of Molopo River, leaving a strip of land on the West part
known as the Barolong Reserve, which now is called
Crown Land which name is now known to how it came to
be attached to that part of the country?

Please refer to correspondence Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4 which are self-explanatory. Get all the advice you can from Imperial authorities and see to it if that part of the country know as the Crown Reserve can be required by the Barolong under the old name Barolong Reserve.
