a It was resalved by this Council that :-

1. It agrees to the principle that non-Buropeans shall be admitted as "Scouts" in accordance with the pdoposals put forward by the Pathfinder-Scout Joint Advisory Committee at its meetings in Johannesburg in November and December 1936.
2. Pathfinder representatives at the Union Council Wivting to be held on the 25 th Pebruary at Durban, should be urged not to allow any further division in the scout wovement other than Guropean and non $\rightarrow$ Furopean branches.
3. This Council endorses the prineiple that the Pathfinder Movement shall be recognised as a branch of the Boy Scout Association, and both Coloured and Indian boys may be admitted into the branch as before, in separate troops if desired, and shall be isnown in future as Pathfinder Scouts.
4. That in the event of the non-Turopean branch passing any resolutions considered by the Buropean branch to be detrimental to the policy or spirit of the Scout P.O.R, the m tter should be referred to a committee consusting of representatives of the two branches on which the Buropean Scout Council shall have the majority vote.
5. That in view of the faet that the pathfinder Movement is already a large organised body, functioning through southern Africa, this Council urges that, with a view to maintaining the unity already achieved by the Pathfinder wovement, efforts be made to continue some formof organis connection with the Pathiinders in African areas outside the Union of South Africa.

It was further resolved that a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Divisional Commissioner, Western Province Boy Scouts Association, in time for thexx meeting of his Council on the l3th inst.

In the Minutes of the last meeting of the Pathfinders Headquarters Council held on the 20th. December last I notice on page 6 it is recorded thet Canon Woodfield asked "Will the present P.O. \& R. of the pathfinders be accepted if the "schemer is adopted", and it is recorded that I replied "Yes, if "these proposals are accopted by both parties". I think that this Minute is not quite correct. The proposals provide that in the event of their acceptance, new Constitutions will be prepared for each of the proposed bodies and I could hardly therefore have stated that the existing P.O.\& R. would be accepted as they stood.

I remember the question being raised and to the best of my recollection I replied that in all probability the various bodies would each be asked to submit a draft Constitution and that, provided they embodied the arrangements agreed to, I did not think the form in which they were cast was likely to be objected to.

I shall be glad if you will have the necessary amendments made to the Minutes.

I also beg to give you notice that I have asked the Secretary of the Union Scout Council to place on the Agenda for consideration by the Union Scout Council paragraph 17 of the Minutes of your Council wherein it is recorded that it was agreed that your Movement paid 210 to the Institute of Race Relations as Affiliation Fees.

I am personally doubtful as to the wisdom of affiliating your Movement to a semi-political body such as the Institute of Race Relations and I propose therefore to ask the Union Scout Council to consider the matter.

## Hy dear Reve?

I have just roceived your Airwail letter of the 8th, inst. and I feel that I must reply to it without delay. In the meanwhile I hope you will have receive my letter sent to you at Johamesbarg (where I thought you would be by this time) last week, and wiffeh may perhaps allay sone of your fears.

I mast adrit that I arn very disappointed that you are "unhappy" over the tesing of tho Scout resolutions and the press statement. When I signed on your behals with the full concurrence of Grant and Rathebo I quite thought that we, as a llovement, had to congratulate ourselves upon having managed a very difficult situation and received far better terms than would ever have been possible. Even now, it seers to me that the diffe ences between the resulutions as passed by the pathfinder Coumeil and those accepted at Durben are so small that they do not largely affect the position at all.

I take it that your main objection is to the use of the temm "parent body" ? This was purely a term of conventence since in no other way would it have been possible for the remainder of the resoltations to go through, A body had to exist to pass what followed, and the original wording of clause 1 put that existing body out of court. The maropean section is the "parent body" only inasuch as it brings the other b dies into being and it seemed generaliy understood that that was the only reson for introducing the phrase at all. Once the other branches come into being there is complete equelity excepting that one section happens to be older than the others.

