



Dear Hilda + Rusty

At 4.30pm on the 17th of August, 1982, Ruth, relaxed, happy and waiting to share a farewell toast to a departing colleague, was killed instantly opening a

Pretoria-prepared parcel bomb.

Why did they do it? Why was she, who had nothing to do with the planning or implementation of armed activities, chosen as the target of their killing machine? The answer is crystal-clear. Her boundless energy and intellectual productivity in opposition to racist savagery posed a threat to them which was no less sharp than a whole arsenal of weapons. And, in keeping with their past, they acted in the only way fascist thugs know: if you cannot deal with an idea—kill it.

You were among the thousands from every part of the world who remembered Ruth, and the cause for which she lived and died, with warmth and admiration. Your words of support and condolence made it less hard for Tilly, Shawn, Gillian

Robyn and me to bear in our terrible sadness. Thank you.

Those who wrote to us knew Ruth (or of her) in a variety of different settings; as journalist, author, teacher, researcher, public campaigner, political activist, or just as a warm and generous friend. We want to give you something of the flavour of the responses which Ruth evoked in her lifetime and we have selected, almost at random, extracts from just a few of the messages and letters which reached us, and the tributes paid at memorial services.

During the 33 years of our married life Ruth and I enjoyed a warm companionship and stimulating mutuality. It was not without its moments of contest which sometimes perturbed those of our acquaintances who were not yet aware of the chemistry of our relationship. Ruth expressed well an aspect of our spirited comradeship in a letter during one of our unavoidable separations: 'Oh for a

good row in close proximity.'

For me there is no measure to gauge her loss. She was a lady of style and elegance both in wit and vanity. She was a comrade whose intolerance of hypocrisy, inefficiency and humbug won her the respect even of those who were discomforted by the razor-sharpness of her thrusts. She was a friend and companion with a rich, albeit private, passion. She had the extraordinary capacity to postpone the traumas of work-conflict and relax with us and with friends in private and social situations. She had moments of complete intensity and engagement in a piece of argumentation and could quickly dissolve in laughter.

Ruth devoted her considerable talents to the cause of a liberated and nonracist South Africa. Inside the country news of her murder brought many colleagues and friends together, mostly in secret tribute. In Soweto, the cradle of our revolution, the regime illegalised the planned memorial service. But one thing is certain: the time is approaching in our country when those who rule through torture and killing will be thrown on to the rubbish heap of history, and when the lives of people like Ruth will be celebrated openly in freedom and joy.

If you care about the ideals and beliefs for which they destroyed her, then do all you can to bring that day nearer.

It serves only to reinforce our determination and deepen our obligation to destroy the apartheid system, liberate ourselves and our country, and bring peace to all people of Southern Africa.

In the pursuit of this historic objective, the African National Congress and its allies, the broad masses of the people of South Africa, will not betray Comrade Ruth First and other martyrs of our revolutionary struggle. In the meantime, let it be placed on record that Pretoria's crimes against our people cannot and will not go unpunished.

In the name of all our leaders, members and people I wish once again to express our sincere condolences to the bereaved family, particularly Mother Tillie First, the children and our colleague and comrade, Joe Slovo.

She was a woman who did not mould herself to fit, did not accept the convenience of ready-made ideas or the imposition of models. That was her great revolutionary role, to disturb when necessary. We had struggles that were salutary ... because it was through this confrontation of ideas, through dialogue, through deepened debate that she carried out her role as a teacher.

She did not reserve Marxism with capital letters for official displays, she used

Marxism in her daily life.

We had the privilege to have had her work with us when her capacities were developed to their fullest, at the peak of her intellectual life. We are happy she found a place of work in which she could combine her revolutionary activity as a member of a liberation movement with the activity of a revolutionary intellectual. We are grateful because she trained a generation of investigators in our university who cannot deviate from the path she opened for us. She worked with us, side by side. She brought us an experience of her revolutionary practice, she brought that which was the culmination of her intellectual career and put it at the service of the Mozambican revolution and the service of Southern African liberation.

We salute Ruth First and those ANC comrades for the solidarity that their presence here demonstrates. The enemy could not bear those lacerating wounds inflicted through the open, lucid criticism proffered by Ruth First and the other intellectuals with whom she worked at the university. It disturbed them perhaps more than other actions of struggle because it exposed the exact nature of the oppressive apartheid regime, and left them troubled.

Our enemy is a barbarous one, we must be ready to face this enemy. Ruth First's assassination will not be the last of its attacks in Mozambique.

