Dear Mrs. Rheimolt-Jones,

I was advised by Mr. Saffery of the Native Affairs Dept. to approach you about Native Adult Education.

The N.U.S.A.S. Branch at the Teachers' Training College has been trying to organise an effective scheme for Native Adult Education for the past six months.

However, we have not been able to organise this properly because we have been unable to get any sort of accommodation for the night schools.

Mr. Sutton who was the N.U.S.A.S. Eduncillor has approached Mr. Rakes, Mr. Morgan and various other people, but was quite unable to arrange for rooms.

The position at the moment is that we have a list of about twenty people who are willing to help teach these natives once a week, but they haven't made a start because of this difficulty of accommodation.

Would it be possible for you to help us to get this accommodation in any way?

Dear Mrs. Rheinallt Jones,

Thank you very much for your letter. First of all here is the information that you want.

- 1) We have no actual African students that we are in touch with. Our main idea was to provide the teachers, advertise this through the T.T.A, and let any natives who needed the education, come to our schools.
- 2) I don't think our students mind whether they teach girls or men or mixed classes:
- 3) We have not actually planned a syllabus for these schools as yet, because we meant to combine to a certain extent with the T.T.A. and get guidance from them re. the syllabus and work etc.

However, generally speaking, I think our students would teach through the English medium, and practically for any standard up to Matriculation.

- 4) I cannot give a report of anything concrete, because as yet we have done no teaching at all. This is because we have been trying unsuccessfully for accommodation for the last six months.

Our main difficulty is that most of our volunteer-teachers are women, and are not able to travel

out to the existing schools on their own.

However, because matters have been hanging fire for so long, I have in the meanwhile been in touch with Mr. Jack of the T.T.A. and am going to meet him sometime this week. We are going to try and arrange it, so that our students can go out to the existing night schools in groups of three, and do some actual teaching at the schools that the T.T.A. has organised.

However I wrote to you for help, because our eventual aim is to have our own Native adult school, run entirely by students and N.U.S.A.S. members. I thought that if our students got practical experience this year, and if ~~that~~ with your help we can get rooms for next year, we might really do something constructive in 1943.

It would be very helpful to us if a representative from the Training College N.U.S.A.S. group could attend the conference on Adult Education, because our knowledge of the whole organisation is very limited.
