of Natives in South West Africa itself and I hope that the reasons for their opposition till be taken careful note of because they are more fundamental in the whole question of the Administration of South West Africa since the territory was taken from the Germans and through the whole period of the mandate to date.

These letters and communications I list below, were sent to the writer as President General of the African Mational Congress in the Union of South Africa. The aims end objects of My Congress are:

- (a) To protect and advance the interests of the African peoples in all matters affecting them.
- (b) To attain the freedom of all African people from all discriminatory lews whatsoever.
- (c) To strive and work for their complete freedom and their full participation in the Government of South Africa.

Here is a letter askin me to assist and giving me a mendate to act on their behalf.
