# THE POTCHEFSTROOM JOINT COUNCIL OF EUROPEANS and AFRICANS.

The Potchefstroom Joint Council would like to endorse and stress the following points made in the Institute's Memorandum:

- 1) The principle of the right of every child to primary school education and the provision of more advanced education for those who can benefit by it.
- 2) The application to African education of the same ideals and aims which apply to European education because fundamentally the needs of Africans and Europeans are the same.
- 3) The Africans are in no sense an "independent" race.
- 4) Characteristics, qualities, aptitudes are modified and developed by changes in the cultural environment and are not inborn or immutable.
- 5) African children differ widely as to background and environment. The "approach" in education will have to differ according to the background but the educative methods should be the same for all.
- 6) In every sphere of activity greater provision should be made for the training of Africans eg. as doctors, dentists, clerks, farmers.
- 7) Education should be less academic and more vocational and technical.
- 8) Christian moral values and standards should permeate all African education.


