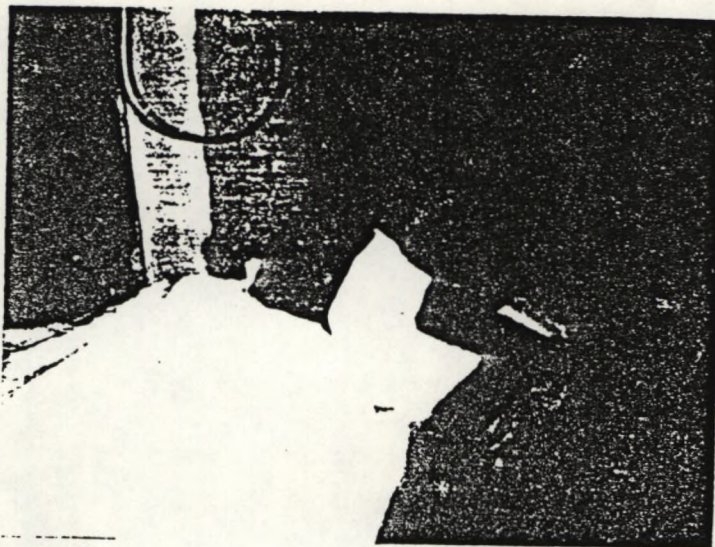

He was born at Motsethabong on the 5-8-1966. He started his education at Hennenman and thereafter he moved back to Welkom.

In 1974 he had the misfortune of losing one of his legs in an incident. This unfortunately put an end to his educational career.

On the 2-8-1984 he was brutally murdered by a member of the Notorious Racist Paramilitary Force during the School uprisings at Motsethabong.

He is survived by both his parents, 4 sisters and a brother. As death is the way of flesh may his fertilize the Azanian Soul.
