Headline – *Economy on rocks as diamonds disappear* – as it is assumed that the Mugabe family and its supporters (qv 13/11) have syphoned off the excessive wealth that had been derived from the Marange diamond fields in the east of the country.

Following the recent sale of \$685m diamonds and the cost of civil servants salaries just paid finance minister Tendai Biti discovered that there was only £138 /\$US 217 in the public accounts of the Harare government.

From being the 'bread basket of the continent' in the 1980's through the troubles of the inflationary 1990 's; where the rate reached 231, 000 per cent, it has been said that the plundering of Zimbabwe 's wealth is "perhaps the biggest single plunder of diamonds the world has seen since Cecil Rhodes. **GDN page 21 C 1**

## **Tues 19**

Headline – *This Apathy Suits Mugabe* – it would seem that the reported Zimbabwe referendum was 'supported by the majority of the population' (qv 18/3) was culled from reports in the Sunday Mail; a paper that follows the Zaun PF party line, and therefore not totally impartial. This writer implies that support for the new constitution has only been shown by just over two million of the 6.6m eligible voters in the country; a case of voter apathy if ever there was one.

Voting in this new law would allow the ruling party to replace a president, who died in office, with another party member therefore meaning that the nation will have a president that no one has voted into office. Changes to the make up of the constitutional court will see members of the lower supreme court, out of favour with the current regime, be moved up into the supreme court the highest court in the land. Land ownership, always a contentious issue, will see the white farmer loose out in the compensation battle. Money will only forwarded to 'someone indigenous'; ie black.

As to the fact as to whether anyone had even a chance to read, and digest the, document the chances seem slim. Only 90, 000 copies were printed four weeks before voting day. Other points addressed include a limit to the number of years a president can retain his position. The rights of the countries national born to parents from outside the countries borders who are still termed 'aliens.' A Bill of Rights obliges the government to empower females, a practice that is well outside the the current treatment of women and girls in Zimbabwe. The Bill also tackles the issues of the death penalty, ends torture, allows freedom of expression and beliefs. Guarantees the people shelter, good health facilities and education, food and legal aid.

If as seems likely the present administration wins the vote the party 's respect for the views of its people 's choice and with a supposed general election imminent the MDC 's share of the vote a low turn out would harm their chances because the party, and other groups are rural based; transport problems ensue. Pass these obstacles then Zanu PF may do what they have done during earlier elections and disregard the law and turn to violence to prevent the opposition supporters casting their vote. - Petina Grappha author GDN page 28 C 2 -

With presidential and parliamentary elections due, in 8/13 or 9/13, the international community is likely to deem them 'credible' despite the overpowering influence of the Zanu PF ruling parties overwhelming control of all things national.

Headline – Opposition unites to reject election ruling – on the grounds that the five opposition

Headline – *Party member arrested over Mugabe 's lost face* – scraped off the many items of general election paraphernalia by a government supporter. The culprit was exposed as a member of the Zanu PF provincial youth league in the Bulawayo region of the country.

The lack of campaign hats was first noticed by the mines minister O Mpofu who informed the NewsDay paper. It would seem that these 'bare' items were then put on sale for 2/£1. 30. However the youth league chair person, Mabutho Moyo denied any knowledge of the incident. - **GDN page** 18 C 1 -

#### **Sun 28**

Headline - Mugabe defies age and rivals to aim for election victory and respectability – as the western governments come to accept that there is little they can do to isolate a Zanu PF government if the party wins the coming presidential election.

At his most recent political rally in the city of Bulawayo, attended by between 15 - 20, 000 supporters much was made of the comparisons between the now hospitalised Nelson Mandela; resigned as South Africa's leader after five years and his own 33 year rule as this nations leader. In his address to the assembled crown president Mugabe had harsh words Desmond Tutu and the American president. Both support the moves to allow gay marriage. "Man can marry man, women can marry women. Never never never said the 89 year old Mugabe.

