WELCOME FROM ANC TO DELEGATES TO SUMMIT ON GOVERNMENT CORRUPTION AND MURDER, JOHANNESBURGER HOTEL (KAROS), 18 JUNE 1992.

Dear Friends

We welcome you to this summit convened by the African National Congress to discuss a response to the rampant state corruption and murder which is sweeping our country.

We would all hope that the current impasse in the negotiations process will be broken. Regardless of what happens, however, we believe that urgent action is necessary to respond to this crisis of mismanagement into which the government has plunged South Africa.

The transition process is poised on a knife edge in our country. Open and accountable government will be vital during this period.

We have no hope of stemming the violence sweeping our country unless we can force the government to abandon its war against the people.

Further, if we are to utilise our country's resources effeciently and address some of the problems of drougth, joblessness and poverty facing millions of South Africans during this transition period, we will have to act decisively to put an end to the rampant corruption and mismanagement which charaterises this current regime.

I know that you view these issues as seriously as we do. What we now need is to develop a common approach to addressing these problems.

The accompanying document outlines the recent exposures of Government corruption and murder, and raises some suggestions as to how we could take the campaign forward on these issues.

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
