The Native Council In Session

Transfer Of Native Education Deferred

The fact that it had been decided to defer the proposed transfer of Native Education from the Provincial Administrations was announced by the Acting Minister of Native Affairs, Major P. V. G. Van der Byl, in opening the third session of the Representative Council in the City Hall at Pretoria.

"All our efforts for the development of the Native conditions in which they live are likely to be of little avail if we do not carry the Native people with us," declared the Minister.

Grant Of £75,000 For School Buildings

"We meet to-day under the cloud of war," said the Minister. "You are all well aware of the circumstances which have led to the participation of this country in the conflict. While the Government is taking all possible steps for the defence of our land and for the preservation therein of those principles of liberty and justice which are our heritage, we are fortunate that, so far, the war has not come very near to us. It is our duty, nevertheless, to be prepared to meet whatever eventuality may arise, to remain calm and to avoid in this period of stress anything which may cause embarrassment.

"I would here acknowledge with deep gratitude the many expressions of loyalty to His Majesty the King and our country which have been received from chiefs, tribes and other communities of Natives in all parts of the Union."

The existence of a state of war, continued Major Van der Byl, had necessarily involved very careful consideration of South Africa's financial position and resources. It had been unavoidable that, in the interests of economy and, in view of the difficulty of obtaining supplies, there should be a general curtailment of expansion in Government activities.

This curtailment had also affected the services rendered by the South African Native Trust, as delegates would find when they came to deal with the estimates of expenditure for the ensuing financial year.

An endeavour had been made, however, to keep going those services which were deemed essential for the well-being of the people and for the prevention of any deterioration of the position which had been achieved during past years.

Land Purchase Programme

The Government had decided to proceed with the programme of land purchase by the Trust, which had been previously arranged, and to continue measures for the provision of water supplies and/or the combating of soil erosion. While it had not been possible to initiate any of the new schemes which had been contemplated for the development and improvement of the Native reserves, it was hoped to maintain those which were already in existence and to move forward, if more slowly than was anticipated,

nevertheless with determination and in hope of final accomplishment.

The preoccupation of the Government with matters of defence and the financial arrangements which these involved precluded the possibility during the coming session of Parliament of any large-scale programme of legislation unconnected with these paramount issues, proceeded the Minister.

"With all our efforts concentrated on the supreme task of bringing the war to a successful issue, it is well that we should postpone till a less anxious time the contentious questions which have no direct bearing on the conflict.

"I am sure that the members of this Council will appreciate that attitude and will accept with understanding the advice that they should not unduly press for the introduction or amendment of legislation not immediately necessary," declared Major Van der Byl.

"In pursuance of this policy it had been decided to defer for the present further consideration of the question of the transfer of the Native education from the provincial administration to the Government. This would mean that the present system of financing education would remain, but the Minister pointed out that during the current year a special grant of £75,000 had been made to the provincial administrations to meet the cost of school buildings.

"The money would be largely used for the erection or extension of school accommodation in urban areas, but expenditure had not been confined to these areas, and in certain provinces assistance was also being granted for rural schools.

Health Services

"A special grant of £1,600 was also being made for the building of a Native school at Makashini to serve the Royal kraal and children in the neighbourhood.

"In regard to health services, I am glad to be able to state that the Public Health Department is arranging for the establishment of three central clinics, one in the Transvaal, one in Natal and one in the Transkeian territories.

"This is the beginning of a scheme by which it is hoped gradually to bring medical facilities within the reach of all Natives. These central clinics will co-ordinate the work of smaller clinics, which have already been established or which may in future be established, within the range of their operation."

The King In France

His Majesty the King arrived in France on Monday afternoon to make his first personal tour of inspection of the British Expeditionary Force. He was accompanied by the Duke of Gloucester, who has been in England on leave, and by Lord Munster, who will remain in attendance during the visit.

The King landed at a French port from a British destroyer after a rough crossing, during which he stayed on the bridge and watched seas, at times, break right over the ship. Escorting aircraft and French warships met the Royal convoy off the French coast, but there was no official ceremony on his arrival and no crowd of spectators.

The King was met by Viscount Gort, Commander-in-Chief of the British Expeditionary Forces, and then drove to General Headquarters, where he is staying. His arrival was given great prominence by all Paris newspapers on Tuesday morning.

The King is with his armies in the field and will, in the next few days, inspect various parts of the front line.

Sweden Sends Army To Finnish Frontier

Sweden is alarmed at the invasion of Finland and has issued orders for the mobilisation of 40,000 men for the army, bringing its total strength up to 150,000. These troops are being dispatched to the Finnish frontier on what is described as "wartime service." A fund of £60,000 has also been subscribed in Sweden to equip a corps of volunteers to help Finland.

Further anti-Soviet demonstrations have taken place in Rome, where troops were called out to protect the Russian embassy. The Italian Press continues to express sympathy with the Finns.

Soviet Policy

Why Allies Rejected Fact

Recent events show how grave is Germany's responsibility for the Soviet invasion of Finland. All the evidence available indicates, says the diplomatic correspondent of The Times, that the occupation of Finland and the Baltic States was one of the conditions for the conclusion of the Soviet-German pact.

Support for this view can be discovered in the causes, now disclosed for the first time, of the breakdown of the Anglo-French negotiations with Russia.

