

THE STUDENT CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

President : Mr. D. A. Coghill.

More addresses than usual were given at the meetings of the Association, and addresses by new speakers to our Association were greatly appreciated.

An address by Mr. Grant was followed up by a most interesting experiment : a week-end course at the Bible School on the "Teaching of Religious Instruction." Thirty-six girls from the Training School attended the course ; and their interest in it prompts the hope that similar courses may be held in the future.

At a Conference of Ciskei branches at Fort Hare in September various topics were discussed under the headings, "The S.C.A. and the Individual" and "The S.C.A. and the Community," and the Conference concluded with a Service of Dedication. Addresses given by students and others were published in the Newsletter. Discussion was confined almost entirely to the delegates from Fort Hare and perhaps the others found it difficult to grasp the problems set before them. But there was a real quickening of interest.

A tendency to turn our own S.C.A. meetings into "debates," thus missing the primary purpose of the S.C.A., was regrettable.

A much larger number of new members than usual were admitted from the Junior classes. Student representation on the General Committee has been increased to include Assistant Secretaries and a member of the Missionary Companies' Section.

The Missionary Companies have shown keenness in their work and have been anxious to make their work more effective. The Kirk-Session generously provided a set of seventy-two large Bible Pictures for their use. These have been pasted on sheets of kraft papers, by the members, who are very grateful for this gift.

THE LITERARY SOCIETY.

President : Mr. Q. A. Whyte.

With a membership of ninety-five and a varied programme of debates, play-readings, charades, lectures, and contests, the Society had a very successful year. The committee wishes to thank those members of staff who helped with the plays and charades. The Society was also responsible for two enlarged numbers of the *Emblem* which were very well received. The only feature of the year to be regretted was the small number of members from the Training School.

LOVEDALE HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE.

Hon. Secretary : Mrs. J. W. Macquarrie.

Again this year, as in 1940, the chief work of the Committee has been the supplying of milk to necessitous children, the supervising and financing of the District Nurse and the investigating of home conditions of dependents of patients in the Macvicar Hospital. In addition two families have been supplied with weekly rations while the bread-winners were ill and unable to work, and the Committee has been responsible for medical attention being given to a few necessitous cases.

Feeding of Children. During the year £60 8s. 3d. was spent on milk and approximately 150 school children received one half pint of milk daily. Records of the weights of the children are kept by the Practising School.

District Nurse. The District Nurse visits weekly the villages of Ntselamanzi, Gqumahashe, Dyamala and Gaga where she conducts clinics. Her policy is to help where she is able with advice, dressings, etc., and if the cases are bad to advise them to see a doctor. She attends confinements and instructs mothers in the care and feeding of their babies. Her work is often carried out under great difficulties.

In September Nurse E. N. Kopo resigned and Nurse Winifred Rawana who has had experience in the Brakpan Location, was appointed as District Nurse. Unfortunately owing to

illness she was not able to commence duties immediately and for the last three months of the year the post remained unfilled. We are most grateful to the Union Health Department and the Ciskeian General Council for the help they have given us towards the support of the District Nurse. At present the Union Health Department, the Ciskeian General Council and the Health and Social Service Committee each pay one-third towards the Nurse's salary. Her services to the people are free.

T.B. Patients. £280 10s. was received during the year from the Cape Silver Jubilee Fund towards the support of dependents of T.B. patients in the Macvicar Hospital. This help has been greatly appreciated and has in some cases stood between the people and starvation. The Committee thanks the Jubilee Fund Council for its generous help. A small sub-committee of the Health and Social Service Committee investigates each case and submits particulars to the Silver Jubilee Fund Council in Cape Town. The members of this Sub-Committee have given up much time to this work and we thank them for it.

Revenue. Owing probably to the many calls on everyone donations received this year amounted to less than in 1940. The Committee was granted the takings of one Picture Show at which sweets were sold. This effort brought in £14 1s. 4d. Donations were further increased by two special church collections.

We are most grateful to all those who by their help and donations have made it possible for us to carry on the work.

CUTHBERT MEMORIAL LIBRARY.

Among the Library events of the year we record with gratitude the Governing Council's approval of a grant towards the better equipment of the Library. This is gradually being utilized for improving desk facilities, instituting more complete Dewey cataloguing, providing students with borrowers' cards, and adding to the general amenities. As the revised recording

system has only been working for a few months, the figures are not as complete as we should like them to be.

