bus. The travelling post office is a great boon.

To be well-clothed is morale boosting what woman or man does not love to be nicely dressed? On the Estate we have a clothing depot from which residents can, at no cost, draw clothes most of which are donated from time to time by thoughtful people disposing of the possessions of loved ones who have passed on.

Nothing gives an ageing person greater pleasure than to be remembered and to be

wanted. Birthday greetings from the Rand Women Pioneers and from the Sons of England Birthday Fund, Concert Parties and Outings given by members of the Johannesburg Municipal Bowling Greens Association, a Christmas Tree Party for all residents by the same Association, Cinema Shows by the Round Table and other Organisations and Church Services conducted in our Hall by Ministers of the Anglican, Baptist, Presbyterian and Methodist Churches all help to create a happy atmosphere and to ensure that the day is full and time does not drag and they serve, too, to remind residents that they are not forgotten.

Gardening is a joy to many people and much of the beauty of the Estate is to be seen in the gardens developed by residents in front of their little cottages and rooms. Water rationing has been a problem and the carrying of cans of water a heavy strain but the gardens have remained a joy throughout the year.

FRIENDS OF RANDJESLAAGTE

When so many contribute, and participate, it is perhaps invidious to mention only a few, but not to refer to the contribution made by the Johannesburg Municipal

Bowling Greens Association with its thirty Clubs which has month after month, year after year, maintained a close connection with the Estate would be ungracious. The monthly Concert Parties, the drives to places of interest in the colder months, the Christmas Tree Party with gifts for all, the personal visits to our residents by members of the Association, the gift of the "Bluebird of Happiness' bus, the holiday scheme whereby residents can go to the Coast for a short holiday and so on reflect in a way all can see, and all can appreciate, what this Association and its members mean to Randjeslaagte. Randjeslaagte is but one of the very many charities which receive the support of this Association and the generosity of its members is truly amazing. The "Bowlers" and "J.M.B.G.A." Blocks, paid for by the Association and each accommodating ten women in single rooms, give visible evidence of this interest and generosity.

Not to be outdone by its fellow Association, the men and women members of the Southern Transvaal Bowling Association and Southern Transvaal Women Bowling Association have for years taken keen interest in Randjeslaagte. As tangible evidence of this we find the "Southern Transvaal Bowlers' Block" accommodating ten single women erected and paid for by the Associations as our most recently completed Block. Here again the concern of the members of the Associations has not been confined to a monetary contribution paying off the cost of this Block. It shows itself equally strongly in the personal interest many members take in the affairs of the residents.

The third section of the Bowling community contributing generously to Randjeslaagte, comes from the Motor Industries Federation which numbers among its associated members, Bowlers. Here we have what is perhaps the world's largest one-day Charity Bowls Tournament when up to 500 men participate. This Randjeslaagte/M.I.F. Day is an accepted feature of the Bowling Calendar. Started by "Ginger" Hart, continued and greatly expanded by Mr. Ernst Eriksen, of beloved memory, to its present pre-eminent position and now under the most capable control of Mr. G. L. Bartholomew, whose organising genius, drive and pleasant personality ensures its continued success.

Naturally any reference to Bowlers must include the Lady Bowlers for behind every J.M.B.G.A. Club, particularly, and in fact behind every successful Bowling Club, every Bowling Tournament, every Bowling Charitable Function, are to be found the Ladies. It is indeed difficult to express adequately our appreciation to the Ladies for their contribution to and interest in Randjeslaagte. We cannot imagine what we would do without them.

The Estate has many other friends not least of whom are the members of the Rand Women Pioneers also associated with Randjeslaagte since our inception. Here, unbelievably, from a membership decreasing each year, as might well be expected, comes a regular cheque for R600. No one will cavil at our special mention of the Ladies of this Pioneer organisation and their wonderful work.

So that we continue to avoid any tendency for this Letter to become a mere recital of facts and contributions, however much the latter are appreciated, reference to the many other Organisations and persons to whom Randjeslaagte is indebted is referred to later.

OUR PAMPHLET

I would invite sympathetic consideration to the Appeal set out in the pamphlet distributed with this booklet. We have been told in advertising circles that an Appeal should be repeated three times to obtain any real measure of result. This is the third year of circulation of this little pamphlet. We trust the advertising concerns are correct in their assessment.

PERSONAL

The death of Mr. Stowe McLean, one of our honorary Vice-Presidents, deprived us of a very old friend whose interest in Randjeslaagte dates back to our earliest days. With Mr. Colin Anderson and Mr. G. H. Beatty, he was chiefly responsible for the donation of the Chamber of Mines Hall on our Estate and he and Mr. Anderson arranged for its later extension to accommodate our increasing number of residents. Mr. McLean and Mrs. McLean never ceased to be interested in Randjeslaagte and never ceased to be most generous supporters of ours. We do miss him.

The atmosphere of an Estate such as ours is dependent to an extent not generally appreciated on the staff. In Matron Ledlie and Sister Kennedy both the Committee and the residents are blessed. Nursing the aged is no sinecure. It means nursing folk who are "over the hill", who in their declining years can, imperceptibly and often unintentionally, become demanding and difficult and the strain can be very severe. Our nursing staff, including Mrs. Phelps who assists Matron in the Duty Room, Nurse Perry and our African maids, is a dedicated one. We have much to be grateful for.

Similar dedication is to be found in our Secretary, Mr. Douglas Graham, whose outlook on life has always been one of service to others. To him, and to Mrs. Lea, his assistant in the Office, we record our sincere appreciation.

