Dear Robert,

I have your letter of August 18 in front of me. The list of publications has been sent to you and because of non-negotiability here, your cheque has been returned.

What we would like from you for the time being as correspondent would be short, topical items suitable for our Race Relations News. Such items could deal with race relations in Zambia, relations with and attitudes towards South Africa. From time to time we might ask you to report on specific happenings in Zambia. Political events in Zambia and trade figures with South Africa are usually fairly well covered in our local news and, of course, in the bulletins of our banks. So it would be more those matters which do not get prominence in local papers here. Mr. Randall will be delighted to have items, or estimates or short articles for Race Relations News.

Then, the Institute has had experience in race relations and has published much in many forms on many relevant aspects. I think, that should situations arise, it would be useful if you could direct Zambians' attention to South African and Institute experience. This would be done by reference to our publications, memoranda, or by suggesting specific enquiry from the Institute. I do not suggest that you become a hawker of Institute publications but only relate them in particular circumstances where our experience and knowledge would be useful.

At the moment, I think this should be our arrangement which can change as circumstances change.

I am very glad that you are willing to undertake this chore. I have just hung in the Institute a large photo of your father who now joins the array of past Presidents. It took me some time to get the photo!

I was very sorry not to see you on my way up. But we were only in Jhbg for a day - during which our aged car was being repaired. The reason for my writing is twofold. Professor Pollak left us some notes after January's Executive meeting which the General Purposes Committee thought might be of value to you. If any of her suggestions can be implemented the Director asks me to say that we shall accommodate ourselves. Perhaps you would be good enough to get in touch with Mr. Charles Roberts as indicated in the notes?

At a social meeting arranged by Professor Rousseau and myself at my flat all Salisbury members of the Institute and some key potential members were invited to meet the President and Mrs. Malherbe. Dr. Malherbe gave a splendid address which aroused much interest. It is very probable that Institute members will meet from time to time and that some active programme (the nature of which it is difficult to forecast) will emerge.

Because of difficulties in currency central etc. suggestions made by Mr. Ken Mew of Ranche House that all Institute funds be collected in Rhodesia, publications sent in bulk and distributed from there and one set of financial transactions entered into between Head Office and Rhodesian members.

I have tentatively contacted Mr. Charles Robert, an enthusiastic Institute Member, and lecturer in Sociology at the University College. He would, if requested to do, be prepared to act as Treasurer and handle Institute publications, subscriptions etc. A sum of R2.50 is already in his possession as a result of sale of Christmas cards at Dr. Malherbe's meeting, as are also the publications bought to Rhodesia by Dr. Malherbe.

On my suggestion, he would be prepared to organise a display of Institute publications at the University and possibly elsewhere at suitable times and occasions.

I personally do NOT think there is likely to be any substantial increase of Rhodesian membership - the present climate is not encouraging - people who think as we do are dispirited, and feel impotent and consider a "talking shop" for the already converted to have limited practical value.