Lord Halifax On Allied Peace Aims

The essential principles satisfactory to a lasting peace were defined by Lord Halifax, the Foreign Secretary, replying to a debate in the House of Lords on Britain's war aims.

Summing up the declarations already made by the Government and the Opposition, and on behalf of the Dominions and France Lord Halifax said:

"We desire the people who have been deprived of their independence to recover their liberties, to redeem the peoples of Europe from the constant fear of German aggression, and to safeguard our own freedom and security.

"We do not seek aggrandisement, or to re-draw the map of Europe in our own interests. Still less are we moved by a spirit of vengeance. On the contrary, if Germany is able to restore the confidence she has destroyed, we aim at a settlement which will encourage her to take her rightful place in Europe.

"We wish to create an international order in which all peoples, secure under the reign of law, can determine their political and economic life free from interference from their more powerful neighbours.

"To this end," said Lord Halifax, "we will be willing to give our best in co-operation with other nations, including Germany, to work for the reconstruction of political and economic life, for only so can we believe

that an ordered international life can be preserved.

"I most devoutly hope that the sacrifices of this war will lead to a truer appreciation of Christian values," Lord Halifax added.

New Nazi Troop Movements

Paris, Monday.—A report that Germany is concentrating a large number of troops on the Hungarian frontier is stated to be confirmed in several quarters in Bucharest.

Britain and France to agree to the Russian demands endangering the integrity of the Baltic States and Finland.

As part of the price of their alliance the Soviet Government insisted that Britain and France should persuade Finland and the Baltic States to put naval bases on the coast, and the islands of Oesel and Dago and the Aaland Islands at Russia's disposal.

Britain and France refused to traffic in the sovereignty of smaller countries. Nazi Germany clearly had no such scruples.

"FOR THIS RELIEF"

THE Railway Administration is to be congratulated on its progressive outlook in providing the African passengers who patronise the Johannesburg Railway Station with a modern booking office at the eastern side of the African section of the Station. His new booking office will meet a long felt want in that it will do away with the almost inexplicable congestion that prevailed at the old offices at the week-ends.

We note that the present premises have ten openings which will serve the African passengers with tickets. A point to be noted with satisfaction at this stage is that the Pinville-Orlando passengers will be dealt with through a specially provided window while other passengers will obtain their tickets through the apertures that are marked accordingly.

Those who were unfortunate to require railway tickets in the past and experienced the humiliation of waiting minutes on end for tickets while their rains came in and passed out of the station will echo our sense of gratitude for what the Railway Administration has done to end this grievance. It is to be noted that the Administration is to earn the complete gratitude of all African railway passengers if they should not stop only at providing these splendid buildings for the benefit of the travellers.

Buildings alone, no matter how well equipped with all time saving and modern conveniences, will not serve their purpose if those who serve the Africans within their four walls do not possess the understanding and sympathetic spirit towards those they serve.

While it is gratifying to note that the new offices have ten windows through which to issue tickets, if those whose duties are to serve passengers, do show some sympathy with the passengers these windows will be as good as one window. We may find a long queue waiting outside near one opening for their ticket, while the rest are closed. Or we may see a long queue waiting patiently outside, while those who are supposed to sell them railway tickets, are "busy" conversing or drinking cups of tea inside. Doubtless, these things seem mere pinpricks viewed from a distance; but to those who are forced to experience them and to suffer lost time and money in consequence they are serious and go a long way towards blinding our long-suffering people against appreciating the good part of the thing itself.

That is why we feel that it is most important for those charged with this kind of work to acquit themselves worthily and try to minister to the Africans' railway needs with the best grace they can command. After all Africans are the greatest patrons of the railway services and the best that can be done for them is to meet their requirements in the spirit in which they expect them to be met.

In voicing these sentiments we are conscious of the past experiences in this direction and our remarks are uttered with a hope that the future will see these bitter experiences removed. That is why we hope that the Administration in appointing those who are serving African railway passengers does not lose sight of this fact.

We hold no brief for the truculent type of a railway passenger who approaches the window with an aggressive air, and, without waiting a second, proceeds to rap loudly on the window to draw the attention of an official. We are concerned with the well behaved, but hurrying passenger who approaches the windows expecting to see the official busy at some other work, but who expect him to hurry a bit over that job when he sees him, and then be "at his service" with a smile.

This is the passenger who will bless and welcome his step on the part of the Railway authorities while hoping that between him and the official concerned there will be the spirit of mutual co-operation that will be of advantage to both of them; while saving both the Administration's and the passenger's time and money.

Farewell Function To Mr. J S Allison

LIKE many other eminent officials who have left their mark on the Public Service of this country, Mr. Allison came from Scotland. He is the son of an Edinburgh solicitor and he was educated at the University of Edinburgh where he graduated Master of Arts in 1899.

He was destined for the Indian Service, but fortunately for us in 1903 he entered the Law Department of the Old Cape Civil Service under Sir John Graham, and served at various magistracies until he was transferred to the Department of the Native Affairs where he has filled the post of Under-Secretary, with distinction since 1929.

These remarks were made by Mr. D. L. Smit the Secretary for Native Affairs at a farewell function given by the staff of the Native Affairs Department in honour of Mr. J. S. Allison who has retired from Public Service.

The function was attended by Acting Minister of N.A. Chief Native Commissioners, members of the Native Affairs Commission and some members of the Representative Council, and was given on the grounds of Z.A.S.M. House, Headquarters of the Native Affairs Department on Saturday, December 2.

