Dear Mr. Rheinallt Jones,

- CONSTITUTION. -

Mr. Raleigh has asked me to acknowledge with thanks receipt of your letter of the 7th. and 8th. May, the latter of which only reached him this morning.

The Constitution Committee met yesterday and sat until past six o'clock by which time we had knocked our proposed Constitution into some sort of shape but had not touched P. O. & R.

We discussed your suggestion re the Constitutions which, however, did not commend itself to us as we thought the objects we all had in view could be achieved without such a complication.

We had no time to give to the consideration of the Pathfinder Scouts Constitution but I undertook in conjunction with Mr. McEwan to endeavour to evolve something and, if possible, have it ready to discuss with you when you return, that is the reason why I am answering your letters instead of Mr. Raleigh.

It seemed to the Committee that there were two methods of dealing with the Pathfinder Scout Constitution, the one to take the Constitution and P.O.& R. as eventually

- determined

determined for ourselves and make alterations wherever necessary to suit the needs and circumstances of Pathfinder Scouts, the idea being that all the Constitutions should be as much alike as possible. The other idea was to draw up an entirely separate Constitution and P. O. & R. for the Pathfinder Scouts and to be guided in doing so by the existing Pathfinders P.O.& R. I may say that my personal opinion is that the latter method is the better one for, while I am prepared to admit that there is something to be said for the desirability of having the Constitution and P. C. & R. of all sections as much alike as possible, I feel That there is a great deal in our P. O. & R. which is not required by your Organisation which seems to be much better suited by your existing Rules which strike me as being particularly clear, concise and suited to the needs of your people and which, moreover, as you pointed out, have the most desirable quality of elasticity.

It is therefore on these lines that I propose to get to work and I hope that by the time you return and are able to give some attention to the matter. Mr. McEwan and I will have evolved something which you will find useful.

I imagine that you will agree with my idea of starting with yourRules as a basis, rather than ours as at the last Pathfinder Council Meeting which I attended, the wish was expressed that your P. O. & R. should be altered as little as possible .

I do not think there is anything more I need say at the moment except to assure you that in spite of the wording of our draft Constitution, there was no idea

that any alterations would be made in the Pathfinder Scouts

Constitution and P. O. & R. which were not approved of by the

Pathfinder Council.

If you have any suggestions which you think will be helpful I should of course be very glad to receive them.

I know you must be very busy, however, and really do not think it is necessary for you to go to any great amount of trouble in the matter until you return.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Canon Woodfield and telling him that of course any suggestions he cares to make will be acceptable.
