- 1 - Second-hand GENERAL ELECTRIC Type 17-75 X-ray Unit for radiographic and fluoroscopic duty complete with Potter Bucky Curved Diaphragm, foot switch, and hand timer, and a new shockproof diagnostic DX Tube with shockproof H.V. cables and a new Type "B" Patterson Screen insert at the total price of £400.0.0.

DELIVERY: in approximately two months.

Before delivery the Model 17-75 X-ray Unit will be reconditioned electrically in our Workshop and the transformer modified for shockproof x-ray tubes.

The whole x-ray equipment, except vacuum and glass parts, will be covered by a one-year Guarantee.

All necessary operating instructions will be given to you after installation. We are also prepared to give you assistance and advice in the preparation and installation of the Photographic Darkroom.

To take full advantage of the output of the 17-75 X-ray Unit, which is 30 MA. at 85 Kv.p., or 5 MA. at 85 Kv.p. continuously, you should prepare prior to installation a single-phase electrical supply line capable of carrying a load of 25 amperes with a voltage drop less than 5%. The double-pole switch with fuses and an earth connection are to be prepared at your expense.