Mr. Smit said that Mr. Allison was a man who had a firm grasp of the realities of life with a clear vision of ideals beyond.

"In South Africa," said the speaker, "there are so many differences of race and colour that much remains to be done before we shall reach a solution of the problem of how the different races may live in peace and harmony. Mr. Allison is one of those men who have made an enduring contribution towards the fundamental things in Native Affairs, that lead to a better understanding of the people whose welfare is the concern of our Department. Though born and educated overseas, he has given us an example of unselfish service in the life and progress of South Africa."

The speaker then paid tribute to Mr. Allison on behalf of the officials of the Department of Native Affairs, and said that he had been asked to convey to him and Mrs. Allison the best wishes of his brother officers.

Mr. Smit thanked members of the Representative Council for their attendance and said their presence was an evidence of the growing spirit of co-operation between the Department and the African people.

Replying to the speech Mr. Allison inter alia said the race problem could only be solved along the path of justice and fairplay.

Let's Ask Questions What We Should Not Do For A Sick Person

Dokot la. We have talked for three weeks on what you should do when sickness comes into the home. Would you like to hear some more about this?

Mbala. Yes—we are not yet full. Nono. Would the doctor tell us some of the other things we ought not to do?

D. That would be useful, I will try. I shall never say "don't" many times, but I know that most of you have never been taught any home nursing. You make mistakes, because you have never been told the right way.

N. That is true.

D. Let us again speak about food for a sick person. Do not give too much food or too often. Do not give hard, indigestible, badly cooked foods. Do not give anything that is smelly or dirty, or over-ripe. Do not use diseased or old meat. Never forget to give meals regularly so that the patient is not hungry, and not hungry enough for the next meal.

M. And what about drinking, Doctor?

D. Do not be afraid to give plenty of drinks. Do not give dirty water, or old milk, or strong tea, or beer, (or other liquor that mak him silly) to a sick person. Especially if he is very hot do not refuse to give water, give plenty of it as I told you before. If it is not taken from a clean place, it should be boiled and cooled.

N. Has the Doctor any more rules about clothes?

D. Yes! Do not put too many blankets on a person with fever, unless you are trying to make him sweat. Do not cover his face with a blanket. Do not let the clothes stay dirty. Do not be afraid of SOAP AND WATER!

M. Are there other things of which we should not be afraid?

D. There are many. Fear is a bad thing, it helps disease to do its evil work. It kills many people. So I say to you very strongly this word:

DO NOT BE AFRAID.

of these things: Witchcraft (Ukatakata), Evil messengers (izibango), Spirits (amadlozi), Diviners that throw the bones and smell out (Izango) a ezipons' amatambo, ezinukayo) and these things for which I do not know the English names Umkhovu,

nokuposelwa, nomfufunyana, naba lozi, nandinki, n zinto ezinje. Fear of these things finishes many people, especially if they are sick.

N. That is the truth, I have seen it.

D. Some of you are afraid of good things. The sunlight is good. Do not fear to put the sick person in the sun, if you can move him safely. Do not leave him there all day of course. Do not let the cold wind reach him.

Do not forget to put his clothes, his blankets and his mattress in the sun. It is good for them, and it kills the germs.

M. Is there any more, Sir?

D. Yes! These two things—about people.

1. Do not have more than two people sleeping in the room with the sick person, especially if his chest is bad, he needs all the air he can get, all the time.

2. Do not allow many visitors, if he is at all weak. They use up the air in the room. They make a noise. They add to his fears. They worry him. They make him tired. They delay his getting well. Am I not right?

N. We have seen this many times, but we are afraid to drive them away!

D. I again say. Do not be afraid! And remember this. Do not allow dust, and dirt, and rubbish, and flies and mice and rats and hens and goats in the room with the sick—all these are bad.

M. We hear, and we will remember, but this is hard for some of us.

D. I know but you must try. I have two more don'ts, no three! perhaps four! Let me see.

1. Do not delay to call a nurse or a doctor, if the case is bad, and you get one to come.

2. Do not put mud on the face of the sick child.

3. Do not forget to give the medicines regularly. That is enough I think for to-day.

N. I agree—we have heard many things.

D. Now see how many you can remember. I have told you NOT to do TWENTY things. Try to count them up, one after the other.

R. Roamer Talks About Booking Office

Joshua: Jerry, sing aloud with joy Jeremiah: What for?

Jos: The new booking offices for Africans have been opened in Johannesburg Station.

Jer: I have seen them from outside, Jerry.

Jos: Weren't you impressed?

Jer: I was and on behalf of the people of Johannesburg I thank the Railway Administration for this great work.

Jos: Do not speak on behalf of the people, Jerry, or you'll set some leaders on your neck.

Jer: The booking offices are quite O.K. in themselves but.....

Jos: "But" what, you pessimist?

Jer: The most important thing is not the appearance of the offices—inside or outside.

Jos: What is your grouse?

Jer: You know very well, Joshua, that the offices will not issue tickets to us or answer our questions when we need information.

Jos: But the European clerks will do that.

Jer: That is where my "but" comes in.

Jos: You feel that the clerks won't serve us quite all night?

Jer: Let me remind you, Joshua, that when the electrification came into effect almost all the railway stations were built a—new and enlarged.

Jos: I know that; in fact, African passengers, too, were given decent waiting and toilet rooms.

