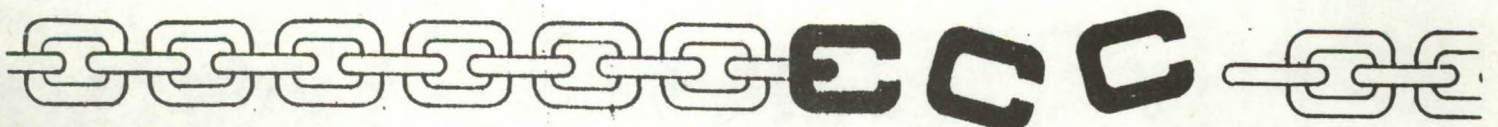

- X Above all, you are not breaking the law. Gatherings with a common purpose are banned in most areas but you are not part of a gathering; you are a lone demonstrator and not breaking the law.
- X The police may however intervene.  
Just as the airways gives you an oxygen mask in the unlikely event of depressurisation, these notes will equip you to deal with the police if they should arrive.  
Under the security laws:
- X The police can detain without charge; that is the very issue you are demonstrating about. BUT that is not what they will be doing when they approach you.
- X If the police arrive :  
    remain calm, you are behaving legally, do not get sidetracked into a slanging match.  
    they can ask your name and address; give it but they cannot question you.  
Ask the policeman his name and number. There is no obligation to go with the police to a police station or anywhere else unless you are being arrested for a specified offence, or detained under a specific security law, if this is suggested -  
Ask if you are under arrest. If so, under what law and for what offence?  
    (Don't suggest the Security laws - assume it can only be an arrest in the ordinary sense) - if it is an arrest -  
Accompany the police to the station to be formally charged.  
You are not obliged to say anything.  
You are ordinarily entitled to bail.  
You are definitely entitled to see your lawyer and family  
Usually . . . the offence they have in mind is a petty one, you should be released on warning.  
The police have no right to hold you for 48 hours, before charging you.  
They must charge you as quickly as they can.  
The law obliges them to charge you within 48 hours. It does not give them a right to hold you for 48 hours.  
And while waiting to be charged and released on warning or bailed out you cannot be denied access to a lawyer and your family.
- X However, if they insist on acting illegally and threaten you go under protest with the police
- X Insist on your rights.
- X The police may tell you that you are obstructing traffic - vehicles, or pedestrians.
- X Make sure you are not.
- X Ask where you can stand and move there if its reasonable to do so.
- X Suggest the alternative place yourself if there is any cause for complaint by the police.
- X- If you are obstructing you can be arrested for doing so BUT  
It is a petty offence. Point out that it's unusual to arrest for petty traffic offences if you are not obstructing.  
Don't pay an admission - rather get bail. Get out of that police station. Get your Lawyer. Let's sue them if we can.
- X You are demonstrating to assert that the law must follow its proper course - if you have a brush with the police a firm assertion of your rights will help other demonstrators.

Values Clarification Exercises.

B.L.11

1. You have just finished picketing on campus against SADF raids into neighbouring countries when you are approached by a fellow student who asks you "What about Umkhonto we Sizwe"
  - do you ignore her and carry on walking
  - do you enter into some discussion about the value of a just war in certain circumstances
  - do you say "I do not want to talk about it."
  - do you say "I believe that all war is wrong"
  
2. You are in town and are stopped from crossing the road because there is a huge military parade going through town. Most of the soldiers are young men who were most likely at school with you last year. When you look at the soldiers marching what do you feel?
  - anger ; pity ; ashamed;
  
3. You live in Kew right on the edge of Alexandra. One Sunday morning you go jogging and are passed by about 5 casspirs on their way into the township. As they ride past what do you do :
  - carry on jogging
  - shout abuses and show some signs
  - stand in silence for a minute
  - immediately go off to your local activist group and organise some action and press release
  
4. You are in the park when you see two people, a man and a woman beating each other up. ~~The man is armed with~~. They are kicking, hitting and pulling at each other. You decide to move in a little closer to see what you can do and notice that the man is armed. Do you :
  - walk quietly away
  - quickly go and look for someone else in the park to assist you
  - scream and shout at them to leave each other alone
  - grab a stick and start pounding the man
  - push yourself between the two of them and try to talk to either one of them

