GLEN GREY MISSION HOSPITAL.

Sir,

With reference to our conversation during the early part of last month in above connection, I wish to state that I am aware of the new policy of your Board not to make grants towards the erection of Hospitals, and I also know why the Board has introduced this new policy.

At the same time I respectfully submit that in this case there are various reasons why the Board should not follow the new policy and should try to see its way clear to making a substantial grant towards the building of our Hospital.

The following reasons can be enumerated:-

1. Our first application was submitted to the Board on 12th November, 1936, before the new policy was introduced.

2. There is no danger of the Hospital being discontinued as already, at considerable expense we have made arrangements for three resident doctors and an efficient nursing staff.


3. The Hospital Site is Native Trust Property and a Certificate Of Occupation (copy of which is enclosed) has been obtained from the Native Affairs Department. This will naturally safeguard the interests of the N.A.D., in accordance with stipulations reflected on said Certificate.

4. The original estimated cost of the proposed Hospital was £9000. It has since, however, been agreed that the Glen Grey District is of great importance as regards mine labour and after prolonged communications with various interested bodies and Government Officials the plans have now been revised that the estimated cost is £20006.0.0.

5. It is felt that a Training Centre for Native Nurses has become a crying need and this would be impossible without the erection of the Hospital.

I most sincerely hope that the Board will feel the important necessity for the proposed Hospital and be justified under the circumstances to make a grant of £3000 towards the capital cost of the Glen Grey Mission Hospital. I enclose copy of estimated cost for your information.

Sir,

I beg to inform you that our Mission has decided to build a Public Mission Hospital in the Glen Grey District. The estimated cost is £20006.6.0 and we have applied to various Government Departments and other interested bodies for grants towards capital cost. These applications, we hope, will be considered and in due course be granted. It will, however, take some time before any funds are available and we have already commenced building operations on the site for which we have been granted a Certificate of Occupation by the Native Affairs Department, copy of which is attached for your information.

I have been advised to apply to you for a loan. I shall therefore be glad if you would kindly inform me if you are prepared to make us a loan of £5000 and of the conditions under which such a loan would be made.

Dear Sir,

As requested by you in your letter of the 11th instant I beg to submit to you the enclosed statement of expenses incurred by us and paid up to the present date in connection with the new hospital now in course of erection.

Will you kindly forward a copy of this letter & statement to the Department of Native Affairs who asked for a financial statement in connection with the grant of £500 towards the new building.

May I state that all expenses have been borne so far solely by the Prefecture Apostolic Queenstown (formerly known as the Roman Catholic Mission Queenstown) with the exception of the above mentioned grant from the Department of Native Affairs.

You will notice that the item marked "Labour" on the enclosed statement shows a comparatively very low figure. This is due to the fact that all skilled labour was provided by our own Lay-Brothers, ten of which are employed on the work as masons, joiners & carpenters, driver and electrician. The item "Household" represents the the expenses connected with their boarding here as well as the housekeepers and my own.

As you probably know one of the blocks was completed about six months ago. It houses the electric power-station (already in operation), garage, various workshops, laundry, disinfecting station & mortuary. The hospital proper is under construction. Both wings are already roofed and the brickwork on the second floor of the centre portion is nearing completion.

Besides the buildings mentioned others are planned as Native-staff quarters, an isolation block and other smaller buildings. Their erection though is not yet certain. It will depend mainly on the question if further funds and grants can be made available.