During the discussions Grant and I constantly referred to the special points you wanted us to watch and again at the end before we gave final consent to make sure that they had not been lost sight of. Briefly these were:-

1. Parallel ranks in each branch. This was not brought into question in any way, and will, of course, not be lost sight of when the new fules and Regulations are brought up.
2. Complete control of each branch by the Head of such branch. This has been maintained and I gather that the Buropean section is taking steps in its new P O.R. to arrange for a chief executive officer to take equal reank with yourself an appointment long overdue.
3. The position of the Movement outside the Union. Walton explained the position of the Intermational Bureau and assured us that as a definite section of the S. African Boy Scouts' Association we should be automatically recognised. He
also said that if the S.A.B.S.A. applied for direct representation on the Intemational Council it would be the firgt of the Colonies to do so since they are at present repogsented by Imperial Headquarters. In view of this it was felt that the cquestion of direct representation might be held over for a time until the other matters had been settled. In the meanwhile the buropean section was given the euthority to deal with the matter.
4. Bepresentation on any controliing Council. Such "council" wos bosled down to a special comentitee to be cailed only if one branch had gone againet the Scoui spirit, and tisen the cormittee wes to consist of representatives of the Buropean body and the other party in question, Itfous not felt that the Indians had any interestin a dispute, say, between the pathíinders and the Zuropeans. (Our $E / R_{0}$ : Council never arreanged for any untted boty other than inis one to meet.)
5. pheouzagenent for the unzization of the Hon-European reoups. This vas fulzy recognised and may be a later devediquent, but while it was egreed that any Nondraropean night join the Fatheinders it was felt wise at this juncture to allow any of the three augcested sections to be formed if they wished.
6. The Draftind of the now $P / P$ constitation to be roforred to

S. The avoidange of 3treess on the Colour-bap in arvepess stateant. You mey probably knink that wa dic not exarcise sirficient care in this matter, bot if yom knew how the original suggested statements were watered down to satisly us you would know that even here we wotked havd and not entsrely in vain. Aftar ail, wo know that there are to be these bars in actuathpractice and if By staving the fact we avoid all the unpleasaniness of correernondence in the press and resignations fron the exlating cout orebnisation I think it is wath wh io saying what is merely the truth.
8. Avoziance of any statomant Anrbidinit jojnt ra, ios, stes As I Gaid in my Zetter Zaet veeks this statauat was delibo erately altered to help us. The door has not been barred and closed against any joint meeting at some special tine, but it has been laid down that normanly no two sections meet together for ordinary parades.

The matter was fully discussed and my objection to the original statement was upheld. wittenshaw told me he hoped to hoId combined parades occasionally, and he was satisfied that he could do so under the revised version as it appearod in the statenent.
*

Quite honestly, R.J., I camot see cause for any feeling that we have deviated Prom the spirit of the last Pathrinder Council, and those peopie I have discussed the matter with have expresseä great satisfaction, and in some cases surprise that we have obtained so much by suchpeaceful measures. I have noted with satisfaction that there has been no anti-feeling expressed in the papers of the Transvaal, Natal, Free State or the Cape and the "Friend" actually gave a leader to it praising it as a valuable addition to the attempts in this country to give the IIon-Zuropean the benefits of what the Buropean had without imperilling racial feeling.

Many Wayfarer workers have expressed to me their wish that they could have had a similar arrangement with regard to their relationships with the Guides, and practically all the members of the Scout council present admitted that they held opfice in some form or other in the Pathfinder Movement, so that we were able to gauge what their feeling was about the matter as pathifinders.

I am sending this to you c/o Grant with whom I hope you will have a long chat and verify the points I have raised, and, possibly get some rolief ! I cannot agree with y u that the Pathrinder Movement "welongs" to the Scouts. The control they exercise is no more than that accepted by the Pathifinder Council. last December. I should be very sorry to know that the new agreement was to be turned dow by the $\mathrm{F} / \mathrm{f}$ Council for the three $\mathrm{v}^{\text {representatives sent }}$ to the Counctil had no hesitation in expressing their acceptance on behalf of the llovement.