Jer: Absolutely. But I noticed in some stations that the spirit of those who served Africans was not as new as the buildings.

Jos: Now I see your point.

Jer: I am glad you see my point. Now I fear that the great improvement done at Johannesburg station will have to embrace those who serve us if it is to be a God—sent one.

Jos: You mean to say, you wish that those who serve us should be sympathetic and patient with the passengers?

Jer: Quite right, Buddy. If the new Booking offices will be inhabited by Europeans who will seek to understand their clients' needs and seek to serve them with courtesy then a new era will dawn for African railway passengers.

Jos: I agree with you, Jerry. And the most important thing is, these ten windows or openings through which tickets are issued should always be put to use when occasion demand.

Jer: That's right. That was the curse of the old booking office upstairs. It had about four openings, but only one was used to give out tickets no matter how many passengers were patiently waiting outside for their tickets.

Jos: Let us hope, anyway, that the authorities will see that we are treated like people who pay to be carried by trains and that we like to be served with tickets as quickly as possible and with a little kindness—if it can be spared.

Jos: And if they remember, too, to be a little kind to Africans who, after all, are not responsible for these clerks serving "blood mamparas!"

Jer: I hope again that the clerks will remember that the trains do not wait for those who drink their tea as slowly as if it is their last cup this side of Jordan.

Jos: Your "But" is now as plain as a pancake.

Jer: As long as the clerks try to remember that the trains we board are the very trains boarded by Europeans, they would try to serve us as soon as possible without our having to rouse their white anger by tapping on the window with our hard-earned coins.

Jos: But you say the openings are ten in number?

Jer: They are, and nicely arranged and lettered so as to enable you to go straight to the one that will give you the tickets you want.

Jos: That's fine.

Jer: It will be excellent, if they will always stand open with a smiling Somebody inside to give us tickets.

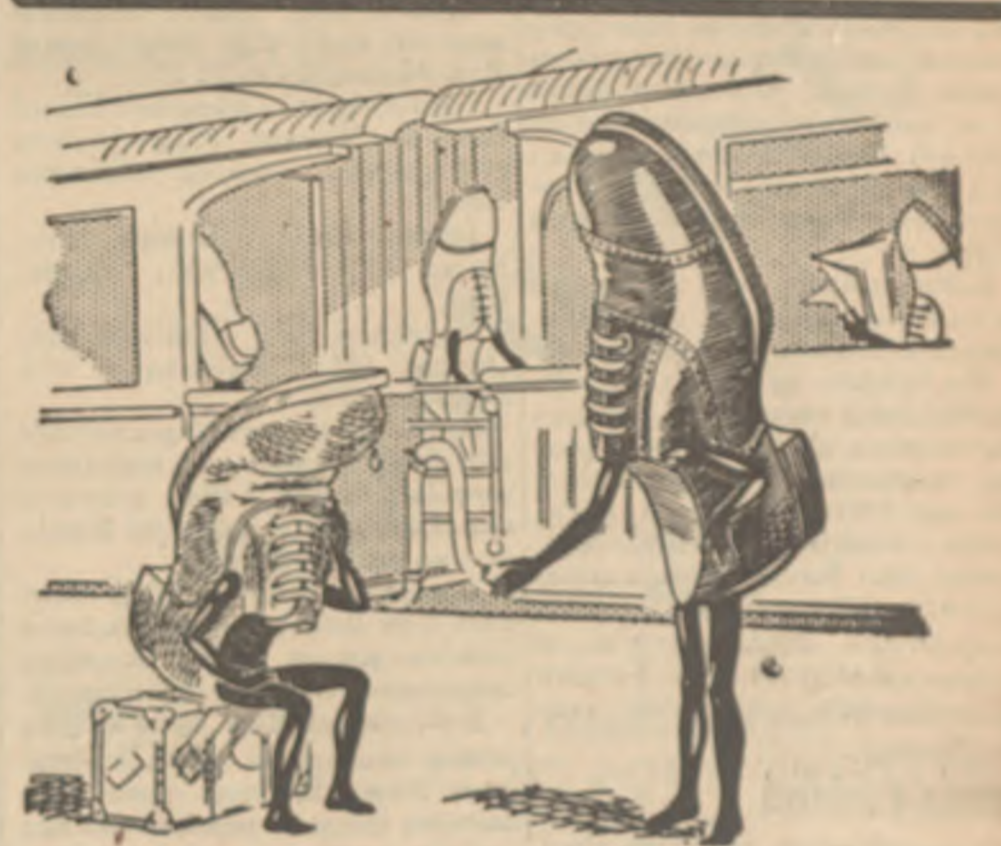

Child Training In The Home

Obedience

(By "NOMPILO," M.A. (CAMBRIDGE))

AN obedient child is spoken of as a 'good child,' and he is always liked by grown-up people, because he carries out their wishes. Yet, the wisest of modern thinkers tell us that obedience without the control of reason, is not such a grand virtue after all. A country that wishes to train its young people to go to war makes a special point of unquestioning obedience, and may say that this makes the young men more like machines than men.

So let us think deeply about this matter of obedience. To begin with, do not let us expect a small child to obey anyone but his mother and his nurse. They are the only people that he knows well and trusts, so he is not naughty if he refuses to listen to someone else. Above all let us NEVER TEACH OBEDIENCE BY FEAR

It is very wrong and harmful to get into the child's mind that all big people are powerful and will hit him if he doesn't do what they say. No, we want our children to have hearts full of love, and fear cannot live with love.

