My dear Benjie,

It would appear that you did not receive my letter of the 5th June. In it I thanked you for the overcoat, commented on yours and Norma's relationship; recalled that is was a hesitant, timid lecturer and you a struggling, 'frequently frustrated' cub at the "Daily Mail" when we met. I remarked also that I did not wish to encourage an "incipient chauvinism". And that was before the diddle Gast war.

Asyou say, whatever the peace settlement, the war has had an immense impact on the Jewish people throughout the world. But, Benjie, you are an intellectual; and that imposes upon you the obligation not only to think but also to carry about with you an awareness of history.

You make the point which has been made frequently of late that the Jews of Burope had no excuse for allowing themselves to b led meekly to alaughter: and that the resistance of the Warsaw Ghetto indicated the birth of a new spirit - the determination to masert Jewish manliness.

what you young fellows must remember is that the Jess that its littler murdered were citizens of Nationalist Socialist Germany! A new Hitler with an equivalent military power could do the same thing today AND GET AWAY WITH IT !! Israel couldn't neve them: nor could U.N.O. Why didn't they resist? Hardly a tenth of theppfulation and facing the most efficient and scientific tyranny the world had ever produced!

And was the Warsaw Ghetto's resistance so unasual? It was remarkable, yes; but unusual? Jewish military strategy has always been suicidal in its recklessness, from the time of David to the Macabees. As for resistance to the last man soman and child you have the recent excavations at Hered's 1% tespite - I forget the name of theplace - Harad or something,

Now for the point 1 made about peace. In the American Civil War it is recorded that Grant treated Lee when he came to surrender, as though he were his superior officer. When he left the hall, Grant and his men saluted. Quite recently, in a boring championship in Britain, The Souttish champion McGowan was forced to retire because of a badly-cut eye. The defending champion, an Asian, who was defeating McGowan for the second time, went to McGowan's corner - and they say McGowan was in tears - and knelt before him. The grand gesiure, benjie!

A further illustration. Moshoeshoe 1 when attacked by the Zulus, inflicted a crushing defeat on them at Thaba Bosiu and, as they ratreated, sent a large herd of cattle to "his brothers". The Zulus never again attacked him. He cut the English forces to ribbons in 1859 (?) and while Warden, the British Commander was in a state of bewilderment and humiliation, sued for peace! I am not saying Israel shouldbe "magnanimous". If I were Nasser I would want no magnanimity from the Jews. All I am saying is that it is Beakol and not Nasser who can afford a diplomatic rebuff, it is "adulations" that might go to Dayan's hend, not "ululations". I love the sound of the latter though!

It had been my intention **thangh** in 1959 to have Egypt and the "Arab north", taxed with the direction of their loyalty. Are they African or Arab? If they are Africans then the Middle East problem is not theirs except in so far as Egyptian territory is concerned. Algeria, Morocco and Tunis have no reason whatever to be involved. I have naked myself whether that would be my attitude regarding the Afro-Americans and the West Indians and I think I can honestly say "yes". As soon as fittler saw himself as the guardian of Germans anywhere and everwhere he chose the path of war for he was bound to find it irksome that Germans <u>anywhere</u> should be under non-German rule.

Sorry for the lengthy sermon! Thank you for both your letters and particularly for the children's photographs. They traly came out well. But you'll have to warn Veronica that unless she counts her calories she'll soon look like the female version of the Prime Minister of a neighbouring state!

Reading between the lines I gathered that "Mtate Benjie" was not pleased with the progress they were making in English. Regarding the question of clothing, Veronica has been rather remiss I fear. As I told you earlier, Clive had scat me a grey pair of trousers. Because of my diminished 'public opinion' (paunch), it required alterations particularly as regards length. I gave it to Veronica together with the khaki pair of trousers you sent and a grey pair which was to serve as a pattern. She left them with Clive she says; but I have not received them up to now and I haven't heard from Clive either. Incidentally, the slop pail hasn't arrived yet either.

Consequently I shall need additional trousers. I intend tex sending you the brown pair as a model so that you may get me a similar brown and charcoal grey. The styling and material I leave to you.

You seem to be having quite a busy time. I am glad, therefore, you were able to write to Mrs Duncan. Strange as it may sound. Pat was the first man, after PAC was formed, to accuse me of racialism? Thank you for the R10.00 (Ten Rands). You see, I sent R25.00 (Twenty five Rands) to my mother in April to enable her to visit me hereand paid about R1800 (eighteen) for the newspapers "Cape Times", "Cape Argus" and "Sunday Times". So my funds were **part** low indeed. But I am all right now.

When Veronics comes we shall work out what quantities of washing powder, tooth paste, toothbrushes, blades etc. I use per year, so that these can be sent from outside to **mb** enable me to use my funds on edibles only.

I have been working, on and off, on some Xhosa short stories and poems and an unambitious English novelette. I read some of these to Veronica but dammit, she's puritan! I am sending you a free translation of one Xhosa poem I rea d out to her. She thought it was not quite 'nice'. I ask you! Later I'll send you a translation of one of the Xhosa stories and perhaps the first two chapters of my English **maxet** work Your comments, I meed hardly say, will be appreciated. Here goes, then:-

I'm not going to keep quiet I'm going to tell you what you are: Oh you can beat me, to your heart's content. You're very brave when it is women you face.

I've been holding my peace too long I must speak or I'lh burst. The water in which The midwife washed you at your birth, Was a whore's water.

Don't promise me; hit me Your scowl doesn't scare me this bit. What's that? That's your mother! Yes I say so; I say that's your mother. I was a virgin, me, boy, When I met you "They all say so"? I am not concerned With what others say. I..... What's that? "My breasts had already falles"? I have a high bust, that's what I have. But as for carnal knowledge of a man That I acquired when I met you. What is it you say? You're insulting me! You are going to produce the woman Who helped me procure abortions. "It's my mother"? You say it's my mother Who has removed my stomachs? (procured abortions) Oh no you've gone too far today. My father's house is intact, you know; The roof does not leak.
