Mr. CHARLES SYDNEY GOLDMANN was called. He said:—

I exceedingly regret having to say that the statement which I have in preparation is not complete for distribution, but I hope it will be to-morrow, in English as well as in Dutch.

I beg to respectfully state that I came to the Witwatersrand in the first month of 1888, and have more or less been on the Rand from that date. I have been connected in business associated with the mining industry from the date of my arrival. I have been connected with company work for a considerable time; I have been interested in the formation of gold-mining companies; I am chairman of 12 mining companies; I am a member of the Boards of numerous companies, including several dividend-paying companies and a good many producing companies; I have been connected with financing, and claim to have gained experience during my sojourn in England; I am a member of the Executive Council of the Chamber of Mines, and also a member of the Native Labour Association. I am the author of two issues of the history of these fields, and also the compiler of a map of the Witwatersrand and neighbouring groups of mines. I have been a witness of the prosperity as well as the vicissitudes of the industry. My firm is representing very considerable interests in this State, including interests in mining properties, as also real estate. I therefore submit to your kind

The post of Census-directorship was offered to Dr. A.J. Gregory, but he declined in the absence of some assurance from the Govt as to his official future in public health under Union. From a statistical standpoint it is unfortunate that Dr. Gregory was unable to see his way to accept the appointment, for his prolonged experience in such work and his special statistical attainments clearly marked him out as the one man in S. Africa especially fitted for it. From a public health standpoint, however, the profession & the public are thankful that Dr. Gregory did not take up the directorship of the Census, for had he done so he would have been shelved from public health work, & it is generally recognised that at the present critical juncture in the history of public health administration in South Africa he could not well be spared.

trator, singled him out. His claims were best shown by the history of the growth of Public Health administration in Cape Colony. Dr. Gregory had been twenty years in this service, first as assistant to Dr. Turner, then as Medical Officer of Health since 1891, before which Government did virtually nothing as to public health. There had been a gradual recognition of the importance of its administration, and there had been a gradual increase of the influence and powers of the Medical Officer of Health till in 1907, following the emphatic recommendations of the Civil Service Commission of 1906, a sub-department of public health, with the Medical Officer of Public Health as its administrative head, was created.

The most important steps in this forward progress were taken when Dr. Gregory was Medical Officer of Health, and the creation of the sub-department was the most eloquent tribute to Dr. Gregory as an organiser and administrator. He had successfully overcome the deep-rooted prejudice of Ministers and the laity generally, and shown that a medical man could be entrusted with administrative duties. Dr. Gregory had fought for the best form of Public Health administration, and finally gained it for the people of Cape Colony. With Union all this had gone by the board. Among the things that the public and the profession owed to Dr. Gregory were an effi-

cient organisation ready to meet any outbreak of infectious disease, and an office of competent subordinates through whom Dr. Gregory had influenced municipal bodies and other Boards throughout Cape Colony, and had greatly improved their sanitary measures. The laboratory and museum, with Dr. Robertson as the organiser, had been of immense assistance to medical men, and to Dr. Gregory's influence this was owing. Dr. Gregory was a strong man, and he had not chosen the paths of least resistance which would have brought him popularity. He had pursued undeviatingly what he considered best for the country, and therefore he had had collisions.
