Strengthen all your organisations and interest yourselves in the difficulties of those of your people who are less fortunate than you.

Let African Ministers be organised to close the gap caused by dividing denominationalism among our people.

Let the African Youth organise to learn the lesson of cooperation, mutual helpfulness and strength of unity.

The African women must organise and stick together to give that solidarity and steadfastness of purpose which they more than any among us can show.

With these organisations and unity of purpose we shall and can put our case to South Africa so that reconstruction may begin now during the war here at home so that when the war is over there can be real 'peace on earth and goodwill to men' and we can be able without fear to say 'A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to all.'

- (d) By demanding from the Government that the composition of the members of the enquiry have on its representation from the African People and be such that the African People in the areas affected will have full confidence and trust in the Commission of Enquiry.

MINUTES OF A MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE BANTU MEN'S SOCIAL CENTRE, HELD IN THE COMMITTEE ROOM ON THURSDAY, 11TH DECEMBER, 1941 AT 5 P.M.

PRESENT:

Dr Ray E. Phillips (Chair), Mr J.M. Pim (Hon. Treasurer), Messrs H. Britten, L.C. Koza, S.P. Mqubuli, A.K. Nobanda, C.N. Setlogelo, G.B. Xorile, the Acting Secretary, Mr J.G. Malie, the Acting Assistant Secretary (Mr T.B. Mdaniso) and the Physical Director (Mr A.P. Khutlang).

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE:

Apologies for absence were received from Senator the hon J.D. Rheinallt Jones, Dr James Dexter Taylor, Messrs A. Bovet, L.M. Povall and Mr W.G. Ballinger.

MINUTES:

Minutes of the previous meeting having been circulated were taken as read, and with a few alterations, were approved.

MATTERS ARISING OUT OF MINUTES:

The Chairman (Dr Phillips) reported on behalf of the sub-committee appointed to go into the question of the occupation of the new rooms. The Committee, he said, had given the staff first consideration and had decided on the following arrangements. (1) That one of the new rooms (the smallest) be occupied by Mr Malie; Mr Mdaniso to occupy the room vacated by him (2) That the other two new rooms be occupied by Jan Hofmeyr students on their return, at a rental of thirty shillings per room per month. (3) That Mr Khutlang retains the room now occupied by him; the front room to be used for storing sports equipment. The staff, he said, was quite satisfied with the arrangements made for them and the Committee had decided to offer such accommodation without additional charge.

The Secretary then reported that the Albert Street School which had been granted a date in December, had arranged to have it changed to the 13th December (a Saturday). In view of the fact that the Executive Committee had reserved all Saturdays for special use by Bantu Soldiers, it was agreed that Mr Radebe, the Principal of the School be told to give soldiers coming to the Centre on that night free admission. He further reported on the damage caused by the children to the basins in the dressing rooms on the occasion of the school competitions held on the 10th December. After a lengthy discussion during the course of which opinion was expressed that permission be granted to schools for such meetings during the day only, it was ultimately decided to charge the committee concerned for damages caused.

TENNIS COURTS:

In answer to Mr Xorile concerning the tennis courts the Chairman said that Mr Murray had promised to have them completed within fourteen days from the day of starting. He would urge Mr Murray to make a start as soon as possible so as to have at least one court ready for the match of the 26th December.

INDIAN MEMBER:

It was decided that the name of Mr Singh (an Indian) who, at a previous meeting had applied for membership, in- and had been refused should be deleted and that he be formed of the Committee's decision.

CORRESPONDENCE: A letter from Nurse Mankazana, on behalf of the African Trained Nurses Association, asking for a rebate on the hall fees charged on the occasion of their show held on 21st November, 1941, was read. Because, however, the concert was a success, and no loss had been incurred, the application was refused. (2) Another letter from the Manhattan Boys' and Girls' club, asked for another date, as their show of 20th November, had proved a failure. The Secretary, however, intimated that the rental fees for their last show had not been paid. In the light of this, it was decided that the request be refused, and no other date be granted them until payment had been effected. Stress was also laid on the fact that all the rental fees for use of the hall must be paid before commencement of any show. (3) The application by Mr Makapana for the use of a room in which to hold a meeting on Sunday 14th December, was granted. (4) The Gay Gaities Musical group, applied for the use of the hall on 6th February 1942, to hold a Concert and Dance. As the date had already been booked, they were asked to make arrangements for another suitable date. (5) The application by the National Council of African Women for the use of the hall on Wednesday 17th December, for a formal opening of the Council's session, was granted. (6) A letter from the Tennis section, recommended the expenditure of some money from the Sports' Fund. This was referred to the Sports' Fund Committee with power to act. Arising from this, ensued a short discussion, during the course of which, Mr Pim (Hon. Treasurer) expressed regret in that the fund, which amounted to £150 was not used in helping the Social Centre directly. The money, he said, was lying idle, while current expenses of the Centre were increasing. The matter was also referred to the Sports' Fund Committee for consideration.

KITCHEN STATEMENT: The kitchen statement for the month of November, was then presented, and approved. Under this item, was discussed the question of providing Soldiers with a light breakfast on Sunday mornings. The matter was ultimately referred to a sub-committee to make the necessary arrangements.

NEW MEMBERS: The following were admitted into the membership of the Social Centre. George Britton; Arthur Emery; Shadrach Magwa; Abraham Mlonjeni; Adolph Mojapele; Randall Peteni; Andries Phaloane; Rev. D.T. Nguza; Joseph Ntuane; Maurice Sabe; Phillip Seredinyane. Mr Wadee, an Indian, was refused membership. It was also stated that certain applicants whose names appeared on the last list of applicants for membership, were Indians, and they had been erroneously admitted. In view of this, it was agreed that a Notice Of Motion be recorded, asking the next meeting of the Executive to record this action.

