#### WARDEN'S REPORT FOR MARCH 1957

There was a drop in the Institute's Nursery School attendances for March to 92%. This is, of course, still an extraordinarily high figure for nursery school attendances, but the Institute has long been accustomed to exceptionally good attendances, some months as high as 100%. But the School's pupils this month fell victims to children's illnesses; eight were absent owing to measles or mumps and one little girl unfortunately contracted diphtheria. It is to be hoped that when the School re-opens early in April after a week's vacation further illness will not occur.

The Institute has introduced a change in the office hours of the Curator. In order to gear Mr. Crowder's duties in with those of other staff members as efficiently as possible, it has been arranged that Mr. Crowder will be on duty in the mornings and evenings, but no longer in the afternoons. Mr. Walters will be on duty in the afternoons and evenings. Members of the public wishing to see Mr. Crowder on Institute business are asked to note this change in his hours at the Institute.

The austerity format of the Club and Nursery School statistics in the Warden's Report since February has been introduced as an economy measure.

This year, during the midyear holidays, a play centre was provided for them at the Institute by Mrs. M. Leon, a Social Science student of the University of Cape

Town. The experiment was a great success and the Institute is grateful to Mrs. Leon for having provided the children with this amenity and enjoyment.

In the meantime, while most of our pupils were enjoying the fun of the play centre, seven other pupils were receiving recuperative services at the Eaton Convalescent Home. When the Nursery School reopened on 16th July 1957, eight new pupils came in for the first time, having been selected from the Waiting List, now numbering 216.

The Internal Fund-raising Committee organized a dance on Friday, 26th July 1957, in aid of the Institute's Appeal Fund. The Institute is most grateful to Mr. Dantu, the leader of the St. Joseph's Christmas Choir Band, who played free of charge; to Mr. Teper who provided the cool drinks; and to other club and staff members who helped in various ways to make a success of the dance.

Mr. Crowder, the Curator, was a victim of influenza during the month and had to be away from work for about two weeks. Although not quite well yet, he was better and back at work by the end of the month. The Institute wishes him a speedy and complete recovery. Mr. Leslie van Niekerk, an ex-pupil of the Liberman Nursery School and a club member, kindly helped to keep the wheels rolling at the Institute during the Curator's absence on sick leave.

The Institute was very sorry to lose the services of the Assistant Curator, Mr. F.S. Walters, at the end of July. Mr. Walters, who was well-liked by staff members and the public during the year of his stay at the Liberman Institute, has accepted a similar post nearer his home. In his place Mr. P. Jacobs of Diep River will be welcomed at the Institute at the beginning of August. The Institute wishes him a long and happy stay.
