CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Calling upon the President to grant asylum to those individuals who seek asylum in the United States rather than serve in the South African armed forces in support of apartheid.

Whereas there is a universal draft of white males in South Africa;

Whereas alternative service is available only to members of certain religious groups;

Whereas a white male who, when drafted, refuses induction in the South African armed forces is subject to a court martial under which the individual is presumed to be guilty unless proven otherwise and, if convicted, may be sentenced to 6 years in military prison;

Whereas all draftees are subject to the requirement that they take up arms in support of apartheid as members of the South African armed forces; and

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Whereas the system of apartheid is morally repugnant: Now, therefore, be it

1 Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate 2 concurring), That the Congress calls upon the President of 3 the United States to grant asylum to those individuals who 4 seek asylum in the United States rather than serve in the 5 armed forces of South Africa in support of apartheid.
