



LORABETTER LLEE

The Freedom Charter is a live document - the testimony of the people of South Africa to be free. It is a fighting document - the charter of the struggle for freedom. It embraces and co-ordinates all the struggles of the people. Springing from the demands of the people, it contains their deepest aspirations; is the picture of the South Africa they want. No single aspect of the struggle for freedom has been left out. Every campaign waged by the people against oppression and exploitation has its place in the Charter. And for the Charter to have meaning, it must be related to the day-to-day struggles of the people.

THERE SHALL BE HOUSES, SECURITY AND COMFORT:

This section of the Charter brings to mind the grim housing conditions under which we live - the shantytowns of Morka, Jabavu, etc., the slums of Vrededorp, District Six, Tsolo, Cato Manor, etc; the blind hovels on the farms and the shacks along railway lines -- the breeding spots for disease, crime and despair.

"Slums shall be demolished, and new suburbs built where all have transport, roads, lighting, playing fields, creches and social centres;"

These words of the Charte tell of the homeless ess of most of the people; of the rowded conditions;

of people living like animals on mountain slopes; of forced removals from their homes on to bare veld; of fraudulent schemes like the "site-and-service"; of removals of people from their lands because of their colour.

"All people shall have the right to live where they choose, to be decently housed, and to bring up their families in comfort and security;"
"Unused housing space shall be made available to the people;"

The system under which people are forced by Government and Municipal laws to live surrounded by barbed wire; under which people are not permitted to visit relatives or friends without a permit; is a criminal injustice against human dignity.

"Fenced locations and ghottess shall be abolished and laws which break up families shall be repealed."

Insecurity haunts the lives of most of our people, particularly the non-Europeans. Rising rents soaring food prices, unemployment... these things make life one long struggle for existence. The future is uncertain; police break into hores; chiliren are torn away for their parents; the people ork hard for little pay and contains,

For a Better Life: (Contd.)

labourers have been beaten to death by cruel farmers. The position of the old and the disabled is pitiful. Old-age pensions are a mockery, casily withdrawn at the whim of a government official. The disabled are reduced to begging. Ours are the knock-kneed, pot-bellied, hungry children who perish in the squalor and poverty. The land grows enough food to feed everyone; the people work - but they starve.

"Rent and prices shall be lowered, food plentiful and no one shall go hungry!"
"The aged, the orphans, the disabled and the sick shall be cared for by the state;"

Medical services are inadequate. There are far too few hospitals and clinics. In the country areas there is often no medical assistance of any kind for miles and miles. Expectant mothers stand for hours waiting to be attended to; patients are discharged before their time to make room for others; paitents sleep on floors because of the shortage of beds.

"Free Medical Care and Hospitalisation shall be provided for all with special care for mothers and young children!"

Rest leisure and recreation are denied the majority of the people. Parks and playing fields are mostly for Europeans only. Social centres are few, and sport is almost exclusively the right of Europeans. Ours are the children who roam the streets for nothing better to do for the absence of youth clubs and recreational centres.

"Rest, leisure and recreation shall be the right of all!"

All these are empty declarations if they remain on paper. The message of struggle must be taken to the people; the people must know of the awakening of which they are part; the people must see themselves in the Charter, and in the Charter must strive to realise their wishes. The people are strong. The people are invincible. The Charter must be taken to everyone. It must be made known. A million signatures must be collected before June 26th, 1956.

The Congress of the People, the most representative gathering of South African people ever held in this country, is over - and June 25th and 26th will go down in our history as the time when people of all races - African, White, Coloured and Indian - came together to draw up a Freedom Charter - a Charter for a peaceful and happy life for all South Africans.

But, as has been pointed out in Mr. Hutchinson's leading article, the Charter without the support of the people of South Africa remains nothing but a string of beautiful words.

For this reason the Consultative Committee of the A.N.C., T.I.C. C.O.D. & S.A.C.P. Gecided to launch a campaign for 1 million signatures in support of the Charter.

OUR PRESENT TASK.

And this is our present task - to speak to our workmates, neighbours and friends about the Charter, and to get them to show their support for it by signing it.

STRENGTHEN This is the way to strengthen our Congresses - whichever one CONGRESSES we belong to - whether it be the African National Congress, the Transvaal Indian Congress, the Congress of Democrats or the S.A. Coloured Peoples' Organisation. We must encourage people not merely to sign the Charter, but to join their Congress and become active members of it.

Every struggle of the people - whether it be against the Bantu Education Act, the Senate Bill, the Population Registration Bill, demands for better working conditions - all these things have their place in the Charter.