5. You are in Hillbrow Checkers when you see one of the young children who live in the streets pickpocket one of the customers. What do you do.
- just carry on shopping
  - alert the customer and the management of the incident
  - wink at the child and give him a thumbs up sign
  - wait for him outside and ask him why he does that and suggest that he gives the wallet back
6. You are in the USA on a speaking tour as a group of progressive students. You have very limited time and have been given a list of organizations to contact. Out of a list of 10 you can only choose 6. Which ones will you choose?
- The Quakers ; Central American Refugee Movement ; Young Social Democrats OF USA
  - The American Committee on Africa ; Anarchists for Peace and Revolution;
  - Coalition for a Free S.A. and Namibia ; The Green Earth Coalition; SANE ;
  - The Confederationalists ; the United Nations.
7. You are one of a family of 5 children. The family has always been close and on the whole made joint decisions. Your youngest sister of 18 years decides that there is no future for her in S.A. and wants to leave to go to Paris to become a model. You have a family conference where you :
- tell her that she is a sell out and should stay here
  - keep quiet because you do not want to influence her decision in any way
  - offer to help her as long as she can do some solidarity work when she gets there
  - listen to her arguments about why she wants to go and then try and put forward your views on why she should stay.
8. A very good friend of yours confides in you that he wants to commit suicide. He says that he has thought about it for quite a while and that he has worked out a successful way of doing it. He does not want any help or pity and does not want you to tell anyone but just wants you to understand why he is doing it.
- you leave it at that
  - you go to a professional counsellor to ask him/her what you should do
  - you start crying and ask them to please seek professional help
  - you laugh nervously and say that he must not be silly.

Roleplay Scenarios.

1. A national serviceman approaches you because he does not want to go into the townships and he says that he would rather go to the border because that is where the enemy is.

2. You are a student at RAU university and have just joined the local ECC branch. One of the first things that gets set up is a counselling service for students. A few weeks later you get a call up to serve in the local unit of your campus during the JULY vac. You go to the counselling service for advice.

3. The mother of a young conscript ( he has just registered at his school) approaches you about her son going into the army. She fears for his life and does not want him to go into the army when he matriculates. She wants you to advise him to go to university first.

4. You are a masters student at Wits university and are entering your third year when you receive a call up for the February intake. You approach your tutor and head of department to ask them to write a letter in support of another deferrment. They both refuse to help you out. You go to the campus advice bureau.

~~5.~~ A national serviceman who is on AWOL wants to register at the University as a first year student. He approaches you to try and get him through the process without too much attention.

6. A final year student has decided that he can not go into the army and is quite sure that he wants to object. However he does not if he will satisfy the demands of the Religious Board and wants some help in deciding whether or not he applies to the Board or if he takes the 6 year option in jail.



FINANCIAL GUIDELINES: JOHANNESBURG REGION

1. All monies recieved from whatever source, ie. fundraising, media sales, national account, will be receipted and the total deposited in the bank. Thus no accounts should be paid from cash recieved.
2. All accounts shall be paid by cheque. If someone has an account to be paid, a receipt or invoice must be given to the Treasurer who will then make out a cheque.
3. As the Media group deals with a lot of media stock, they need to keep independant track of media sales. If you are given media to sell, you will also be given an invoice; you are then responsible for the stock you have been given. All monies recieved from such sales must be dealt with by the person responsible in the media group only, and not by the Treasurer.
4. If large amounts are needed for payment (over R 300,00), the Treasurer must be given a weeks notice to ensure the neccessary funds are available for such payments.
5. If a sub-group has a project in mind that will require extensive funding eg. the book of Afrikaans contributions, the group concerned must approach the exec. with a budget, to ensure the funds are available for such projects.
6. In order to raise our local fundraising we would like to introduce a system of subscriptions for;
  - 6.1 The newsletter; Minimum rate, R ,00/annum. Donations above this would be very welcome.
  - 6.2 Individual membership fee; Minimum, R ,00/annum.
  - 6.3 Member Organisation Fee: Minimum, R ,00/annum.Regarding 6.2 & 6.3 these shall be payable by May 31 in any calender year.