War conditions have reduced the range of books on the market, increased the prices at a time when information services are at a premium. Readers have been busier than usual. Nevertheless, the borrowing figures reflect a satisfactory reading interest despite the many distractions of a critical year.

Student Section.

During 1941, 4076 books were registered, and a further 80 were re-covered, making a total of 4156 as compared with the record total of 5362 last year. The High School accounted for 2361, the Training School for 764, the Industrial Depts. for 872, the Practising School for 24, and other (unclassified) for 135. There was a small decrease in each dept. compared with 1940.

The number of books added to this section during the year totalled 151, comprising 74 fiction, 69 non-fiction, and eight current pamphlets, excluding transfers from the General Section. A new bookstand for World Affairs has been installed. Our especial thanks are due to Dr. Wilkie for copies of the *Colonial Review*, *Journal of Education*, and pamphlets on Spiritual Issues of the war. New periodical covers are to replace the old.

General Section.

945 books were borrowed during the year, a decrease of thirty since 1940. Better use *has* been made of this section, but increasing calls of Staff time and energy are naturally reflected in the Library. Fifty-six fiction titles were added, thirty-nine non-fiction, and six current pamphlets, totalling 101.

The Library is affiliated to the Union Education Dept. Library, Pretoria, from which almost any book within reason can be borrowed through the Cuthbert Librarian, on payment of the return postage. It is hoped that this will prove useful to those who need locally unobtainable books for their own study.

Cash in hand at December 6th amounted £5 3s. 11d. The library is a vital but difficult service to maintain in wartime but every effort is being made to meet the calls upon it, and constructive suggestions are welcomed.

Our thanks are again due to the Asst. Librarian for another year of willing and conscientious service.

LOVEDALE FORMER STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION.

The great event of the year for former students of Lovedale was the Centenary Celebration in July. Hundreds of Old Lovedalians met, and for many it was a re-union after many years.

The Saturday evening meeting was arranged especially for reminiscences from former students. Dr. R. T. Bokwe, President of the Former Students' Association, with other members of the Association staged an amusing and informative Mock Trial of distinguished Past and Present Lovedalians. This was followed by many interesting reminiscences, including those of Abraham Moshabesha, a man of eighty-two years of age, James Ntshona, Matthew Njikelana and Dr. W. G. Bennie, all in their "seventies" and many others who greatly delighted the large audience.

£30 was contributed to the special Lovedale Appeal Fund at the gathering, and thanks are extended to all former students who have contributed to this Fund.

Although it was not possible to hold a formal meeting of the Association during the Celebrations, all welcomed the opportunity of meeting fellow members and of hearing of the Association.

A number of new life and annual members have joined during the year, but many more will be welcomed. The aim is to make the Association widely representative of all who are "Lovedalians—Past and Present."

The Victoria Hospital.

Medical Superintendent : Dr. A. F. G. Guinness.

With a national demand for doctors and nurses in war time Civilian Hospitals—and especially Native Hospitals, are liable to be severely handicapped in carrying on their work. It is a remarkable fact that, in spite of a great shortage of sisters, some of whom have been given military leave while others have resigned to join the military nursing service, no curtailment whatever has so far taken place in the work of the Hospitals.

Nor have we suffered financially ; in fact we have been able to continue our policy of gradually modernizing the interior of the Victoria Hospital and the following work has been carried out. (1) The kitchen has been replastered and decorated ; a new Esse range has been installed, and new furniture has been provided for the kitchen staff. (2) New steam sterilizers have been provided for the operating theatre and the ward sterilizers are being gradually converted from electricity to steam at very small cost. These changes will produce much economy in maintenance. We are fortunate in having a resident engineer who is capable of carrying out such work and who is untiring in his efforts for the Hospital.

THE WORK OF THE VICTORIA HOSPITAL.

The admission figures for the year would seem to show a diminution of the work done. This is due to the fact that infants born in hospital are no longer shown as admissions. Actually the number of patients admitted was as great as in the previous year and the daily average shows a slight increase in spite of the drop in the number of cases of pulmonary tuberculosis who are now admitted to the Macvicar Hospital.

The most notable increase has been in the number of maternity and gynecological cases. Much has been done to develop the operative side of this work and most successful results are being achieved.

