Dear Friends of the End Conscription Campaign

We are writing this letter to keep you informed about how we are responding to, and coping under the State of Emergency.

As you may know, the call for an end to conscription is singled out in the Emergency regulations. The penalty for a breach of the regulations is extremely severe - 10 years in prison and/or a R20 000 fine and/or seizure of property. For this reason we are being particularly careful to get thorough legal advice on all aspects of our work.

For the moment we have decided not to release any statements, media or hold any public meetings. In fact, we are not going to engage in any public work at all. This has put paid to our plans to run an extensive campaign around the question of conscription and the right to choose at the time of the July call-up.

Another very disturbing aspect of the State of Emergency for us is that a number of our members around the country have been detained. We are not allowed to divulge the names of those in detention, but we can say that Mike Evans and Jacqui toulle were detained under Section 50 of the Internal Security Act just before the Emergency was declared. The minister concerned has not stated whether Mike and Jacqui have been transferred to Emergency regulations.

But despite the difficult times we find ourselves in ECC is holding together remarkably well. Our decision making processes and organisational structures are intact. We are all keen to get on with the campaign, but all accept that we need to wait for legal advice. We have Senior Legal Council examining the restrictions on our behalf and they will advise us on what we are able to do. As soon as we have found the legal channels we will proceed with some form of action.

However, despite our very encouraging strength internally, we must accept that the Nationalist Government will try to close any loop-holes that might allow continued public opposition to the system of compulsory military service. Oppositional organisations are as strong as the real sense of grievance felt by sectors of the public, and therefore it is futile to legislate against them. The various calls that are being made by peace-loving South Africans reflect the hopes and ideals of sectors of South Africas peoples.

It is impossible to legislate against hopes and ideas. Whatever this government does, the ECC will live on in the hearts of many thousands of young conscripts and those that love and care for them.

We appeal to our supporters to ensure that this government does not succeed in crushing the voice of peaceful opposition to their policies.

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In whatever way you can we hope that you will contribute to ensuring that when the End Conscription Campaign is again able to operate publicly the people of Cape Town will not have forgotten this campaign.

We send to you all our very best wishes and our thanks for the support you have shown us. ECC is alive and well and awaiting its moment.

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