GENERAL: The Chairman then asked whether a date could be made available for the Ohlange Choir, now touring the Transvaal under Dr. Dubem which was anxious to stage a show at the Social Centre. The meeting agreed that a suitable date be given them by the Secretary, and the usual fees charged. The meeting terminated at 6.55. P.M.

I thank you for your letter of recent date; but deeply regret the situation that has arisen. However, I believe that we have punctured the bubble in so far as the results of the elections is concerned.

I do not think there is any reason for either of you to be worried. As a matter of fact, in one way I consider it lucky that these fellows shot their bolt too early so that it will have spent its force by the time the campaign begins.

I agree with you about the embarrassment caused by associating with such people under the circumstances. I can assure you that their election had caused great concern and confusion as well as disaffection in Congress on the part of many people; but my advice was, and is, that all who are interested in the progress of Congress, the advancement and cooperation among our people and those interested in our welfare, should actively organise branches of Congress wherever they are with a view of, not only strengthening Congress, but also voting out the present leadership at the earliest possible opportunity.

I am enclosing herewith copies of the letters I wrote to Messrs. Oliphant and Pendla. They are confidential; but Mr. Molteno may see them.

I received your letter of recent date for which I thank you.

I regret that recent circumstances occasioned you so much worry and concern. I repeat that there is no need for you to worry.

My last letter had been written before your telegram came, and when I wrote it I was more annoyed with the Bloemfontein "Friend" for releasing the nominations, notwithstanding the fact that I had submitted, by hand, at their offices a copy of the official position.

Upon receiving your telegram, however, I communicated, by letter with SAPA, locally, and submitted a statement of correction which put the matter in its right perspective. They wrote a letter of apology and stated that your statement sent after my telegram of authorization to you was being released as correction.

You did not misinterpret the text of my telegram by so doing, and, I hope the matter is now settled to your satisfaction.

The best thing to be done by those who are indignant with you, is for them to organise themselves, and those who feel with them, into strong branches throughout the Province, so that, at the earliest possible occasion, they may turn out the element that seems to use the offices of Congress for personal gain.

I would like for you to send me, before you get busy with parliamentary duties, any cases of Police maltreatment of Africans.

Sometime ago I mentioned to you that the African Medical students had complained to me that Mr. J. Lewin had asked them to return their books. They were not very clear about the authority of this action. Nor was I.

I was, therefore, reluctant to express my feelings on the matter until the full facts of the case were on hand.

I am now able to quote part of the letter in question, dated "11th November, 1941".

"To: Bantu Medical Students"

"As I indicated earlier in the year, all the medical books you have bought are University property. All the books in your possession must, therefore, be returned to the Medical Library at the end of your examinations. When doing so, please ask the Librarian to record which books have been returned by you.

"Please acknowledge receipt of this letter and also let me have a list of the medical books you have returned to the library. "

or as a member of the Non-statutory Welfare Committee of which some of us were members.

- (2) Whether his action is in terms of the conditions of the Trust Scholarship.
- (3) Whether the sentence "...all the medical books which you have bought are University property...." does not appear contradictory.
- (4) Whether the funds of the Trust Scholarship are not sufficient enough to permit these scholars to buy for themselves the necessary books for class work and for future reference as well as instruments that may be required in the course of their training.

If funds are not adequate some of us can make representations to the Secretary for Native Affairs to add more funds to the Scholarship to save us from the anomalous position revealed in the letter quoted above.

Besides, I hope in all our desire to help these scholars there will be no tendency to over control them into helplessness and loss of initiative as that would be unfitting them for the leadership and responsibility we expect of them after they leave the University.

We expect them to stand on their own feet with sound manly judgement.

Without presuming any right or authority, I would be glad to have a chance to discuss the position of these scholars either with you or the Principal or both.

I am sure all of us are very anxious for this valuable experiment to be a success and the period of training for these students to be the most appreciated stage in their life.

Very many thanks for your letter of 6th January. I was very glad to get it, and the enclosures, on the strength of which I feel much better!

As a matter of fact, as I was posting all the letters I had written on the subject of the Cape Congress and its nominees, I suddenly decided to hold back the one to Pendla until I had had a reply from Mr. Neil Boss, just in case there was any weakness in the story of the telegram from Bloemfontein behind which he might shelter. It is always wise to have your facts absolutely shock proof, but never more so than when you are going out on the attack! I have now received the enclosed letter from Mr. Neil Boss. From it you can see that there is no telegram in existence. Pendla is not the man to get caught like that - and the one thing I should like to know I shall not be able to discover, i.e. who paid for the telephone call. I suspect Congress funds. I can't see Pendla spending his own money. Of course if I could prove that, it would establish the fact that Pendla acted for a Congress that had not authorised him to do so.

However, I don't know that it is worth bothering much more about. The only thing that now concerns me is whether, with Pendla and Co. still in office in the Cape Congress, you can get enough recruits to the Congress to turn them out in June, which is, I gather, the policy you are trying to pursue. It seems to be a vicious circle - decent people won't join the Congress so long as these people are in it, and so long as decent people don't join, these people will remain in. Actually of course, there ought now to be a demand for a special meeting to challenge these people on the grounds of unconstitutional actions, but that also is impossible, I suppose, in view of the weakness in members and the cost
