NATIONAL PROGRAMME

Since the cost of imports used on a national basis will not be higher than the price quoted, it will be cost effective to use these films in a number of centres. This would also permit us to import 2 or 3 films at a reasonable rate for each centre(approx \$2500 per centre)

We have drawn up 2 differnt scenarios for a film festival, using Cape Town as the example. Other centers would need to work out their own scenarios appropriate to

- a) Venues available
- b) ECC workers available
- c) Audience

and hence calculate their own budgets. Media would probably need to be specific to each centre. A national budget could be worked out once each centre has drawn up their own budgets. We have calculated that each centre would have to contribute R750 for the hiring of overseas films. This was assuming Cape Town, Durban and Joberg would be involved. Naturally this figure would be decreased if more areas were involved. This would permit us to hire 2 films.

Further national transport costs would be R300 per centre. This should cover transport between urban centres but may be underestimated.

It is suggested that we seek funders for this project seperatly from the current national budget.

"YOUTH CULTURE" REPORT:

On 3/4/85, the Youth Culture committee held an assessment of the ECC concert on the 22/3/85, and arising out of this an assessment more generally of the work of the committee.

The concert was the major project of Youth Culture, since we had made an active attempt to draw in new members. As such, we assessed the concert from the point of its success for ECC, and also, organisationally what we had achieved/not achieved as a committee.

ECC CONCERT/CONSCRIPTION CLASH:

Major problem with concert = financial losses (see attached balance sheet). This was due to poor attendance. Reasons for this were:

- inaccessibility of venue (due to problems of finding a venue)

- 10/11 other organised "jorls" on in Cape Town that night - possibility that poster was not clear enough/legibility

- very few schoolchildren attended (possibly due to location of venue)

- problems with distribution of media for advertising

- limited nature of bands playing

General feeling was that program at concert was successful. Audience was responsive, particularly to drama, and concert was well-organised.

For future : suggestions made were -

book venues well in advance (3 months)

define our audience much more clearly, in
terms of attracting particular groupings with
different sorts of music etc.

group felt that concerts should not be aimed specifically at schoolchildren - that we seem to be more effective working in the age-group 18 and over, possibly because it is closer to us.

This last point led us to a more general discussion/assessment of who the audience/constituency we are trying to reach is, whether concerts are the medium through which to reach this group, and what other ways can we use to do this.

GENERAL ASSESSMENT:

Arising out of a discussion on problems to do with the concert, the committee came up with the following guidelines/ideas for improving the efficiency and clarity of direction. These included:

- that the committee is not aiming itself specifically at schoolchildren as schoolchildren. This function, it was felt, was the responsibility of the schools group of the youth committee, and of SIG rather. We would be aiming at schoolchildren insofar as they see themselves as part of a broader constituency of "youth", and of the "counter-culture".
- the committee feels strongly that it should change its name from "Youth Culture", but as yet no suitable alternative has been come up with. (Any ideas?)
- that the committee restructure (formalise with a chairperson, who is then responsible for contacting members, running meetings etc), and that we undertake a lot of new projects.

THE FUTURE:

- meet with schools group to discuss possible overlap, but mainly to discuss ways in which we can cooperate and reinforce each others' work.
- We have set up several new projects including:
 - ECC stall (at e.g. Greenmarket Squate, Claremont alley etc) selling (new) buttons, t-shirts and other media produced by the media committee. Youth Culture group will be bringing out new designs in t-shirts and badges, which we feel are appropriate for the audience we are aiming at ...
 - Art exhibition (movable) Work is being done on collating material on anti-war art (e.g. Vietnam, WW II, etc). Following discussion with some Michaelis art students and a lecturer, an attempt is being made to involve them actively in getting the exhibition together, and to generate local art/provide a forum for art which is already around, on the theme of the military. A discussion on art/the artist and the military is being held at Michaelis with ECC there.
 - Film festival We investigated the screening of "Killing Fields" but timing is too short. We are in the process of investigating the feasibility of a very professional anti-war film festival for the end of the year. Consultations with people involved in other international film festivals have had a good response, and negotiations continue.

