We are really concerned that the only venue available for the public meetings is the Arcade in the Student's Union. We feel that this is neither large enough nor does it create the right atmosphere given the nature of our speakers and the international media coverage of the Festival.

Participating in the Festival are Cardinal Arns (Archbishop of San Paulo, Brazil), Carol Tongue (Member of the European Parliament and the British Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament), Bishop Tutu, Dr Beyers Naudé, Nadine Gordimer, Sir Richard Luyt, Archbishop Hurley and Molly Blackburn. We have also invited to sit on the platform on the opening night Alistair Sparks, PFP Youth, Dr Bozzoli, the leaders of all the mainline churches, Di Bishop and many others. The BBC, Voice of America, Time, the New York Times, Le Monde and the London Times will all be covering the Festival.

I feel like we are nagging, since we have asked you before, but we really would appreciate your reconsidering your decision not to allow us permission to use the Great Hall for the public meetings. The Great Hall would convey the seriousness of the events where the Arcade would seem a little to 'studenty' .

If you like we could state on our programmes that the views of the ECC and the speakers are not neccessarily those of your university.

STATEMENT FROM HELEN SUZMAN

RE: WITHDRAWAL OF ARNS' VISA

(This statement was made telephonically and may be confirmed with Mrs. Suzman)

"Preventing Cardinal Paulo Arns, Archbishop of Sao Paulo, Brazil, from coming to the Festival for Peace simply highlights the fact that the Government is aware that many young SouthAfricans are not prepared to fight for a cause they believe to be unjust.

What the Government should be asking itself is why the sons of the men who volunteered to fight for South Africa in World War II are today rejecting military service. The sooner conscription is ended the better. SouthAfrica should rely on a 'Permanent Force of men who wish to be in the army.

I have no doubt that the Festival will take place and that the sentiments which the Cardinal would have expressed will nevertheless be conveyed to those attending the Festival.

What the Government therefore thinks it has accomplished by this clumsy refusal of a visa to the Cardinal is beyond me. "