The target for the Transvaal is 100,000 by the 1st January, as part of the final target of 1 million by June 1956.


The Transvaal Consultative Committee has added its strongest protest against the savage sentence of 18 months imprisonment imposed on the Congress leader, John Alwyn.

HIS "CRIME" Alvyn's "crime" was to advocate the defiance of unjust laws during the Defiance Campaign of 1952. For such "statutory" communist, Congress leaders in other areas were given suspended sentences,

at the time.

With Alwyn however, the Department of Justice did not see fit to prosecute for 2 years, and when it finally did, the Magistrate treated him with the utmost harshness.

The injustice John Alwyn has suffered will not be forgotten by the people. It adds another bitter pill to the many which they are not prepared to stomach.

1,000,000 SIGHATURES FOR THE CHARTER = 1,000,000 CORSESS SUPPORTERS

The Freedom Charter was adopted by the Congress of the People at Kliptown on June 26th, 1955. It was unanimously acclaimed by that great assembly as voicing the just demands of the people of South Africa for Land, Liberty and Peace.

The Joint Executives of the four Congresses have endorsed the Freedom Charter. So have the Transvaal A.N.C.. at their Conference; SACTU, and the Womens' League.

The National Congress
Consultative Committee
has launched a drive for
one million signatures for the
Freedom Charter. This campaign
is not a separate campaign. It
is the Congress answer to
apartheid oppression. When we
fight an issue we put forward
the Freedom Charter as our
alternative.

All Congress branches should, therefore, immediately undertake the following:-

- 1) Obtain copies of the Charter in all the languages of the people. Every Congressman should have a Freedom Charter in his house.
- 2) Read the Freedom Charter at Branch meetings.
- 3) Request speakers and propaganda material from the Provincial Congress Consultative Committee.
- 4) Learn the contents of the Freedom Charter so as to be able to repeat any section of it as the occasion demands.
- 5) Discuss the Freedom Charter on every possible occasion.
- 6) Translate the Charter into local terms. For example, in Evaton the A.N.C. must rally and lead the people in the bus boycott by showing them the prospects which the Freedom Charter opens to them. The Indian Congress must fight the Group Areas Act by rallying support for the ideals of the Freedom Charter. Coloured people must defend their rights and liberties as they are set out in the Freedom Charter. The Congress of Democrats must reply to the United Party's bankrupt policy with the Freedom Charter.

But above all else, the completeness and integrity of the Freedom Charter must be translated into the daily Congress activities. Each particular daily task, and every small event, must be put into its true perspective in the liberatory struggle by conscious reference to the terms of the Freedom Charter. This will train us to be integrated in our outlook, consistent and courageous in our work, and will prevent isolationism.

- 7) Begin explaining the Charter to the people in the area house by house, block by block.
- 8) Win signatures for the Charter.

 Ask people to indicate their approval by signing the Freedom Charter. This of course does not make them members of Congress; but it does make them Congress supporters. These are the people who must be persuaded of the necessity of joining the Congress movement and so helping in the realisation of the Freedom Charter.
- 9) Return full signature forms to the office and ask for more forms.

The Transvaal has been allocated the task of collecting 100,000 signatures by the New Year. We have collected 2,000 already. That means 98,000 left - and 40 days to get them!

We need 2,500 signatures a day. Each Congressman must, therefore, win 10 signatures EVERY day of the week and 20 on SUNDAY. We can, and must, reach our target.

C.O.D.: Hillbrow has had 2 tables at busy street corners, and Belle-vue 1. Hundreds of people signed.

There will be a national day for collecting signatures in the first week of December.



SECTION 6... "ALL SHALL ENJOY EQUAL HUMAN RIGHTS"

At the United Nations today, the representatives of the Governments of the whole world are appealing to the Government of South Africa to restore to the people their legitimate human rights.

For that matter, the vast majority of the people in South Africa have never enjoyed their full rights - the fundamental democratic right to vote for the people who govern them has always been denied to the majority of South Africa's population.

And today, even that sham of democratic government is in danger of being lost. The new, enlarged Senate means that the Nationalists have a completely free hand in Parliament, and what opposition there is will become completely ineffective. By a joint sitting of the House of Assembly and the Senate, the Nationalist Party will have an overwhelming majority and can introduce whatever devilish legislation they may choose to.