As soon as the child is old enough to understand, let us use reason with him. When he is about three or four, we can explain why we want him to do this or that, specially when we want him to do things that he does not like, such as washing his hands before meals. Do we take the trouble to tell him how the dirt on his hands contains the seeds of disease which may enter his mouth as he touches food?

If we let him grow used to knowing the reasons for obeying, he will soon trust us so well that he will obey even without being given a reason, which may be necessary at any time.

This teaching of reasonable obedience is part of the SLOW AND PATIENT TRAINING FOR CHILDREN that every good parent must be ready to do.

The good mother doesn't shout out: "Peter, come here at once and shell these peas for me." She walks over to where he is playing in the yard, and praises the little krowl that he has made with tiny oxen inside.

Good pinch of salt

Milk or water to mix

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt, rub in the cream, make to a soft dough with the milk or water. Turn on to a floured board, press out with the floured hand, cut into shapes and bake at 450 Fahr. or No. 9 for 8 to 10 minutes. Serve hot with butter creamed with grated cheese.

Then she says: "Your cattle are so safe, Peter, could you leave them for a little time and help me? I've too much to do by myself. You can bring some peas for the oxen if you'll shell them for me." So shelling the peas becomes part of Peter's game and his dear mother has formed yet another link between them.

This mother learned the all-important lesson that WE OWE GOOD MANNERS TO OUR CHILDREN.

If we treat them as real people and not as our little slaves, we can train them to be both good and wise.

This same mother always gives her children ten minutes warning when she is going to ask them to stop their play. She does not tear them roughly from what they think to be important business. "It will soon be time to stop your game," she says gently, and perhaps repeats it two or three times before she gives the final order, "Come into the house now!"

Such parents win the children's love and respect so that they are believed when they have to give the rules for the harder life that children will meet when they leave home, first for school and then for work. They must be taught that a school-teacher must be obeyed at once, without any questions. And the teacher's work will be much helped if the parents make up their minds NEVER TO SPEAK AGAINST HIM TO THE CHILD, or in front of the child. If there is something wrong that they must alter, they go straight to him and talk to him face to face. The same thing applies to a master when the child goes to work. And the minister must also be obeyed. But let us teach our children that there is One who is over all these, and His rules must be obeyed first. If we teach them RULES OF JESUS CHRIST while they are young, and they know that God is their highest master, they will obey not anyone who tells them to do wrong. Even a teacher or an employer may want obedience that will lead them directly into sin, and the child must be taught at home that, in this case, it is not right to obey.

This is what I mean by saying that all obedience need not be good; there must be reason used with it. If a child has been taught to obey and never to reason, he may be led quite astray when he goes away from home out into the world. Our great aim should be to make our children wise people with wills and the power of deciding for themselves, rather than willing slaves.

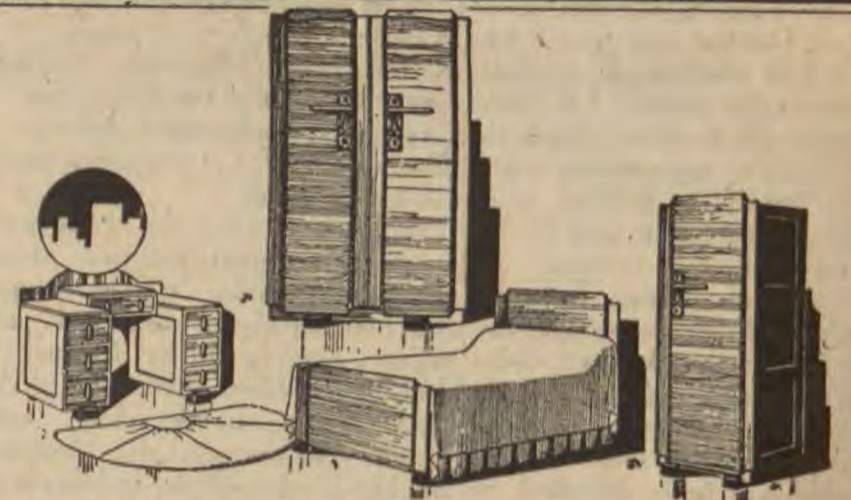
The finest people are those whose parents have treated them as companions while quite young, and have talked over things with them instead of merely ordering them to do this and that.

I know the father of a large family who called all his children together and let them decide what was to be done about one of the boys who had been so careless in his duties that a calf had broken its leg. He is trying to train them to be wise people, able to decide serious

matters for themselves. They chose a suitable punishment for the boy.

Let us also teach the children that it is no good to obey when we are watched, if we disobey when alone. If we truly own God as our highest master, we shall work for His loving eyes when our earthly master is away. It is the Secret Obedience that is much the most valuable, and which makes people trustworthy.

So let us teach our children to obey the highest, like people with good heads and hearts.

