

I still request to see the Board of the Commission appointed bu the Department of Native Affairs to centrol our Spiritual Body as Sir . That the occasion which especially ca..ed for viligant and active exertions, constituted a full and perfect justification of the proceedings in question. The attempt to allow the introduction of the European Churches version of the Scriptures into the nemal church , which it waa proposed to establish and support by a faith of Nation will. Could not but appear iminently calculated to afford facilities and means for the countenance and propagation of thecorrupt and tyrannical system of Popery, highly detrimental to the best interests of this country, the security of the Protestant faith and the Spiritual welfare of the Community at large, particularly of its children and youth. Besides as several parts of the proposed measure had a directly religious bearing and tendency, deeply affecting our body , in common with all other Protestant Churches, of Natives it was impreative on our regularly constituted authorities , to pursue such a course as might nost promptly and effectually call forth the united efforts of ggaraignxagetxthesexxxxxxxxxtricanxministers the African connexion to defeat a project afxthaxAfricanxx so fraught with danger. 