You will see in my last letter what I suggested about the draft Constitution, but if you want the concurrence of the $P / s$ Council before you go ahead I suggest you ehould get it by post from each Divis ion at the earliest possible moment. For myself I saw no suggestion that we were in any way subservient to tine huropeans with the exception that they are older than we are and exercise the richt to call a branch to book should it ovorstept the mark on the matter of Scout spirit - and thet was accepted by the P/f Council.

I am very busy now, but I hope that what I have said will rid your mind of wamy of the suspicions that appear to have arisen in it.

My dear Woodfield,
You did a fine piece of work when you sent to me your letter and enclosed copy of the one you have written to R.J.. By the way, he left yesterday, and I have only just received your copy, so that he may not have had his before leaving here. They stayed with the Wilkies, not with us here.

Friday evening. he must see me, and and it, all the rest of it. 1 spent the evening with him. It was really rather bad. You are quite right. He adminifed before we chad finished that his surroundings of the past few months may have made him suspicious of everybody, and Wilkie thought the same. It was a real good "set to" of a couple of hours. I told him I was deeply disappointed with his attitude, and amazed at it. The extraordinaby thing is, that time after time in your letter to him you use exactly the same phrases as I used in wrestling with him.

There are two points. One is, the "parent body." I told him just what you have told him. What more can one say?

The second thing is, our innocent little "Committee" which has replace the formidable "Council." He seems to see it as a sort of Star Chamber with the most malignant intentions to wreck all sorts of things. There again we have both represented the position as it occurred in the Council meeting, and have interpreted the spirit of the whole thing. There was some frank talking on Saturday evening. It gave me a bad night afterwards.

Now the sequel. Next day I had my Divisional Council. We had a dozen people of the first rank. There

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were old hands such as Pilson of Lovedale and Dugard of Healdtown, and others, old Pathfinder Officers. There were keen men such as Wilkie of Lovedale and Kerr of Fort Hare. There were other senior men who have been for years on this Council, and have understanding of the larger aspects of the movement. Defore starting I told Jones that I should not make the kind of statement I had intended to make in my report of the Durban meeting. I was deliberately most sober and matter-of-fact, reporting findings, pointing out the differences between the final and the first draets. I closed with a word which paid tribute to the good spirit of the meeting. There were no adjectives and no rhetoric. When I had finished I not only asked for criticisms, but pressed for them, more than once. Nothing but appreciation was expressed. There was one question aboutthe hat, from a Native Officer, who was satisfied with the explanation. Man after man said that this was all they asked for and more than they expected would come for a long time. In the end, after consulting R.J., I asked for a resolution. It was resplyod, with acclamation, "That this Council expresses its enthusiastic approval of the arrangements come to \&C. \&C. and congratulates its representatives on the part they have played in bringing about so great an advance in the development \&c. \&c. ". You know the kind of thing. And R. J. Had told me on Saturday that when he got my wire asking him to stop here for this meeting he thought I was appealing for help in dealing with a refractory Council; because he expected this to be a storm centre of protest!! !? There is absolutely no qualification in the approval of my Division.

We spent Saturday evening together, in a calmer atmosphere. There has been not the slightest breach of friendship, as you will know. The Council has no idea at all that there is anything in the scheme of which the Chief does not approve. He read me two letters, one of which was particularly extravagant, and put the worst possible and the least charitable interpretation on every clause of the scheme. I am prepared to go to the last ditch for the scheme as we approved of it. Your letter is a great comfort

going to write to you today, to let you have the news of Saturday. Wilkie impressed upon Jones that only those present at the Council could interpret the spirit of the Council. If you and I had started out with the conviction that we had to circumvent the machinations of a crowd of crooks, we should have achieved nothing.

They, dear things, are still in the atmosphere of Cape Town politics. Mrs. R. J. actually told my wife, to the latter's astonishment, that she would much rather have what the Wayfarers have got than what the Pathfinders have received!!! It is almost incredible. Round here the Wayfarers are saying, "Why on earth could we not have waited and got something like this!"