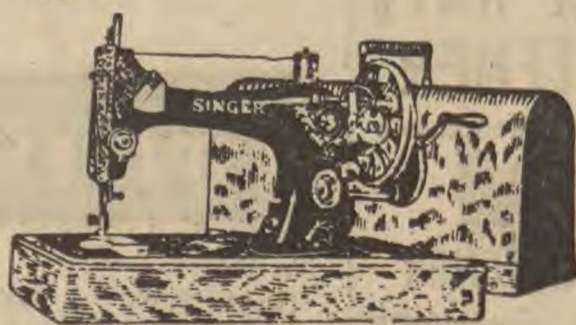

Christmas Cheer For The Sick

The festive time of Christmas is not far off. For some, however, Christmas is a day of disappointment, of idle longing and dreary waiting. It is to collect for Christmas gifts for such people—those who are very poor and especially for the chronic sick in hospital—that many social workers are organising tea-parties, bazaars and card parties. For instance, a card party was held in the Rose Bank Hall, Cape, at which bridge and rummy were played and tea served. Those who booked tables had to pay for them, the money going to the Conradie Home, where it will be used for buying Christmas gifts of clothes, slippers and bibles.

How Is Your Broom?

Always stand it head upwards. Wash in hot soapy water about once a fortnight and hang until thoroughly dry.

Boots And Shoes

Make Them Waterproof

Saturate leather boot with castor oil to render them water-proof. Drive a peg into the middle of the sole to stop squeaking.

How To Soften Them

Boots and shoes which have been stored for a time should be well washed in warm water and rubbed in castor oil.

Castor Oil

Castor oil may be given in coffee or mutton broth. Another good method of taking it is to pour some water into a tumbler, add the oil, and cover with a little brandy. Or fill about one-third of a wineglass with hot milk, add the oil, and then fill up with more milk. The taste of the oil will not then be noticed if swallowed at a gulp.

Velvet Upholstery

Furniture covered with velvet must be well "vacuum-ed" or brushed and then removed to a shady stoep, as this has to be cleaned with petrol. Dip a piece of velvet in to petrol and rub the soiled parts well. When the chair seems clean, rub all over with a clean piece of velvet and leave in the shade, but not in the sun, as it will retain the smell of the petrol if dried in the sun. Other upholstered chairs may be brightened by rubbing over with a soapy wet flannel, rinse off the soap and apply a solution of vinegar and salt. Carpets will respond to this treatment as well.

Pictures and ornaments are the next things to tackle. Wipe the pictures, remove any marks on the glass with methylated spirit and polish with tissues or news paper. Gilt frames can be washed and wooden frames can be rubbed with an oily cloth, but beware of getting any oil on to the glass.

For Hot Summer Days

A long cold drink in summer is as invigorating as a good hot cup of chocolate, coffee or malt or meat extract may be in winter. Cold sweets which introduce the necessary nourishing ingredients in the most palatable and acceptable form at this time of the year should also take an important place on the menu.

The following recipes introduce some new fruit and jelly creams and refrigerator cake, besides a number of delicious and invigorating cold drinks for tennis and other summer parties.

Apricot Honeycomb Cream

- 1 cup milk
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 lemon jelly powder
- 1 cup finely-chopped apricots
- 1 cup apricot juice

Put the milk over boiling water to heat, then pour over the beaten egg yolks and sugar. Return and stir over hot water until it coats the back of a spoon. Cool slightly. Heat the apricot juice and dissolve the jelly powder in it. Stir over ice until it is on the point of setting, then mix in the chopped fruit, custard and the stiffly-beaten egg whites. Pour into a rinsed mould, chill, unmould and serve decorated with whipped cream and halved apricots and cherries.

Strawberry Bavarian Cream

- 1 pkt. strawberry jelly
- 1 cup hot water
- 1 cup fresh strawberries
- 1 cup custard
- 1 cup cream (if preferred 2 cups of cream may be used and the custard omitted)

Make the custard and cool (if you are using it) Use 1 cup milk, 1 to 2 eggs and 1/2 spoon sugar. Mix the jelly in hot water, stirring until the crystals have dissolved. Press the strawberries through a sieve and add to the jelly mixture. Cool slightly, then fold in the custard and whipped cream, stirring until well mixed. Pour into a rinsed mould and chill. Unmould and decorate with whipped cream and strawberries.

Unpleasant Odour

An unpleasant odour in a room can easily be removed by burning coffee grounds in a shovel for a few minutes.

Tinting Lace

When tinting white lace with tea or coffee, add one drop of ink before using. This makes it less yellow and more like old lace.

The Non-European University Of S. Africa

THE South African Native College, situated around the ruined battlements of an old fort and symbolizing the victory of good-will over conflict, is the only institution which caters for the university education of non-European students in some of our European universities, but it may be said they are there on sufferance. South African public opinion is not ready for the admission of non-Europeans to white universities, although there is actually no statutory colour

bar in any of these universities. It will be realised, then, that the S. A. Native College is of no small importance among the educational institutions of this country. It is intended to serve the needs of nearly ten million people, including protectorates and Rhodesias. Indeed it has drawn students from as far afield as Kenya and Uganda. It is necessary, therefore, that the Africans and others should know the activities, the progress and the development of Fort Hare and

its place in the educational system set up for the Native population of South Africa

Being an institution for higher education, Fort Hare, like the European Universities and Technical Colleges in South Africa, comes directly under the Union Department of Education. In the same way as the other Universities, it began its career in 1916 as a secondary school preparing students for the Matriculation Examination, but started in 1919 to prepare students for the degrees of the University of South Africa. Up to the end of last year 93 of its students had graduated B.A. or B.Sc., more than 25 per cent of them in the last two years. Fort Hare not being technically recognised as a University College, its students have hitherto been regarded as external students of the University of South Africa, but developments are taking place which are bringing nearer the day when it will be given full university college status. From the beginning of 1938 Fort Hare ceased to admit matriculation students except for theological courses. It has received representation in the Senate of the University of South Africa, and the members of the staff have been appointed internal examiners of the University in their own subjects, just as is the case in the other university colleges.