Ruth First's life was essentially a political act; as her death was a political act of a hideously different kind. She would have wanted our celebration of her life and our grief and rage at her murder to be a political act. And it will be. For if her murderers had as their motive to intimidate or dismay us, then they must be even madder than we supposed. Let them be in no doubt. Those of us who were falling asleep are now awake; those of us who had grown fired are vigorous again; those of us who have been leading separately our own lives are aware once more of where our lives collectively should lead. The revolutionary movement, to which Ruth gave her life, will find in us only a reinforcement of purpose, of resources, and of effort.

It is right that in remembering Ruth here we should remember all the other victims, known and unknown to us, of South Africa's institutionalised terrorism. Ruth would have been the very last person to expect her own sacrifice to be regarded as unique. But those who knew and loved her must hope that she will be remembered also for herself, as a person of exceptional qualities.

Ruth was an intellectual: though she would doubtless have agitatedly dismissed the term as an attempt to limit her with a label. I intend no such limit. And I know of no higher praise than to say of someone that she loved ideas: because she was always wanting to learn, to examine new insights, to extend her understanding. Inevitably, those ideas that mattered to her most, that she made her own, were those that were instruments in the liberation of people and personality. They came, in general, from the rich store of revolutionary socialist thought. But she did not take them as from some rack of the ready-to-wear. She was always looking at them by the light of new events and perceptions, to reinforce or augment them. Drawn to the cause of women's liberation, she saw it not as a diversion from her revolutionary socialist commitment, but as a necessary enlargement of it. And she wrote, with Ann Scott, that milestone biography of Olive Schreiner.

She was confident and commanding on the platform and in print, but shy and uncertain in private when meeting people she did not know. She was a person of profound culture and she worried about the books she had not read, the pictures she had not seen. She had an abundant capacity for friendship. She was warm and sensitive and generous and always unswervingly loyal. She was an intellectual adventure. And she was such fun. I admired her for what she did. And I loved her for what she was. I know that I will feel the loss of her to the last moment of my life.

Her death leaves a gap that will not easily be filled either in the world of academic learning or of revolutionary action. She was murdered because of her outstanding contributions in both fields and her lifelong struggle against racism, national oppression and class exploitation.

Ruth lives on in her books, in the organisations which she helped to build, and in the students and comrades whom she inspired. The enemy killed her because of her great prestige at home and in the progressive movement outside. She died on the battlefield as surely as those whom the enemy has killed inside the country and abroad.

No public demonstration in honour of Ruth was allowed in South Africa. The

Workers Support Committee called a mass protest meeting to be held in the Methodist Youth Centre in Western Jabavu, but the magistrate banned the meeting outright, saying that it would threaten the public peace. Not satisfied with murder, the regime wanted to erase Ruth's memory from the people.

Her achievements will live on in spite of persecution. They are part of our national heritage and will continue to be so in years to come before and after Independence.

As colleagues and friends of Ruth First and teachers at the University of Durham, we were appalled by the news of her assassination in Mozambique, and by the involvement of the South African Secret Service in this act, as reported in *The Guardian*.

Ruth's crime was to be an excellent scholar and academic. Her work at the Centre of African Studies in Maputo was widely respected and was bringing much-needed publicity to the conditions experienced by migrant Mozambique workers in the gold mines of South Africa. The work followed on from years of committed scholarship based upon Africa as a whole; work

which was dedicated to exposing the many ways in which violence and repression was used against the people of that continent, and the inhuman conditions suffered by many of them. For this, for the accuracy and perception of her exposures, she was killed.

The work at the Centre for African Studies was a central part of Mozambique's attempt to establish itself as a viable, independent entity. Ruth's commitment to the Centre was enormous and was but one example of her belief in both the practical importance of research and knowledge and the necessary political and moral responsibilities of intellectuals to be involved in the processes they write about.

Ruth will be sadly missed—and in many parts of the world. But the work she valued will not come to an end. The hope must be that her assassination will be remembered by others as an obligation to ensure that her particular type of intellectual scholarship and commitment continues.

I have been thinking of you all so much, especially the three of you to whom Ruth was a mother-since I know what it means to lose a mother, and because our mothers were friends. I will never forget how supportive and kind Ruth was to me when Hilary died. It was the time that I felt closest to her. She held the memorial meeting at Lyme Street. and knew exactly how to handle it. She spoke about things others ignored: funny things, characteristic things, And she talked to me a little bit about her feelings for her own mother, it was strange, communicating across the generations, drawing three generations of women together.

The liberation struggle and the solidarity movement won't die because Ruth died; and yet she was an irreplaceable loss. I mourn her very much. I have thought about it constantly since I heard the news; it has cast a shadow over my life, and I feel as if it will be a long time before I can really laugh at anything again. When I woke up the morning afterwards, and often during the night, it was like waking through a fog of pain, before I was fully conscious of what it was: Ruth had been assassinated

Still, today, it's hard to believe that it's true. Because of the power of her personality, Ruth seemed indestructible; how could those bastards ever get the better of her? But then, they killed her because they couldn't, and still they haven't. They took her life, and nothing can compensate for that; but they haven't destroyed her.