The more I look back on the Durban meeting the more sure I am that we have done the best for the movement. I simply cannot understand how anyone reading both schemes cannot see that the final gives us much more than the scheme which came before the Council at Durban.

It was a good fight, Brother. Many thanks to you, and I am so glad to be able to tell you the results of the meeting of my own Council.

P.S.- By the way, this Division, after consideration, plumps for the name "Pathfinder Scout."

wis wo do . The Governing Councils of Lovedale and Fort Hare have been meeting, and Malcolm is here from Natal. He of course was anxious to know about the meeting at Durban, and was amazed when I told him that the Chief was not pleased about one or two things. Malcolm simply cannot understand it, and says he and his people are delighted with what has been done, and e maintains that we have got all that we need. Malcolm wont look at the idea of a Federal Council. $H_{e}$ is completely satisfied with the position. So that's that! There you have the Transvaal, Natal, and the Cape Border. Cape Western people were present at Durban, so we certainly have them. What about it? I knew you would be as pleased as I am to have this further valuable confirmation. Our hands are strengthened for any further negotiations. I have not heard from R.J. since he was here a fortnight ago.

Cheerio, Brother. All is well. We must get the Chief into a more trustful state of mind.

By the way, we have a great many of the Training Institutions in this Division. At the Chief's request we have appointed a small Committee of Institution men of Pathfinder experience to suggest a three years scheme of training for students in Institutions, which will help the Institutions to turn out fully equipped and efficient Pathfinder Officers, as distignt from mere Pathfinders. Any suggestions you can make will be highly appreciated.

## Dear Miss Barron,

I have to thank you for the documents concerning the new Constitution of the S. African Scout Council and for your covering letter of April 30 th .

I have received no cormunication from the Chief Pathfinder, lir. Rheinallt Jones, in this connection and I do not know what are his wishes in the matter, and whether he is expecting me to attend on his behalf the meeting of the Constitution Sub-comittee on Monday next. Unfortunately, I shall be unable to do so in any case as we shall have no less than five Inspectors from the Education Departuent here on that day conducting the annual examinations and it will be ir possible for me to get away.

I do not know whe ther it will be possible for a substitute to be found, but if it is I will try to let you know at once.

I have not had the opportunity thoroughly to rexuatase examine the documents, but on looking through then I think the two items that will most disturb the pathfinder section will be Nos. 15 and 16 - the proposal to alter the "P. O. $R^{n}$ at any Annual meeting without notice, and the fact that the alterations so carried out shall apply ipso facto to the NonEuropean sections of the Association. Does this mean that at any moment we may find alterations made to the "P.O. $\mathrm{R}^{\prime \prime}$ without the Non-Buropean sections having had any opportunity of discussing the matter or of expressing any opinion thereon ? If this is the case I do not think that the spirit of the decisions made at the Durban Council meeting would be carried out, and I feel sure there would be strong opposition from the Non-Surpean sections. Our pasition would be most unstable and we should never know to what we were being comitted.

I think that this point may have been overlooked by Mr. He Bven when drawing up his admirable statement but I should like the attention of the Comittee at its meeting next Honday to be drawn to this particular point, and I feel sure they will see the cause of my disagreenent. I would rather suggest that in the event of any proposed alteration to the "P. $0_{0} R_{0}$ " iikely to affect the Non-Zuropean sections opportunity should be given then to express an authoritative opinion and that such expressions be taken into full account when the matter is discussed by the Duropean section. It might even be feasible

fos representatives of such bodies to be present to speak in person on such matters. This would be in accordance with the policy laid dow in the past with the pathfinder Movement and also it would be in line with the courteous action of the Constitution Comaittee in inviting a representative of the Pathfinder lovement to attend its meeting next Monday.

