Bearer of this letter is my son in law. He is staying home in th Nawedwe District. he occassionally comes to Durban to purchase goods from the M.al.Distributors, Durban vide the card enclosed. Last work of Fernesday when he was alighting from the bus he was arrested to police because he railed to produce evidence that he we been registered in Durban under the Influx Control Regulations. e st tes that he informed the police that he was not employed in Darban and that he was arriving that hour from outside of the City bound ries. The policy had him charged but the Court discharged him. He had been kept locked up in the police cells and goal for two nights before being brought before the Court.

After his discharge he went home. On the 29th this week he again came to the city for three specific reasons.

I. To visit his wife who had just given birth at king Edward

VIII Hospital taking the baby's clothes to her. 2. To purchase goods in the course of his business at home.

3. To apply for the duplicate of his lost driver's licence He had in his possession the receipt for the money he paid for the photos and the application form which he states he produced to the police.

He was arrested in Alice Street while he was about entering the wholesele shop. He was taken to the Charge Office and locked up for the might. This morning he was asked to choose between being sent to go I to be detained there or accept an offer to be recruited to go and work in the sugar plantation.

where he left his heft and to the Lazarus Native Labour Organisatio where he left his Reference Book and given this note that he has

in his possession.

I am sending this native to report this to you because what he been done to him seems to be bad practice by the Police if what he states is correct. The practice of arresting a tives who alights from the buses creates unpleasantness. It is not provided in the laws that before one visits an urban area one must make an application and be in possession of an invada as. It is only when he is inside an urban area that one has to make application to be registered. The native police do not discriminate between new arrivals and the loafers. The case of this native who is well nown to me is a tipical example of a great hardship that is suffered by many natives. They are arrested early mornings and kept in one centre for hours before they are collected by the vans to the charge offices. In the charge offices it is alleged that they inder go great hardships. He usually spends two nights before he is taken before the Court.

his notives wishes to concel his offer for work as he will explain to you. He made this offer in order to save himself from the repetition of being kert for two das before he came before the court and this time he wanted to see his wife who was in hospital. is joining was not volontarily but forced upon him by the police who appear to be assisting the farmers tom get native labourers. I bring this specific case of hardship before you I ask you to have it investigated and have this native released from Lagrus Native Labour Organisation.
