heads of the tribe of the Barolong here in
Mafeking, I write to acknowledge you that
the Barolongs ~~were~~ were very happy about your
Mothaping's message as he had sent your
children.

The Barolongs want to go to England, but
they are still looking for the shoes to carry them.
Even the Tax-Collectors and the magistrates
had called them, so that they try to phone
either Cape Town or Johannesburg and ask the
rulers to let the Barolong go. The Barolong can't
go without government's permission.

We ~~still~~ can be happy if the Battahaping
could ^{so} also go to England, to go and talk for
themselves & ask England to stop the pressure
that is pressing them. All the Black nation of
South Africa are prepared to go. So if Mothaping
we fail this side, Sir ~~you~~ may ^{be} you will succeed;
than ~~we~~ don't all fail.

We believe we will succeed crossing
over-seas; but we will write you a letter as
soon as we hear from the Morolong, about the
results.

I stop with big salutations, and praying God
to bless you, and make you recover from your illness.
