MINUTES OF A MEETING OF THE ALEXANDRA HEALTH COMMITTEE  
HELD AT THE OFFICES OF THE COMMITTEE ON THURSDAY THE  
20TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1955,  
AT 4.30 P.M.

The Secretary, the Medical Officer of Health and the Chief Health Inspector were in attendance. Apologies for absence were tendered on behalf of Mr C.F.de Wet and Rev. T.C. Esterhuysen. Leave of absence was granted.

Prior to the commencement of the meeting the Acting Chairman accompanied by Mr Schoeman, Mr Weich, the Medical Officer of Health and the Secretary went on a tour of inspection of the following :-

- (a) VALUATION OF LOT 2326: The Acting Chairman and the Secretary made valuation of the above property.
- (b) No. 2 SQUARE: This Square was also inspected as regards the planting of trees and grass as well as the erecting of tennis court fencing which were all found to be in a satisfactory state.
- (c) COMPOST PLANT: A visit was also paid to the Compost Plant and found to be very unsatisfactory as far as the lower effluent pit is concerned which is at present overflowing and might cause pollution to the Jukskei River during rain-storms. It was accordingly resolved by the full Committee that a letter be sent to the Compost Contractor by registered post calling his attention to this nuisance and, further, that the Committee will give the Contractor six weeks time after which action will be instituted against the Contractor for creating a nuisance as regards polluting the River. In other words, the Contractor is given ~~six weeks~~ <sup>one day</sup> time to get rid of this nuisance failing which legal action will be taken under the Committee's Health Regulations to have this nuisance abated.

CRIME IN THE TOWNSHIP: On the invitation of the Committee Captain Oosthuisen, Officer Commanding, Wynberg Police Station, was present in order to discuss the problem of the increase of crime in the Township. The Acting Chairman briefly pointed out that representations have been made by the residents of the Township requesting the Committee to establish its own local Police or Civic Guards. It was also suggested by the ratepayers that a levy of 1/- (one shilling) per month per landlord should be established in order to pay the proposed local Police force to be established. The Officer Commanding pointed out that a civic guard has been established before and found to be illegal so that this proposal would not be proceeded with. Captain Oosthuisen also pointed out that a recent Police census shows that the present population is somewhere near 130,000 and taking this number of people residing in a little over a square mile with no electric lights, it must be expected that crime will exist in the Township. In comparison with crime



in the other Townships like Newclare and Orlando, the crime position of Alexandra compares very favourably. The Commanding Officer also pointed out that the co-operation received generally from residents in the Township is very poor as compared with the other Townships. This non-co-operation is mostly due to the fear of intimidation which the complainants are scared of.

He also pointed out to the rumours that spread in the Township and on investigation found to be untrue. In every case where complaints have been received, the Police have immediately acted and the Officer Commanding himself is patrolling the Township on various nights with two patrol vans. Members of the Committee also had the assurance of the Officer Commanding that patrols by constables on foot and two vans are done regularly. The two vans operate 24 hours each day in the Township. The question was also raised by members as to whether fixed points of contact could not be established by the Police where, any time in the night, complaints could be taken to in the Township on account of the fact that the Police Station is situated outside the Township. The details of the two operating vans and personnel were also supplied by the Officer Commanding and it was accordingly resolved to request the Minister of Native Affairs and the Minister of Posts and Telegraphs to have more telephones installed in the Township either publicly or privately in order that contact with the Police through telephone could be evenly distributed throughout the Township.

At this stage the Native Commissioner also pointed out that a fair percentage of the crime could be ascribed to the fact that the influx control is not what it should be and bad elements from other Townships flock to the Township for one specific purpose. After further discussion the Acting Chairman thanked Captain Oosthuisen for attending the meeting.

CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES: The Minutes of the Meeting held on the 6th October, 1955, were confirmed.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES:

TRACTORS: The report by the Transport Sub-Committee was tabled and it was accordingly resolved to leave the discussion thereon for the next meeting. It was, however, further resolved by the full Committee to purchase further two tractors as originally resolved, and dispose of the other two Fordson tractors at the best possible price.

AMBULANCE: The Secretary reported that the coach-builders are busy on the construction of the new ambulance although it will be some time before this ambulance will be ready for service.

REGISTRATION OF CYCLES: The required details in regard to the number of cycles registered and transferred were tabled and noted.

WIDENING OF WYNBERG ROAD: The Secretary reported that nothing further has been heard from the Peri-Urban Areas Health Board as regards this road.