In the orthopaedic department all our seventy-five beds and frames are constantly occupied and a number of applicants for admission are on a waiting list.

THE TRAINING OF NURSES.

The increased number of Probationer Nurses now in training has called for extra exertions on the part of the medical and nursing staff. A teaching sister, appointed during the year, is doing good work and sixteen nurses have been successful in the preliminary examination while eleven nurses and two midwives have passed the final State examination. These figures show a great improvement on previous years and the number of successes should increase progressively year by year.

THE MACVICAR HOSPITAL.

We must express our gratitude to the Public Health Department for continued cooperation and help in the running of the hospital. Many rural authorities find that their share of the cost of caring for tuberculotics is an intolerable burden. This is not the fault of the Public Health Department whose officials have to administer the laws of the country. The present system of Hospital Administration in South Africa is chaotic. Public opinion is already clamant and drastic changes must come—and come soon.

NATIVE AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT.

Our thanks are also due to the Native Affairs Department. It is hoped that next year's report will announce the start of a scheme for the after-care of children crippled by special disease. A beginning has been made possible by the generosity of Mr. D. A. Hunter who was for so many years honorary treasurer of the Victoria Hospital, and the Department has promised its assistance in this scheme.

The Native Affairs Department has also made grants for improving staff accommodation, and for providing material for Handwork in the Macvicar Hospital. The patients, men as well as women, are now knitting socks for the Navy League and the Native troops; and many other articles of handwork are being

produced. We are very grateful to Mr. D. L. Smit for his un-failing interest in our work and for his readiness to help wherever possible.

THE NUFFIELD TRUST AND CRIPPLE WORK.

The Medical Superintendent has attended many general and executive meetings of the Council for the care of Cripples in South Africa. Both the Trust and the Council are vitally interested in Native cripples and we gratefully acknowledge a grant of money from the Nuffield Trust which will assist us in our Orthopaedic work for the next three years.

The Trust is also greatly interested in the scheme for the after-care of our cripples and has asked for full particulars of the scheme to be submitted.

MISSIONARY WORK.

The spiritual side of the work is not neglected. We gain refreshment and renewed vigour at our daily prayers, while the Sunday Services in both Hospitals are much appreciated by the patients and staff. We must again express our thanks to the Lovedale Bible School for the assistance rendered by the Rev. J. J. R. Jolobe and his evangelists in visiting the patients.

FINANCE.

Many demands are being made today on charitable people. We have the needs of our soldiers and sailors and their families ever before us, and war funds are legion. Under the circumstances we are all the more grateful to our friends whose generosity has enabled us to keep the work of the hospital going. Native health is an urgent problem and our work of teaching and healing is tremendously important; so we feel fully justified in appealing for continued support and generosity.

The Lovedale Bible School.

1. *Training Courses.*

The *Evangelists' Course* in the first half of the year was attended by twenty-three men including four Coloured students. The group represented five Churches and its members revealed wide differences of age and educational background. The Course covered Old Testament and New Testament Introduction, History and Exposition ; Preaching and Sermon Preparation ; Discussion Groups on subjects relating to doctrine, matters of conduct, and the devotional life ; directed private study, and instruction in Sunday School work.

There were nineteen teaching periods of fifty minutes each week. In addition, all the men received for part of the time, instruction in First Aid. Mr. Jolobe held classes in reading and writing for men whose general education was deficient. Evangelistic and Sunday School work was carried on every Sunday in twelve centres. During the Easter week-end the men were absent from the School from Thursday to Monday, working in teams at four centres. Letters received revealed that their work deeply impressed both Christian and non-Christian in town and country.

The spirit of the Course was excellent, men of different Churches, languages and tribal groups living and working together in complete harmony. The devotional life of the Group was strongly maintained. Prayers were conducted every morning in the Chapel by the members of the staff ; and in the evening by the men themselves. Service was held in the Chapel at an early hour every Sunday morning.

The *African Women's Fellowship* was held at the end of 1940. Wives of Ministers and Evangelists met for eight days. The main subjects of the Course were the Religion of Children,

Sunday School teaching, Bible Study, Home-making, First Aid and Child Welfare.

