On Sunday, May 31, t Africanists set up their first regional organisation at a meeting held at t Communal Hall, Orlando, Johannesburg. I was able to go out there for about half an hour. This did not allow me any time to get any detail about t actual proceedings. I did, however, note tt there were about 200 people present. Sobukwe gave me his speech to t meeting, and this I enclosed under cover of my letter of June 2.

I spoke to Leballo at t meeting. He told me tt there were 206 delegates from t Witwatersrand area, from 33 branches representing 9,086 members. He also said tt after t reading by Sobukwe of his speech, discussion ensued. On t whole, this was straightforward, and was not basically different from what Sobukwe said. T only real point of interest, he said, arose in t discussion of Indians. Delegates felt tt t question of Fatta PAC's attitude to Indians shd be man more clearly defined than it was at t moment. T general feeling was against regarding t Indians as part of t African group. In addition, he said tt there was some discussion of t proposed Africanists' "status" campaign to achieve consteous trantare treatment for Africans in shops. It was agreed the campaign should be properly discussed and planned on July 31 - PAC's "African Heroes' Day". T campaign will also aim at boycotting firms and factories which underpay their African workers. A regional executive was elected, t chairman being Mr D. Siwisa, formerly chairman of t ANC's Sophiatown branch and of t ANC's Western Areas Regional Executive.

COMMENT: 1) I am inclined to accept t manham Witwatersrand membership figure given to me by Leballo as being pretty accurate. It is not an unreasonable figure to expect after several months of hard work, and at t same time, is not extravagant. I number of delegates at t meetingalso tallies with t number I saw there, that is, of course, if one is prepared to accept th everybody in thall was a sixtuages saturgt delegate. Incidentally, muong those I saw were Leguate of "T world". and Matthew Mkoana. Tlatter in fact made a speech while I was there in which he said tt socialism was not foreign to Africa but was part of African traditions. I He quoted African communal ownership of land, etc in support of this. To return to t question of membership: a few days after this conference I asked Mathopeng how t recruting drive was going. He told me tt it was going reasonably well. He said tt, unlike their expectations, there not been a great rush for membership, but instead, they were finding it necessary to go from door to door and to speak to each individual man individually. Once this was done, however, t proportion of those joining was high. Thus membership was increasing, not rapidly as expected, but more slowly and very steadily. 2) A few days after t conference, I also tackled Sobukwe on his speech. I told him I thought tt t way in which he handled acceptance of t Coloureds as being sext part of t African group was somehat dishonest (in his speech he said tt from t start PAC ideology logically included t Coloureds) in view of t fact tt he had told minutes me personally several times to t question of t Coloureds was a problem. If he had been able to blush, he would have done so, because he explained to me tt immediately after t forming of PAC in early April, he had received a letter from a Coloured man in Cape Town pledging full support and asking for assistance in setting up a branch down there. In view of this, said 2 Sobukwe, he had no alternative but to pretend tt t Africanists had always intended to include t Coloureds. I also attacked him for his remarks about t White Press, pointing out tt he and PAC had had a fair publisity and what was t grounds for his statements in his speech. Again, he retreated, and said he new realised he had not been quite accurate, as he was really referring only to "Golden City Post", which claimed had deliberately suppressed news of t Africanists since t inagural conference.
