Note: In a box at the foot of the third column where the report breaks off there is an explanation about the prosecutor's slip about Christian Action and Christian Institute.

No mention of Institute or subversion in headlines of whatever size.

Mention: in body of report in undifferentiated type:

Mr. Liebenberg said Fishher received financial aid through Kim in London from time to time. He handled the party funds. Meney came into South Africa in devious ways - "through the fictitious Wilson account; or through the agency of Defence and Aid; the Christian Action; and even the South African Institute of Race Relations."

Fischer distributed the money to the various provinces and to African townships for the recruiting of would-be saboteurs.

No further mention of the Institute.