A death like Ruth's can never truly

be revenged, because the deaths of all of her murderers wouldn't weigh enough by comparison. But she will remain alive in the hearts of those who loved and admired her.

I wonder how it feels to share such an intense and private grief with so many people. I imagine that it is sometimes a comfort, sometimes alienating. Funeral in Maputo~ AIM Report

A Book of Condolences was opened at Eduardo Mondlane University in memory of Ruth First. The book, on a modest table which also carries a portrait of Ruth and a vase of flowers, is at the entrance to her workplace, the Centre of African Studies, where she had held the post of Director of Research.

A few metres away the gaping hole gouged by the blast in the wall of Ruth's office can be seen. The first person to sign the book was Fernando Ganhao, the Rector of the University, who is also a member of the Standing Commission of Mozambique's Parliament, the People's Assembly.

Some 3,000 mourners, from dozens of different nationalities, paid their last respects on the morning of August 23rd to Ruth First. Six pall bearers from the African National Congress carried her coffin, over which an ANC flag was draped, into Maputo's Llanguene Cemetery. Behind them walked Ruth's husband, Joe Slovo, her mother, Tilly, and her three daughters, Shawn, Gillian and Robyn.

She was laid to rest beside the thirteen graves of the ANC members murdered

at Matola in the South African commando raid of January, 1981.

Most members of the Mozambican Government and of the Frelimo Party Standing Political Committee attended the funeral, as did many members of the diplomatic corps accredited in Maputo. Several buses brought hundreds of workers and students to the cemetery. Representatives of almost all the groups of foreign workers resident in Maputo also attended.

Marcelino dos Santos spoke at the funeral on behalf of the Frelimo Central Committee. Ruth First had been assassinated by apartheid, 'he said. She had 'fallen as a militant of the ANC, of a people struggling to create a free South Africa, a country for all, a country without tribes or Bantustans, without blacks, whites, coloureds and Indians, a country of South Africans. Apartheid cannot bear freedom and equality, hence the South African regime hated and feared the example of the People's Republic of Mozambique and our alternative vision of civilisation and culture. Because of this apartheid attacks us.'

The ANC's struggle to liberate South Africa was 'increasingly bringing our two peoples together. Ruth First, in practice, was strengthening that unity between the Mozambican and South African peoples.' The Frelimo Central Committee would not be turned aside from the battle 'to build a strong socialism in Mozambique. No bomb, no threat, will make us drop our support for the ANC and for the people of South Africa' he said.

The main funeral eulogy was read by Moses Mabhida, General Secretary of the South African Communist Party. 'Ruth was yet another victim of the apartheid regime's terror campaign.' He cited previous murders carried out by the South

African regime against opponents living abroad over the previous two years—the killing of the 13 ANC militants at Matola, the deaths of Joe Gqabi in Zimbabwe and Petrus and Jabu Nyaose in Swaziland. The aim of such murders was 'to silence and intimidate all those who opposed apartheid. Ruth was singled out because of the work she was doing strengthen the unity between the peoples of South Africa and Mozambique, and indeed all the peoples of Southern Africa.'

Moses Mabhida gave a brief political biography of Ruth. Her commitment, he said, had begun 40 years ago when, as a young student, she had joined the Young Communist League. While still a student she joined the Communist Party itself, of which she remained a member throughout her life. She threw herself into the mass struggles of the 1940s, 'taking part in all the great debates of that time, and establishing lasting relationships with militants of the ANC.' He praised Ruth's courageous journalism on the newspaper The Guardian, banned and continually reappearing under other names. 'It was through the pages of The Guardian that our people's leaders—Nelson Mandela, Oliver Tambo and many others—became known throughout the country. In her writings Ruth fought for the unshakeable unity of revolutionary theory and revolutionary practice. She left behind her a solid body of work that cannot be destroyed by any number of bombs.'

Surveying the grave waiting to receive Ruth's coffin, and the graves of those killed at Matola Moses Mabhida promised that 'one day, in the not too distant future, the bodies of all those who have fallen will be returned to a free South Africa.'

Ruth's coffin was then lowered into her grave as an ANC choir sang *The Red Flag* and songs of the ANC's armed wing. Umkhonto we Sizwe.

Ruth's family, followed by the members of the Frelimo Political Committee and of the Mozambican Government present, then scattered flowers and earth into the grave One by one the mourners filed past the grave, each dropping a handful of earth on to the coffin.
