siege, dominated by armoured cars and armed men.' He said that he had gained that impression during a two-hour visit to Cato Manor on the afternoon before he gave his evidence.

He continued to say that the pass laws and liquor laws were unpopular with the people of Cato Manor. The fact that the police had to enforce unpopular laws, he said, had some bearing on the unpopularity of the

police in the township.

Giving his impressions on his visit to the area, Mr. Shum said that after extensive inspection of the area, he found that conditions had definitely deteriorated. He felt that was partly due to natural degeneration through the lack of upkeep. He did not think the City Council had much money to spend in the area since its initial expenditure some years ago. The area, he said, appeared more crowded than when he was last there there.

Some of the accused gave evidence in their defence and at the end of the defence case, the long legal

process of argument by both counsel began.
On December 12, Mr. Justice James began reading his 200-paged judgement. He began by discharging eight of the accused — Mbalekelwa Colenso Zuma, Mabote Edwin Mohlomi, Mzikayise Johannes Cale, Siphiwo George Ndhlovu, Mphindelwa Joseph Ndhlovu and three juveniles.

Important improvements have been made in the past nine years and considerable sums have been spent on tarred roads, street lighting, an adequate supply of pure water, ablution blocks with water-borne sewerage and washing facilities, rubbish removal and improved bus services.

The others were sentenced to varying terms of imprisonment.

Some of them took off their shirts and handed them to friends who stood in the public gallery to have a last look at the condemned and imprisoned men.