Mrs. Scott, wife of our Superintendent, went overseas for a short, but certainly well-earned holiday. She was missed in her absence and welcomed on her return. Our Superintendent, Mr. Scott, continues to serve the Estate with the same degree of diligence, courtesy and energy which he has always displayed. To him and to Mrs. Scott our grateful thanks.

The pleasure and responsibility of being Chairman of an Organisation such as Randjeslaagte depends entirely on the co-operation received from the members of the Committee. Surely no Chairman has ever been better served than I have. Our two Vice-Chairmen, Mr. Jimmy Walter and Mr. Bob Ferguson, are indefatigable,

hard-working and deeply interested. Mr. Cyril Farrant is our honorary Treasurer and to him most of the success of our financial position is unquestionably due. Between them they have contributed sixty years of most sterling service to the Estate, service now tangibly recognised by naming three of our main roads in their honour. The "Jimmy Walter Drive", "The Bob Ferguson Drive", and the "Cyril Farrant Drive" and they serve as a lasting reminder of what these men have done for Randjeslaagte. To name these three senior members of the Committee in no way implies that the contribution and work of all the other members of the Committee is overlooked or not appreciated. Practically all members of the Executive Committee serve on a sub-Committee either the House Committee, the Finance Committee or the Building and Grounds Committee and the attendance at the meetings of these Committees must surely be a record for any Organisation. To each member of the Committee is allocated a specific number of residents for her to visit and to keep an eve on her welfare and needs. In this way the Executive Committee is kept in very close touch with all the residents and is able to handle all problems and crises as they arise. I also gladly acknowledge the sterling service contributed to the Estate over the last 28 years by Timothy Muila whose duties are wide-spread and who falls under the designation of "General Factotum".

Even though we say so ourselves, Ours is a good Committee. Ours is a working Committee and ours is an interested Committee. What more could a Chairman wish for? What better way to conclude this letter than on the basis of appreciation to all, be they Committee Member, Staff or Contributor, thankfulness for yet another year among contented ageing residents on a happy Estate and with the knowledge that our new plans for helping the Aged are coming to fruition?

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

The story of our finances for last year and the problems we face in the immediate future are hardly calculated to produce a smile on the face of the Treasurer concerned. However, I must confess to a feeling of satisfaction because of what we have achieved and what we still plan to accomplish and I am confident that the very wonderful friends we have and the new friends that we are going to make will not let us down. And even if we do have to struggle for a time this will be worth while and nothing in this world that is worth while is attained without some conscious effort.

We have continued to feel the effects of the inflationary conditions prevailing in this Country despite the constant endeavours of the Officers and Members of the Staff to contain this. Once again, however, we have been blessed with a number of friends in the business world who have succumbed to the persuasive overtures of certain Members of the Executive Committee. But for the valuable assistance we thus receive our level of expenditure would be considerably higher and, unlike our friends in commerce and industry, we cannot pass it on to the "customer".

Heavy expenditure was incurred during the year on the maintenance and renovation, where necessary, of our buildings and equipment, including the conversion of some gas stoves to electric. This was largely responsible for increasing the item "Estate Maintenance Expenses" from R18 189 to R34 509, although this does include several other heads of expenditure. The total of the running expenses for the year, including the amount just referred to, was R76 472, as compared with the figure of R65 763 for the previous year.

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Unfortunately, our revenue has seen a decline from R66 109 to R63 064. This is mainly due to a reduction in income from investments which has been brought about partly by the full impact of the contribution of R100 000 towards the cost of buildings at Rotary Park which was made during the

1968 year. Despite the adverse effect on our finances it has afforded us much pleasure to observe the completion of this scheme. A further explanation for the reduction in our investments income is the amount which has been set aside for the building of the Frail Aged Home and which has been invested for the benefit of that Fund. There was accordingly a deficit for the year of R13 408 as compared with a surplus for the previous year of R346.

In accordance with our usual custom, but subject to the remarks below, all donations and bequests have been taken direct to the Accumulated Funds Account. Donations amounted to R8 484 (R6 449) and Bequests R7 179 (R6 015). In addition donations amounting to R7 500 (R4 859) were received for capital expenditure previously incurred. Furthermore, donations and bequests to a total of R70 338 were applied to the Frail Aged Home Fund as well as a grant of R10 000 from the Johannesburg City Council given for this purpose.

The John Fotheringham Clinic building was virtually completed during the year at a cost of R25 949, although some further expenditure has been incurred since the year-end, but the balance remaining in the Fund is adequate for this purpose.

The Frail Aged Home Fund has been increased from R53 264 to R251 420 which has been fully invested for the benefit of the Fund pending the commencement of building operations which have just started. The ultimate cost of this building is expected to be in the region of R375 000.

Including the above, the Memorial is presently committed to capital expenditure which will exceed R400 000 and it is worth while to reflect for a moment on the effect which this will have on the finances of the Memorial in the immediate future. However, I am confidently relying on our many friends to continue their support in the sure knowledge that we are satisfying an urgent need. Mainly due to the necessity to build up the Fund for the Frail Aged Home, the Endowment Fund was reduced from R265 538 to R183 309. This amount was fully invested and the market value was in excess thereof at the year-end.

A milestone was reached during the year when the largest of the building loans, amounting to R95 000, was repaid to the Johannesburg Municipality from the Redemption Fund built up over many years for this purpose. As a consequence, the amount payable annually by way of interest and redemption as a charge against revenue will be reduced.

With a view to minimising costs wherever possible without detriment to our residents, the audited Balance Sheet and Accounts have not been printed as an annexure to the Annual Report of the Executive Committee, but copies are avialable on request.

In conclusion, I extend my thanks to our annual subscribers, donors, badge fund members, merchant friends and all other benefactors who have assisted us in the work we are doing and express the hope that they will continue to support us.