In addition to this, the group will be writing contributions for the next Vula, will be planning some launch for the Shifty Records/Joburg ECC anti-war record in June/July, and will be taking the art/poster exhibition to the July Festival.

CONCLUSION:

On the whole, the Youth Culture group is beginning to work as a coherent grouping, in terms of organisational work - and we are all becoming re-inspired with the wealth of new ideas emerging from our assessment. Concerts are not planned for the immediate future - but we have not dropped the idea. Constraints on money will also affect our work. With the establishment of new projects, we hope that all members of the group will find an area of involvement, and that new people can be drawn in to assist in these projects too.

DRAFT PROPOSAL FOR A FILM FESTIVAL TO BE HELD UNDER THE AUSPICES OF THE GOD CONSCRIPTION CAMPAIGN.

- e. Keaca thema: a film festival with such an emphasis an international peace issues will provide a solid focus point for our work towards building a peace movement it will assist us to place ECC's work in this context at the same time, outlining the paticularity of our call for a just peace.
- I. National activity: the festival could be taken around the various ECC centres, contributing to the national spirit of ECC.



ECC PRESS RELEASE: 'FORCES' FAVOURITES'

'Forces'm Favourites' features songs from eleven local bands, and many more bands across the country made their songs available to us. Not all the songs deal directly with the issue of conscription; but all are concerned with the South African crisis. The album is an expression of concern about the present political situation, the responsibility of whites, alienation as a result of apartheid, and concern for the future.


The second forms only part of ECC's contribution to the growing antiapartheid, anti-war culture in South Africa. An art exhibition in Cape Town recently drew over 30 artists, and hundreds of visitors to view "Fosters for Peace" and "Art against War". Hundreds of people have responded to the campaign by wearing T-shirts, badges and socks with slogans such as 'End Conscription', 'Moms against War', 'Troops Out Of The Townships', 'Killing is no Solution'. ECC has held concerts in Durban, Cape Town, Johannesburg, Pietermaritzburg, Port Elizabeth, and Grahamstown, drawing thousands who have enthusiastically supported music on an anti-war, anti-militarisation theme.

The development of such a large anti-war culture stems from the fact the that all youth are directly affected by militarisation; either confrontion of soldiers daily on township streets, or being faced with compulsory conscription into the SADF. White youth are forced to choose between fighting in the SADF, or facing a six year jail sentence or permanent exile. (Provision has only been made for religious universal pacifists to be granted an alternative.) Many thousands leave the country every year (2000 - 3000 yearly before troops were employed in the townships); people who cannot fight in a war they don't believe in. There are reportedly 7000 South African War Resisters in the U.K. alone.



ECC believes that conscripts should have the right to choose whether or not to participate in the SADF. While our long term goal is to abolish conscription, we are also campaigning for meaningful alternative national service to be made available to all.

The End Conscription Campaign has attracted support from many individuals and organisations concerned about conscription into an army involved in defending apartheid policies. ECC calls for the withdrawal of troops from the townships, an end to the illegal occupation of Namibia, the abolition of conscription and the implementation of a just peace in our land.



TOWARDS A JUST PEACE IN OUR LAND

We live in an unjust society where basic human rights are denied to the majority of the people.

We live in an unequal society where the land and wealth are owned by the minority.

We live in a society in a state of civil war, where brother is called on to fight brother.

We believe that the financial cost of the war increases the poverty of our country, and that money should rather be used in the interests of peace.

ECC/FEU Minutes 18th February 1986

1) Legal Issues

Justin reported that he had consulted with Prof Davis about the legality of the ECC component. He was of the opinion that there were no legal problems since the film showings were not in prohibited areas and, furthermore, even if they were they would not constitute an illegal public gathering. Justin agreed to obtaining a second opinion since although the committee was satisfied with Prof Davis' opinion, they did not want to fall on the wrong side of the law.

Furthermore, it was agreed that all media produced by the ECC in relation to the Film Festival, would be checked by Lawyer.

2) Photo Exhibition/Cultural Evening

The ECC reported that a photo documentary exhibition would be exhibited at the Baxter during the same period as the film festival. The exhibition would open on Sunday 6th April. This was an independent ECC project.