A few weeks later in January, 1941, the *African Ministers' Retreat* was held. The subject for the year was "A Programme of Religious Education." Questions relating to religious teaching in home, school and church were fully and constructively discussed, on the basis of addresses given by members of the Ministers' Fellowship.

At both these gatherings there was held a daily devotional session in addition to morning and evening Prayers. Actual attendance remains small, but the issue of periodical circulars to much larger numbers of these key men and women, following up the work done at the annual gatherings, goes on.

2. *Field Work.*

More outside centres have been reached in 1941 than in any previous year, and the demand for help of this kind grows steadily. During the year, Courses for preachers, elders, and Sunday School teachers were conducted at Columba, Kamastone and Mount Coke in the Cape, at Heilbron in the Free State, and at Johannesburg, Springs, Brakpan, Crown Mines and Middleburg in the Transvaal. All these Courses were inter-denominational. An important new development has been the help given to teachers and out-going student-teachers in the vital matter of Religious Instruction in Schools. A series of one-day Conferences with teachers, arranged by an Inspector of Schools, met at the centres of All Saints, Clarkebury, Idutywa, Fort Malan and Nqabara, in the Transkei. More than three hundred teachers attended, representing one hundred and eighty Day-schools. Long week-ends were devoted to special Courses in this subject for third-year students at Moroka and Lovedale Institutions. Requests for similar Courses in 1942 have been received from other Institutions.

3. *Publications.*

The *Preacher's Help* has had a good year. Despite the fact that the issue in Bemba to the Northern Rhodesia Copper Belt has ceased owing to local difficulties, the total number of subscribers for the issues in six vernaculars is well maintained,

and is in the neighbourhood of three thousand. This does not include a version published through the Afrikaans magazine of the Congregational Church, which reaches two thousand Coloured preachers. The labour of keeping accurate records and of collecting subscriptions is considerable, but the returns show that practically all those who receive the paper month by month are paying subscribers. Additions have been made during the year to the list of missions in many parts of Africa to which English copies are sent ; and we know that in some cases these form the basis of local vernacular versions.

Our two Xhosa volumes of *Isikokelo (The Preacher's Guide)* continue to help meet the need for such literature, and since publication more than 2,300 copies have been sold through the publishers, the Lovedale Press. A beginning has been made in the preparation of a third volume, a Bible Dictionary in Xhosa, for which requests have often been received ; but this is not likely to be ready for publication for some time.

A request from the Methodist Conference led to the preparation and publication of a small volume in English, for the use of African theological students, teachers and others desiring a simple Biblical introduction as a basis for examination work, and for teaching in Day and Sunday Schools. The book is now available under the title : *The Bible : its Meaning and Purpose*.

4. *Buildings.*

In addition to the erection of an office, the main buildings and dormitory-rondavels have been put into good repair. This was very necessary at the close of ten years of occupation. The electrically-driven pump and parts of the wiring system which needed overhauling, have been re-conditioned.

The Lovedale Congregation.

The work of the Congregation followed customary lines. The Sunday services, especially when held "under the oaks," mean much to those who attend week by week, while visitors frequently tell of inspiration received in so ideal a setting. Thanks are due to members of our own staff and to other preachers from Fort Hare and Alice who in varied but effective ways declare the same Word of Life ; while Mr. J. J. Nyoka with his choir and Miss Moore-Anderson at the organ make notable contributions to the worship Lovedale offers.

The Young Communicants' Class was again a large one. At a service held on 17th October, sixty-eight were admitted to full church membership, four of them being baptized.

A major change was made during the year in regard to the Bible Classes. Attendance at these, and also at two church services each Sunday, had hitherto been compulsory for all students and apprentices. For various reasons it was felt that we should substitute voluntary Bible Study circles for the compulsory classes. The outcome of this experiment will be watched with interest.

Thanks to Mrs. Raymer and other members of the staff and with the loyal co-operation of students and apprentices, we were again able to have a performance of a Nativity Play. This seems now to have been established as a regular and helpful feature of our congregational life.

The year opened hot and dry with 7 days in January when the temperature rose above 100.

Conditions improved in the latter half of the month and good rains fell in February making the country splendidly green. By the end of March, however, the ground was hard and dry again. A good rain came early in April but the winter was dry, indeed for six months only two inches of rain fell, and it was not till the end of October that a good shower came. November was also drier than usual but the latter part of December brought welcome showers.