It is, indeed, a great pleasure to note that our women-folk are becoming very much aware of their immensely important duties and are now putting commendable efforts towards social amelioration.

Another example of this manifest provident temper is the Orlando Mothers Welfare Association which was conceived and founded by Mesdames W. Ngakane, M. Africa, T. Molise, E. Oliphant, M. C. Mpulo, O. Khumalo and Duba in 1937. 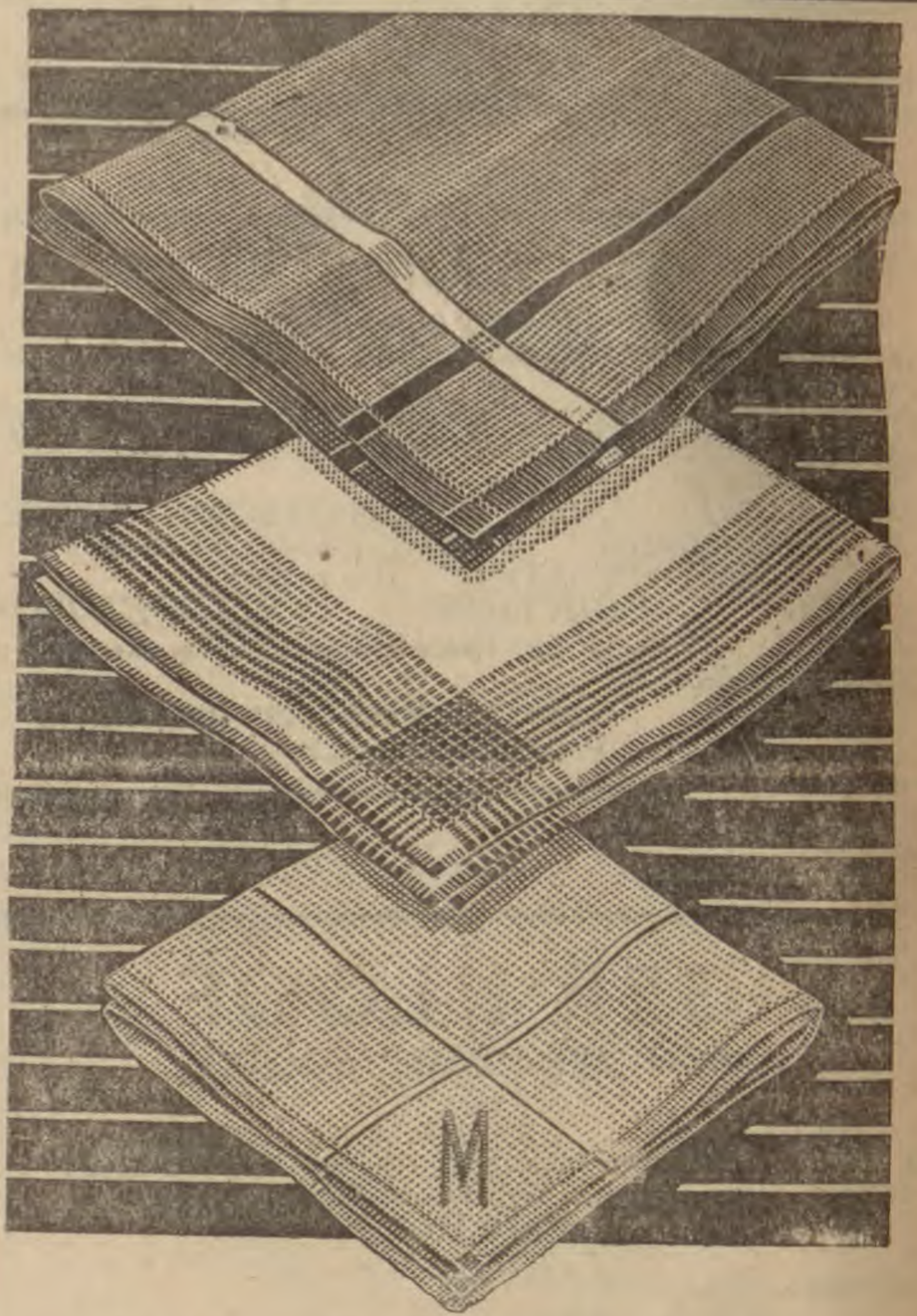

War News This Week

WEDNESDAY NOV. 29.

Finland: The Soviet Prime Minister and Foreign Commissar, M. Molotov, in a broadcast speech from Moscow, said that Russia had severed diplomatic relations with Finland. He added that the Red Army and Navy were prepared for any eventualities.

Western Front: The economic war between the Allies and Germany is being further intensified. The indiscriminate laying of mines in the North Sea by Germany brought about counter-measures in the form of the French and British decision to seize all cargoes of German origin on the High Seas. This, in turn, was followed by a German threat of even more extensive laying of mines round the British coast.

THURSDAY NOV. 30.

Britain: Two British destroyers escorting a damaged British submarine put in at Nastralsjorden, near Stavanger, on the south-west coast of Norway, pleading stress of weather and damage, according to an announcement by the Norwegian naval authorities.