ESTABLISHMENT OF SPORTS COUNCIL: The Members reported that nothing further has to be reported on this institution on account of the fact that no approach has been made to any of them as regards guidance and the relation of the constitution to the Health Committee. The matter was therefore left in abeyance.

FENCING OF SOUP KITCHEN: The Acting Chairman advised the Committee that a further approach has been made by the Soup Kitchen Administrative Body pleading for further tolerance insofar that the present gate remain as it is and that the southern gate post be taken as a fixture from which the southern fence will run eastwards at right-angles. After discussion, it was resolved by the majority to agree to this request on condition that no further concessions be granted as regards this ground; it was also pointed out that this fence is solely at the pleasure of the Committee.

WATER: On account of the Works Superintendent being on leave, a beginning has not been made with the interchanging of the connecting pipes to the reservoirs. This matter however will receive priority as soon as the Works Superintendent is back from leave.

ESTABLISHMENT OF BEER FACTORY AND GARDEN: It was unanimously accepted by the full Committee that on account of the limited space on No. 2 Square the factory be established at the Works Depot and the Beer Garden immediately east of the football ground. It was also generally accepted that the buses in future will go down Selborne Street, turn north into 12th Avenue and proceed eastwards along Selborne Street north into 15th Avenue southwards round the eastern side of the school on to the Square for loading purposes. The Secretary also advised that permission has been sought from the Education Department as regards the cutting of corners at the two eastern sides of the School on No. 2 Square.

PROPOSED CEMETERY: Mr Muller indicated that pressure has been put on the various departments as regards the expediting of this matter. It would appear that the Peri-Urban Areas Health Board is also concerned in the matter and the Secretary was accordingly instructed to write immediately to this body in order to finalise the matter.

HAWKERS' LICENCES: The Minutes of a meeting of the Hawkers Sub-Committee held on the 18th October, 1955, were tabled and accepted as recommended. It was also felt that the Magistrate's attention should be drawn to the fact that hawkers from outside areas selling certain commodities like wood and coal should not be encouraged. The Secretary was accordingly instructed to furnish the Magistrate with the recommendations of the Committee.

PLANTING OF MEALIES AND PUMPKINS: The Secretary reported that the planting of mealies and pumpkins will be commenced shortly at the old depositing site near the Works Depot.

PUBLIC HEALTH CIRCULAR No. 10 OF 1955: This circular was tabled and the Secretary was requested to furnish the Medical Officer of Health with this circular and the previous circular dealing with refunds of the employees.



BRIDGE AT 20TH AVENUE BETWEEN SELBORNE AND HOFMEYER STREETS: A further letter from the residents around this area was tabled and noted. The Secretary explained to the members that this matter has been inspected on several previous occasions as regards this required bridge. It was explained that in order to carry out the request of the residents it will be necessary for the Committee to build a 10 foot high wall on the western side of the river and then fill in the cavity on the off side of the river together with the bridge to be constructed over the rivulet running into the Jukskei River. At this point it has been found too expensive more so that it will cause precedence as regards the other standholders along the river. It has, however, been recommended that an overhead footbridge will be constructed across the relative rivulet to allow a thoroughfare to these residents as well as the nightsoil labourers during heavy rain periods.

COMPLAINT - INSANITARY CONDITIONS COMPOST PLANT: The Acting Chairman tabled a letter from W.B. Tshabalala addressed and forwarded to the Deputy Chief Health Officer, Johannesburg, who in turn has referred the matter to the Health Committee. It was, however, felt that the points raised in this letter are not true as no previous notification has been served on the Committee as regards offensive odours. Furthermore the matter is very much exaggerated as stated in Tshabalala's letter. The Secretary has, however, been instructed to advise the Deputy Chief Health Officer that a notice is being served on the Contractor as regards the nuisance.

APPOINTMENT No. 2 SQUARE CARETAKER: The Committee's attention was drawn to the fact that the ex-caretaker at No. 2 Square has been dismissed on account of negligence and it was accordingly resolved to appoint Mr J.P. Mngoma as Caretaker on No. 2 Square at the rate of £3.10.0. per week inclusive of cost of living allowance; this appointment is subject to a month's probation. The Secretary was also instructed to clarify the duties of the Caretaker as regards looking after No. 2 Square.

STRUCTURES FOR No. 2 SQUARE: The Secretary also reported that the Bantu Sports Trust through Mr Butt has promised to erect a 40' x 60' prefabricated structure on No. 2 Square and, also, that it is anticipated eventually to construct a swimming bath should funds be available and also should some effort be made by the residents of the Township as regards a donation towards this swimming bath. The Secretary was also instructed to write a letter of appreciation and thanks to the Bantu Sports Trust for a 200 foot garden hose given by the Bantu Sports Trust for the Square.