As for the future of the Movement for Democratic Change 's leader Morgan Tsvangaria his time is up as leader of the opposition. One worry prevails following a revaluation of the 2008 voting figures hints at a dead heat election result. Should this happen going on the votes, cast last time, there is the possibility of the MDC leader coming out as an unexpected winner or the country deteriorating, again into the violence the last vote. **- OBBS page 23 C 1** –

## **Mon 29**

Headline - Broadband and .... cheese come to Zimbabwe - but will vote halt recovery - as the economic minister, Tendai Biti cut the countries growth forecast from 5.0% to 3.4%. Notes from the shoppers at the Sam Levey Village in the Harare suburb of Borrodale indicate that a 180g bar of Dairy Milk chocolate costs Z4/£2.60.

Another aspect; the education system was in turmoil at the time of the last election. Previously, in 2008 only 27 school days. With the new education minister, D Coltart in post in 2/'09 conditions were low. Almost all of the school, 8, 000 were closed as 90% of the teaching stall were on strike and one text book had to be shared between 15 students. As of now text book ratio 1: 1 and 15, 000 teachers have returned to the sector in the last 4 years. - GDN page 3 C 1

Acknowledged, by Zanu; the party of Mugabe that their support in the cities is lost and rural support is their support base the increased mobile phone penetration from 13% at the last vote to 85% as of now could have a decisive step in preventing voter intimidation throughout the country.

Rally organiser Nelson Chamisa even encouraged party members to register their vote with a company, via a text message, across the border in South Africa as a means of ensuring a true count can be made. - GDN page 19 C 1 -

## **Wed 31**

Headline – *Violence and intimidation taking place in rural Zimbabwe ... says MDC* – and one case has been catalogued in Mashonaland West; a centre for previous cases of violence before the last elections in 2008.

The latest incident was reported in Chinhoyi on 27/7 by an unnamed forty eight year old supporter of the Movement For Democratic Change. Wearing a MDC emblazoned T shirt he was attacked by at least five who ordered him to remove his T shirt. This he refused to do then the beating with sticks and stones began. The incident was watched by a crowd of 50 watching the assault.

On reporting the incident to the police the five, assumed to be Mugabe supporters, were arrested and detained and then released after telling the court that the victim was 'not strong enough to vote.'

The MP and party secretary general was on hand when a bus load of voters, who he thought were to be to young to vote, turned up at the polling station in the Mount Pleasant area of Harare. The vehicle was adorned with a sign which indicated it had travelled from the Honde Valley; a distance of 185 miles from the countries capital. When challenged the bus driver said "It 's no secret ...we 're not allowed to talk about it.

News item, as the observer team from the African Union give a favourable account of the Zimbabwe elections early declared results indicate that both the president and Mugabe 's party will remain in power. Of the seats declared 52:10 is the split.

Minister D Coltart (qv 29/7) although an MDC MP was a member of the Welshman Ncube faction of the opposition party lost his seat of Bulawayo East to Zanu PF challenger Thabitha Khumalo by 19 votes only. "There 's no point in putting a gloss on it. Zanu PF will win a majority of seats in parliament and Robert Mugabe will get more than 50%." - GDN page21 C 1 -

Headline – *Mugabe threatens to oust foreign companies* – as the European Union and other western nations refused to acknowledge that Zanu PF won the right to elect him as president for the third time.

Speaking at the funeral of a military chief the president noted that foreign companies were keen to exploit their black employees the time will come when this will have to end. We will decide when this time is and we will "take no ideas from London or Washington" as to the timing. The ultimate aim is to split African//foreign ownership 51%/49% when the time is right. Headline 'Disneyland in Africa plan for Zimbabwe – was the plan announced the countries tourism minister, Walter Mzembi, to the general assembly of the World Tourism Organisation. ## Thurs 5

Headline – *Millions face hunger in Zimbabwe says UN* – especially the rural poor, estimated at 2.2m or 1:4 of country dwellers so says officials from the World Food Programme. Those hardest

hit are from the south of the country and where the forecast for the harvest is very poor.

Making their report the WFP officials little mention of the chaotic land policy of the recently re elected Mugabe government from 2000. Most of the blame was placed on the adverse weather unavailability and high cost of agricultural imports; fertiliser and high cereal prices; a 15% rise over the last 12 months.

According to economist V Musewe, most of the current problem can be places at the door of the small scale black farmer who is growing tobacco, which sell at a high price, rather than food crops. Already noted, in an academic report from I Scoones in 2010 of Sussex University, the 6, 000 white farmers have handed over their land to 245, 000 black farmers. These new incumbents will take twenty years to reach maximum production and return to 1990 levels.
