# Medical Superintendent's Report 1948

### **HOSPITAL BUILDINGS:**

On the 28th of April, 1948, two new blocks of the Hospital buildings were opened by Mr. H. F. Pentz, Chairman of the Transvaal Hospitals Advisory Committee.

The front block contains two operating theatres—one for clean, and one for infected cases—an X-ray room, a plaster room, a dispensary and drug-store, a consulting-room with a laboratory and an eye-examination room attached, a room for out-patients' dressing, a nurses' lecture room, a secretary's office and a doctors' office. The new spaciousness has increased the pleasure in our work, and has made it more effective.

The second block consists of two large wards with stoeps, two small two-bedded wards for dangerously ill patients, duty rooms for the nurses and a matron's office.

Even on the hottest days the wards are comfortable and there is no overcrowding, although both wards are well filled most of the time.

At present, one stoep in each ward is reserved for infectious cases, pending the completion of the infectious cases block. Work is still proceeding on this block, and also on the building of the large new kitchen, laundry and nurses' dining room.

The old wards are being re-built to form a maternity block.

A powerful electric light generator has been installed, capable of supplying light to the present hospital and to any future buildings, and capable also of supplying power for the new X-ray plant.

Plans have been made, and materials are being collected for the establishing of an adequate water supply for the Hospital. The ram which provided a good supply of water for the old Hospital is unable to provide a sufficient head of pressure to reach all parts of the new building.

### **PATIENTS:**

In the early months of the year, we continued to get cases of scurvy and allied conditions due to lack of vitamins, but rains came, the drought ended, and the diet of the people improved. During the latter part of the year, before the summer rains started and when the rivers were low, we had a succession of cases of crocodile bite. These bites are very deep (in one case the chest-wall was penetrated in two places) and they are very dirty, but thanks to the new drugs and the stamina of the patients, we had no deaths.

This year assault cases have markedly increased in number; the wounds, which are usually head injuries, having been received at beerparties. As the harvest was good and therefore more beer made in the villages, beer-parties became more frequent.

### STAFF:

In April, Dr. J. A. Pool arrived from Scotland. His experience as a civil engineer makes him doubly useful.

In June, Dr. Aitken went on furlough, after nine years on the field, and after a year of disappointments, during which, time and time again, he had to postpone his date of departure. However, he saw completed the first two blocks of the new Hospital which he had been planning for many years.

We are still urgently in need of trained nursing-staff. Miss Violet Bell is working alone, as Matron, and as head of the Nurses' Training School. With the opening of the new blocks, her work has increased in amount, and also there have been many new problems to face and to surmount.

We have altered the syllabus of our Nurses' Training School to conform to the suggested syllabus for the projected Transvaal Provincial Certificate for native nurses, and we hope to be able to register our Hospital for this training scheme.

This is an additional reason for our anxiety about the scarcity of European-trained nurses willing to give their services to the healing of African patients and the training of African nurses.

Once again we have been indebted to Miss Wookey for generous help given during Miss Bell's holiday.

In November, we welcomed to our Staff, Mr. and Mrs. A. Lennox who are retired missionaries of the South Moroccan Mission. Mrs. Lennox has taken charge of the Hospital stores, and of the renewal and repairing of nurses' uniforms. She is also in charge of the Cottage where part of the European staff lives.

Mr. Lennox acts as Master of Works, caring for the upkeep of the plant and supervising the workmen.

We are grateful to them for taking these necessary, but time-consuming duties into their hands.

Miss Heidenreich joined the Staff at the end of 1947 as secretary and book-keeper. There is a large amount of office work in connection with the building, with District Surgeon work and with the various grants received from Government sources, as well as the book-keeping involved in the day to day running of the Hospital. We greatly appreciate the competent way in which Miss Heidenreich has dealt with these various matters.

### HOSPITAL BOARD:

During 1948, the Rev. R. H. R. Liddell was appointed a member of the Board, representing the Presbyterian Church of South Africa.

The Matron, (Miss V. Bell) and Dr. Pool were added to the Board in order that the number of members appointed by the South African Mission Council of the Church of Scotland should form two-thirds of the total number of members of the Board, in accordance with the finally approved Constitution of the Church of Scotland Medical Mission Hospitals.

At our last Board meeting, the following minute of appreciation of the help given by the Berlin missionaries to several of our Clinics was recorded:—"At Tshakhuma, Georgenholtz and Beuster, the Berlin Mission have built and equipped the dispensaries visited by our doctors. The Berlin Mission also pay a part of the District Nurses' Salary at these three stations. In other less tangible ways—by their hospitality, goodwill and co-operation—the missionaries of the Berlin Mission have made work at the Clinics pleasant and progressive."

# SPECIAL APPEAL FUND:

At the opening of the new blocks on the 28th April, Mr. Pentz announced that the Transvaal Provincial Council would grant another £10,000 for the completion of the Hospital buildings and for the new water supply scheme. This sum was the amount which Dr. Aitken estimated would be required for these purposes, and Dr. Pentz's announcement was received with great satisfaction.

During 1948, Government and Provincial Grants amounted to the sum of £3,855 14s. 0d. Without these grants, the efficiency of the Hospital would have been greatly impaired, and the extension of our work have been impossible. We are grateful for the Grants received in 1948, and trust that as our work expands the Grants will also increase.

The Donations from well-wishing Firms and private individuals are acknowledged in the list at the end of this report.

In July, 1948, a much appreciated gift of woollen garments, flannelette cot-sheets, etc., was received from St. Mark's Presbyterian Church. These gifts arrived during a spell of cold weather and were at once put into use.
