HUNGER STRIKE has been threatened by the 52 White A people detained in the Johannesburg area under the emergency regulations and now held in the Pretoria area.

Before their transfer from Johannesburg Fort last week the 21 women sent a petition to the Minister of Justice declaring they will go on hunger strike from next Thursday unless Mr. Erasmus orders their release by that date. Thirtyone White men have stated their intention of beginning a hunger strike "in sympathy" on Saturday. 19 parentless children. The other

In their petition, handed to the Minister last week, the women declare: "We are convinced that our arrests have been completely haphazard and bear no relationship to any emergency whatever."

They say they are prepared to meet any charges preferred against them in any open Court of

They also point out that, during the five weeks they have been imprisoned, 19 children have been parentless and many others, deprived of one parent.

We have been denied the right to discuss our detention with legal advisers. We are not allowed to obtain newspapers and have thus been unable to follow events or to read state-ments about our detention which may have appeared in the Press We have on many which may have an the Press. We have on moccasions requested information about our position, but have about our position, bubeen constantly ignored.

IN BAD FAITH

After careful consideration we are convinced that the authorities responsible for our detention have acted male fide or without due regard for the facts. We are, furthermore, convinced that our arrests have been completely haphazard and bear no relationship to any emergency whatsoever.

Although we cannot speak for anyone but ourselves, we conclude that the pattern emerging from our detention applies in all other cases as well, and that the purpose of the arrests was to

other cases as well, and that the purpose of the arrests was to intimidate people throughout the country.

We all know that we have committed no crimes, and we are fully prepared to meet any charges which may be preferred against us in any open Court of law. Pending the drawing up of such charges—if they are to be drawn up—we insist on our imdrawn up—we insist on our immediate release. The continued delay in even considering our cases substantiates our belief that the authorities had no grounds for our detention. ONLY METHOD