The idea of a cultural evening on Saturday 26th April was accepted. An entrance fee would be charged and it would be a joint ECC/FEU venture. A meeting with those interested in helping with the evening was to be organised. The initial financial expenditure would be carried by ECC.

3) Films

Trevor tabled a report on the suggested films and number of screenings. After discussion, the following was clucluded in this regard.

a) The following films would be charged for:

The War at Home (3 screenings at each cinema)
Punishment Park (2 screenings at Baxter, Labia)
The Line (2 screenings at Baxter, Labia)
Dr Strangelove or Streamers (2 screenings at Baxter, Labia)

b) The following films would be for free:

Culloden (1 screening at Baxter)
The War Game (1 screening at Baxter)
WAR series (1 run at EdAA on UCT campus; one run slotted into 4 screenings at the Baxter)

Punishment Park......Fred Ogtegs or Mike Evans
Culloden.....Bundy or Mendelson or their nominees

Chairpeople would also have to be organised for each occasion.

5) Publicity

ECC agreed to print 6 000 programmes, 4 000 of which would be used in a mailing list shoot. Other organisations would also be notified. Justin agreed to get an ECC mailing list together.

FEU would handle press releases on the 21st March. The letters for the mail shoot would be posted on the 27th March.

6) ECC Budget

b. Baxter Free Films

Slight alterations were also made to the proposed use of the Baxter "free" matinee slots. The position how is as follows:

Culloden (1 scr-ening)
The War Game (1 or 2 screenings)

The remaining two or three slots would be finalised at the next meeting after the ECQ had viewed a few more films. Thus, it was possible that not all of the WAR series would be used at the Baxter. Other possibilities included

- Eight Minutes to Midnight

All of these films would be matinees ($^{+}$ 3.30 - 4.00 pm).

ECC agreed to draw up a rought programme which FEU would take into consideration when drawing up the programme on the weekend of the 8th, 9th March.

Opening

A PHOTODOCUMENTARY EXHIBITION

"S.A. IN CONFLICT : PROTEST RESISTANCE AND POWER"

A photodocumentary exhibition organised by the End Conscription Committee will be on display at the Baxter from the 6 - 25 April. Photographers from around the country have been invited to submit work. It promises to be an exhibition of good quality and thought-provoking photographs.

The End Conscription Committee believes that it is crucial that we are exposed to the reality of everyday life for most black South Africans. This exhibition is especially important in a period when the government has seen fit to effectively put a ban on visual material depicting conflict situations in the townships.

ANTI-WAR FILM FESTIVAL COMPONENT (April 6 - 26)

The Film Education Unit in association with the End Conscription Committee have included an anti-war component to the 1986 Cape Town International Film Festival. These films will be screened from April 6 to April 26.

All matinee screenings at the Baxter and midday screenings at UCT WILL BE FOR FREE!

Included in an exciting international line-up are three films directed by controversial British director Pete Watkins - namely: PUNISHMENT PARK, THE WAR GAME and CULLODEN. Watkins is a director known for holding no punches in his incisive yet extremely critical approach to the subject of war.

Provocative films such as THE LINE (Robert Siegel) and STREAMERS (Robert Altman) should provide viewers with an interesting perspective on the plight of the individual soldier in the military context.

Canadian director Glyn Dyers' 7 PART DOCUMENTARY SERIES entitled WAR will be screened in its entirety on UCT main campus. A selection of this series will also be screened at the Baxter. Glyn Dyer, himself a former naval officer covers numerous aspects in the process of militarisation. This impecably researched series deals with nuclear war, the cold war, prossessional soldiers, basic training and peace movements.

Speakers have been invited to introduce films and to facilitate discussion. They have been chosen for their expertise in different areas and should provide an educational slant to the festival.

In presenting this component festival the End Conscription Committee and the Film Education Unit have chosen films that reflect the horrifying reality of war rather than its mythical glory. The End Conscription Committee feels that such a focus is particularly apposite in South Africa at present. It is a festival that should not be missed by critically minded and thinking Capetonians.