Finland: Helsinki was bombed again this morning by the Russians.

The capital has now been bombed five times. A raid took place last night, but the worst so far was yesterday evening when 80 people were killed.

FRIDAY DEC. 1.

Finland: Russian's invasion of Finland has caused deep revulsion in a most every country of the world except Germany. By his faithful imitation of Nazi methods, Stalin has shown that the last moral discrepancy between Hitler and himself has disappeared.

Russia: Germany maintains her attitude of a disinterested spectator in the Russo-Finnish conflict, says the Rotterdam correspondent of the Times. She has refrained from making any official or semi-official statement.

SATURDAY DEC. 2.

Finland: The Finnish authorities near the Norwegian frontier confirm the report that the port of Retsamo has been recaptured by the Finns, who claim to have taken 150 prisoners. Finnish aircraft co-operated with the infantry and bombarded the positions occupied by the Russian's whose losses, according to the news received in Rome, are said to be serious.

Western Front: In the Vosges area, French patrols have been very active and some of them have penetrated some miles into German territory under cover of thick woods and have brought back prisoners and some valuable information.

SUNDAY DEC. 3.

R.A.F. Raid: A strong formation of Royal Air Force bombers carried out an attack in German waters in the vicinity of Heligoland, the strongly fortified North Sea naval base. Direct hits were obtained with heavy bombs. Considerable anti-aircraft fire was met and a Messerschmitt fighter only enemy fighter encountered was

shot down. All the British aircraft returned safely.

MONDAY DEC. 4.

Britain: A secret method for dealing with magnetic mines sown by sea planes is gradually being increasingly used and is proving very satisfactory, according to a statement issued by the Admiralty. Although it is difficult to estimate the number of U-Boats actually sunk, it is asserted that they are being sunk at a much more rapid rate than Germany can build new ones.

Non-European Trade Union Movement

The non-European Trade Union Co-ordinating Committee, representing 11 non-European trade unions in the Witwatersrand, has decided to make representations to the Minister of Labour for full recognition of the unions under the Industrial Conciliation Act.

The Conciliation Committee has endorsed a memorandum on the subject drawn up by Mr. W. G. Ballinger and Mrs. Ballinger, M. P., Southern Africa representatives of the Friends of Africa, London. The memorandum was drawn after consultation with Mr. F. A. W. Lucas, former Chairman of the Wage Board, Senator J. D. Rheinalt Jones and representatives of the Trades and Labour Council.

Council Session

The Natives' Representative Council at its session in Pretoria on Monday afternoon rejected by nine votes to seven a proposal by Mr. R. V. Selope Thema, of Johannesburg, that the Native Affairs Commission should either be abolished or remodelled to enable it to co-operate more closely with the Council and to include in its personnel direct representatives of the council.

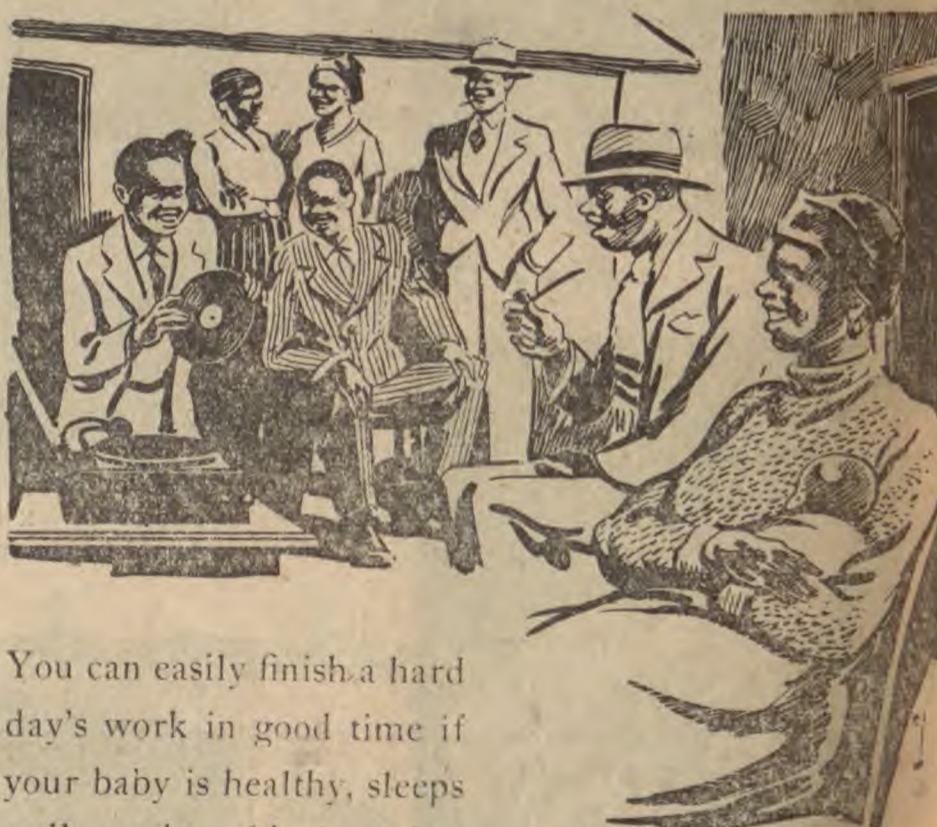