## PKoposed conaziviziong

I thank you for sending we the memoranda which have been olrculated anong mombora of the Conatitution Consittee of the S.A. Scout Council.
owing to my pressnca at Clape Town bolng necessary during the pasaege of the Jative Land 1111 I oannot return to Johamnesburg before the 2lth inatent, nor oan I exchange communieations with Cannon woodrield before that time. In the elrcumatances I then teking the 11berty of sending you some observations and augseations, and $I$ shall be graterul if the Constitution Comosttee will give them sympathotie conatderation.

I recognise, of course, that I am in possession of the memoranda through courtesy, she that equally, I can only be hoard on then through the eourtesy of the Comittee. It seans to me, howover, that the aecasion is one in which all possible sourees of misundorstandings in the future should be oliminated through friendiy comoporation. My coments and augeestions aro offered th the hope that they wil2 be helptul in this airection.

I have atuaied the Drart Constitution vith great cere, and as a result I should like to urge that the

Comilttee consider preparing two Constitutions, one covering the Boy scout Movement in South Africa as a whole, and the other dealing only with the Buropan Boy scout Branch. I hope the Comittiee will ellow tho Pathininder Council to submit a draft Constitution for the Patheinder seout brenoh at a later date.

My reasons for suggesting that two separate Constitutions be erested out of the present Draft are
(1) It would be easior for everyone to apprealate the relations to each other of the four branches, and to know how each breneh is releted to the Boy Scout Wovement as a mhole in the Union fand, of course, the other territories mentioned).
(2) It would avole the anomaly of the European Boy Qcout braneh, as one of the parallel branches of the Boy Soout Movement, being desoribed as the "parent body"*
(3) It would avoid all possibllity of confusion between provisions which (a) are exclusively concerned with the organisation of the kuropean Boy secut branch, (b) are concerned with all branohes sid (o) are concerned with the Hovement as a mhere in the union.
(4) If mould bilow of the Association's Constitution being printed separately for the use of all branches, and it might be attached in front of sach printed branch Constitution.

Two examples will help:
(ג) Section $5(\mathrm{~d})$, I take it, is intonded to refor exclusively to suropean troops.
(a) Seetion 13, I also take $1 t$, rofers excluaively to the property of the Duropean branch only.

In both eases it might be held that the provisions are aide enough to eover the

Non-luropean branohes, which 1s, of course, not intenåed.

In the hope that the Comititee w111 agree to this division into two separate Constitutions, I have taken the Liberty of putting forward in formal language my augestlons in regard to the firat Constitution (see attached heretof. I trust the Comittee will agree that put in this way the suggestlons are more ansy to follow.

If a constitution on the 1 ines of my auggestions oommends iteelif to the Comstitee the dratting of the Constitution for the Kuropean branch should be a much simpler matter: may I, however, sucgeat that the word "Buropean" be Insorted in $3(d)$ after the words "Ho fora bodies of Huropean Boy Soouts....." Similariy in 3(e). Also substitute "Iranoh" for "Assoctation", as in $3(a)$.

If the Govarnov-General and the $1 H$ gh Cominissionors can be the chier soouts, I taks it that the ohfef executive offteer of the Furopean branoh would be atyled "Chief luropana scout Commisaioner" and the chief rathrinder would become "Chief Pathfinder Soout Comalsaioner".

May I point out that the Chief Pathrinder Is ex officio chairman of the Pathrinder Headquarters Counel2, and that, to the best of my knowledge, this arrangurent has given overy satiafaction?

I shall be errateful if the Comalttee will elance through the pathifinder $P_{0} O_{0}$ \& $\mathrm{R}_{0}$ and keep in mind that the H. ©. and Diviaional Council membership arrangements have worked well beceuse they ara elastic enough to meet varying conaltiona. I alnearely hope that wen the new Patherinder $P$. 0 . \& R. is aonsidered the Pathrindor organisathon will not be made too inelastic to suit our neads.

I have put forvard all these suggestions in a sincere ceaire to be helpful. It has been imposalble to
