In Lydenburg District there has been fighting between Sikukuki and Malukutu. when the old Chief Sikukuni died, Geluk administered the affairs of the tribe during the minority of young Sikukumi, the present Chief

During the winter of ISOO Kgolani, son of Geluk, quarrelled with Sikukuni (who is his cousin) and fled to lalukutu a neighbouring Chief (also Silukuni's cousin) for protection. Malukutu afforded his sanctuary, and thereby incurred the enmity of Silikuni. In the fighting that ensued 60 ren of Sikuluni's and I5 of Malukutus tribes were killed. Chief Sikukuni sent a ressage to the Cormander in Chief giving his version of the causes of dispute, and Malukutu did likewise. Messages were returned in the following sense: " The Government of His Majesty the King desires to see the N atives live in peace with one another, and will extend its authority and protection over all Native tribes in the Fransvaal. It cannot yet judge of the rights of present questions. but in the meantime the Chiefs are enjoined to do all in their power to prevent bloodshed and to keep the peace between their people, and those of the other Chiefs in the District in which they are resident".

This message had a good effect, and no further disturbances took place. On the 30th. of July last the Military Governor replying to a nessage from Sikukuni said:"In a short time there will be established a Department of Native Administration under Sir Godfrey Lagden K.C.M.G. ("Ramabanta") whose make must be well known to you as that of the Administrator of Hasutoland. Your Becretary Asaph was before me on the 22nd. instant and I informed him as above. I am very pleased to hear that you have obeyed the orders of the Government by keeping your people quiet". Collection no: A1655 Collection: HUNT, Donald Papers