The Law shall guarantee to all their right to speak, to organise, to publish, to preach, to worship Our people cannot organise themselves so that they can speak with one voice against injustice and declare what it is they desire for themselves and their children lest the government let loose amongst them the terror of armed police. The Government has tried by the most ruthless means to prevent the people from voicing their opinion and organising to improve their conditions. Over the past 3 years scores of our leaders have been "banned" - banned from being members of and participating in the activities of a formidably long list of organisations.

Trade Union secretaries
have been ordered by the Government to leave their jobs, their
livelihood. People have been
banished to isolated parts of

the country, and forbidden to move out of those areas. Public meetings have been swooped on by members of the C.I.D. and on several occasions armed police, and the names and addresses of all people present taken - together, in many cases, with personal property.

Over the past few years several newspapers - The Guardian, The Clarion, Advance and several others - have been banned.

The right of our children to education has never been recognised by those who govern our country. Our children are either condemned to ignorance and poverty, or to the poison of Bantu Education, which has been devised to teach African children how to become willing slaves. And yet Education is compulsory and free for all European children.

OUR WOMEN ON THE MARCH

October 27th was another landmark in South African history. For the first time, women of all races filled the arena at Union Buildings, Pretoria - some in tribal costume, some in modern clothes, - but all with one idea - TO WIN FREEDOM IN OUR LIFETIME!

They were hindered in every possible way - refused permission for the special buses which were to take them to Union Buildings; refused permission to see the Cabinet Ministers, or to hold a meeting - refused tickets on the trains to Pretoria - but still they came, singly and in groups, spurred on by their determination to achieve their just demands.

The privacy of the house from
police raids shall be protected
by law:

Every other day we hear of our people being dragged from their beds in the middle of the night by armed police, searching for liquor or a dozen other things. The C.I.D. now have the authority to seize, without even a warrant, publications which they consider might be "treasonable"!

All shall be free to travel without restriction from countryside to town, from province to province, and from South Africa abroad;

In the land of our birth we have not the right to travel freely from one part of the country to another within its borders. We must carry on us a number of "passes', "permits", "identification cards" and dozens of other scraps of paper.

... We cannot even come to a town to look for work without a permit, we cannot be out of doors after 9 o'clock without a special pass,

More and more people of all shades of political opinion, and of all races, are being refused passports to travel overseas by the arbitrary decision of the Minister of Internal Affairs, and to travel without one is now a punishable offence.

Pass Laws, Permits and all other laws restricting these freedoms shall be abolished.

Today the pass laws have been extended to children, to womenfolk, and to Coloured people and Europeans (by means of identification cards). Daily our people are being humiliated, their families are being broken up, because of the operation of these Pass Laws.

Our people are being deprived of their means of livelihood through the heartlessness of the makers of the Group Areas Act.

Our Government is turning a deaf ear to the pleading of the peoples of the world. But the PEOPLE OF SOUTH AFRICA HAVE RESOLVED AND WILL ENSURE THAT "ALL SHALL ENJOY EQUAL HUMAN

The brilliant sun plays on a bright yellow poster, proclaiming the dearest wishes of our people. Two cheerful ladies standing at a table call on passers by to add their names to the list of citizens who heartily approve of the Freedom Charter.

These two Congresswomen are exercising the democratic right of organising the people to work for their concept of a better life. But it is not to be - where do they think they are?

The agents of a worriedstiff government pounce on the table with the typical arrogance of the fascist mentality. Have they warrants? Whatever for? We have all the power in the world! Hand over your lists and lets be done (shades of the highway robber, you'll agree).

Your protests go unheeded, for it is a language not understood, this appealing to reason and decency. The lists are grabbed and the mailed fist of fascism has struck again.

Are such goings-on to be tolerated? Never: The people must be roused, their anger canalised. Rally them behind the Freedom Charter, fellow Congressmen:

Under the section "All Shall enjoy equal human rights!" the Charter says: "The law shall guarantee to all their right to organise".





BENONI

A highly successful Regional Conference was held in Benoni on Sunday, February 26th. All the branches of the East Rand were well represented.

This A.N.C. conference discussed tactics in regard to campaigns against passes for women and Bantu Education.

Certain speakers emphasised the need for co-operation with the Coloured people living in Benoni and Germiston. It was suggested that the A.N.C. should give assistance in strengthening the branches of the S.A.Coloured Peoples' Organisation in these areas.

One speaker stressed the need for using the Freedom Charter in Congress work. He said it should be used to unify and mobilise the different sections of the people. The Freedom Charter must not be regarded as a special campaign, but must be popularised in all Congress work as the Congress policy. Signatures for the Charter must be collected on every possible occasion.