RENOVATION OF PAIL WASHING PREMISES: On account of the dilapidated state of the above premises, the Secretary was instructed to engage a temporary mason/plumber to repair the roof and the platform at these premises.

S.P.C.A. CLINIC: The Secretary also reported that the Committee's employee occupying the required cottage for the S.P.C.A. has vacated the premises. No reply has as yet been received from the S.P.C.A. as regards the cost of buying a ceiling for the said cottage although it has been anticipated by the S.P.C.A. that a substantial donation will be granted by the S.P.C.A. to cover the expenses.



BUS SHELTERS No. 1 SQUARE: A letter from the Managing Director of Putco was tabled advising the Committee that it is desired to erect queue shelters on No. 1 Square. It was resolved to agree in principle as regards the erection of shelters; the question of a site for these shelters was left over in order to allow members to make inspection in loco as regards the site where shelters will have to be erected

TENDERS FOR LICENCE BADGES: It was resolved to accept the tender of Messrs Gaycraft (Pty) Ltd., for the supply of the above badges for 1956 at £66.4.3.

TUBERCULOSIS SUFFERER - ALFRED MBETE: A letter from the Alexandra Anti-T.B. Association was tabled as regards aid for the above ex-labourer of the Committee. After discussion however, it was resolved to refer this matter through the Anti-T.B. Association to the Native Commissioner for help.

LEAVE: 21 days leave was granted to Mr G. Dlamini as from the 21st November, 1955. 28 days pay in lieu of long service leave was granted to Mr D.D. Jaftha as at 31st October, 1955.

ASSAULT OF SANITARY LABOURERS: A report of the sanitary overseer was tabled and noted. Any harm done to labourers whilst on duty is however covered by the Workmen's Compensation Act.

PAUPER'S FUNERAL - HLAMARISA SIWEYE: The grant of a free pauper's grave in respect of the above baby of 67 - 8th Avenue, Alexandra, was approved of.

MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH'S REPORT: The Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the month of September, 1955, was adopted.

CHIEF HEALTH INSPECTOR'S REPORT: The Report of the Chief Health Inspector for the month of September, 1955, was adopted.

MILK DEPOT SUPERVISOR'S REPORT: The Report of the Milk Depot Supervisor for the month of September, 1955, was adopted.

WORKS SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: The Report of the Works Superintendent for the month of September, 1955, was adopted.

LICENSING INSPECTOR'S REPORT: The Report of the Licensing Inspector for the month of September, 1955, was adopted.

REPORTS TO NEWSPAPERS ON ALEXANDRA TOWNSHIP: As previously resolved, it was again emphasized that no subsidiary body in the Township should make any statements or reports without the authority of the Health Committee first having been obtained.

INFLUX CONTROL: With reference to the previous Minutes discussion took place as regards a strict policy to be followed by the Health Committee as regards influx control affecting Section 10(d) of the Act. It was accordingly proposed by Mr Muller that the previous Minutes should be amended by adding the following :-

"That the Influx Control Clerk be instructed to refuse as many permits as possible of the 10(1)(d) class of Act 25 of 1945, but with discretion. Difficult cases may be referred to the full Committee."

Because by adopting this amendment, it was explained by Mr Muller, the Committee will be protecting residents falling under classes (a), (b) and (c). It was also pointed



out that there is no hope of expansion for the Township and that the class falling under (d) should look for residence elsewhere. It was also suggested that landlords should be called to explain to them the relative section 10(d) in order to obtain their co-operation. It was resolved that no good purpose will be served by calling for the co-operation of the landlords. It was also argued that if a resident is in lawful employment outside the Township, the Committee cannot restrict his living in the Township if he so desires. It was further pointed out that unlike other local authorities, the Committee has no alternative accommodation to offer. The above proposal was accordingly carried.

PERMISSION FOR OCCUPATION RIGHTS: The form tabled as regards particulars required by the Education Department for prefabricated structures to be erected for Emfundisweni School at No. 3 Square was not completed as it would appear from the form that the Health Committee will be responsible for the maintenance of the buildings, the fencing in of the site, the supply of water and refuse and sanitary removals. The Secretary was accordingly instructed to get further details from the Education Department relative to these conditions in the form.

The Meeting then terminated.

TRANSPORT SUB-COMMITTEE: The Transport Sub-Committee consisting of Messrs Badenhorst, Nel and the Secretary met immediately after the main meeting. It was agreed to purchase front and rear rims, tyres and tubes as spares for the new tractors when punctures occur. The cost not to exceed £64.0.0.