WITHDRAW the CHILDREN From VERNOLERD'S SCHOOLS | Secretary Committee of the National Control of Delical Research

Bantu Education has been forced on the African people for almost a year already, a vicious unprincipled attack on African children, on tomorrow's FIGHTERS FOR FREEDOM. And the African people have one weapon to meet this attack, but in these circumstances it is potentially a most powerful weapon, capable of defeating and destroying Bantu Education. It is the weapon of boycott, and especially the boycott of Bantu Education schools by the withdrawal of children. This and this alone can make the Bantu Education Act unworkable.

The beycott of school boards and committees by the African people is important, for this can destroy Verwoord's claim that Bantu schools are "community" schools and that they are welcomed by the African people. But non participation of the parents alone will not put an end to Bantu Education, for the schools do not depend upon the school boards and committees and can in fact function adequately without them.

- The withdrawal of the children from the schools is the real reply to Bantu Education. If the schools can be emptied - not dramatically, sensationally on a particular day, but gradually, even if it takes years - then Bantu Education must fail and can be replaced only by education which is acceptable to the African people - education which shall bring to the African child, as to all other children, his rightful heritage of knowledge, of the consciousness of himself as equal to all men.

To withdraw the children from school, from opportunity to acquire through formal education the important weapons of reading, writing and arithmetic, must be a serious decision for the African parent. It is a difficult decision to face, for either answer must entail sacrifice. Shall the child remain in school, to be indoctrinated, poisoned with the insidious fatal conception of racial inferiority, herded into "ethnic groups" but able to read and write, to speak a little English and Afrikaans, equipped with the tools of education? Or shall the child be withdrawn from school because Bantu Education is dangerous, poisonous; to have no formal school education is better than bad education, that is to be turned into an enemy of national liberation, of Congress and of our people.

WITHDRAWAL DOES NOT DEPEND UPON CULTURAL CLUBS:

For this is the almost intolerable decision that must be faced by every African parent conscious of the true context and purpose of Bantu Education. And the decision must be made on this basis; the possible provision of alternative education should not be, cannot be a factor in this decision. The existence of a private school, the existence of cultural clubs, the organisation of home education - these provisions themselves do not make Bantu Education bad and "boycottable" Nor does their absence make Bantu Education acceptable. Toe often the decision becomes clouded by these considerations and parents rationalise the retention of their children in Bantu schools on the ground that there is no boycott in their area, that there are no private schools, no cultural clubs, no system of home education for teaching the three R's! But if there had been a private school for every Bantu school the Bantu schools would have been emptied long ago! It would not have been necessary to call for a boycott.

And the provision of cultural clubs for the training of the children, for the constructive occupation of the hours when they would otherwise be in school, depends upon the boycott, upon the withdrawal. The withdrawal does not depend upon cultural clubs, although these clubs will obviously stimulate and encourage withdrawal by parents who have still to be convinced of the evils of Bantu Education.

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WITHDRAW THE CHILDREN FROM VERWOERD'S SCHOOLS: (CONT).

THE PARENTS MUST BE EDUCATED!


Home Education? Agein it follows withdrawal. Nor can there be any guarantee by the African National Congress, or the African Education Movement, that clubs and home education will be provided, for then alternatives must stem from the parents themselves once the children have been withdrawn. They cannot function in a vacuum; their very existence depends upon the determination of the parents to work together for their children. Boycott of schools demands courage, and organisation but also demands personal example.

The education of the African parents is the immediate task of Congress members. Parents must be shown that the purpose of the Bantu Education system is to instal in African children a desire and a willingness to be oppressed, persecuted and insulted. It aims at making the African children hate the Congress, national liberation, the Freedom Charter, and Land, Liberty and Peace! It aims to instil in the African child a love and respect for Verwoerd's inhuman and devilish treatment. And it must not be allowed to succeed. Verwoerd must not be allowed to poison the minds of our children.

THE ONE EMBRACES THE OTHER

In 1956 the liberation movement calls for the intensification of the school boycott. This can only be achieved by extensive propaganda and personal contacts. Cultural Clubs will have great propaganda value for they show how alternatives can be provided, whereas in 1955 hundreds of parents decided to withdraw their children without any foreknowledge of what could or would be done. But the boycott must depend upon the conviction of the parents, a conviction that will only be achieved by persistent and patient education. As the people come to accept the Freedom Charter, so will the task of education for the school boycott become easier, for the one embraces the other.
