Foreword

We have great pleasure in presenting this brochure on behalf of the Bluebells United organisation, which is 18 years old. The purpose of the brochure is twofold:— primarily to tell the supporter that “Bells are back!” and secondly, to appeal to the public for support, both morally and financially!

After a lean period, spurned on by the “sellout” of our Club to the multinational N.P.S..L., the Bells are ringing, once again, in the colours of the S.A. Federation. The lessons of this setback, has initiated a recovery rarely seen in the non-racial sports movement. We have seven soccer teams (from under 10 to professional), one netball team, three dart teams and one supporters club. The Bluebells United Supporters Club (B.U.S.C) aims to inculcate an interest and spirit in the Bell’s supporter, to back their team in all codes of sport, not only soccer. In their debut year in the Federation Professional League (F.P.L.) - after an absence of seven years - they today meet Crusaders in the Federation Professional League Regional Knockout Final. They beat seasoned professionals, Laudium Birds F.C., Orient Swaraj F.C. and Lightbody Santos on their long march to victory in this Cup Final!

Our team although, playing in the “Professional Ranks” are the “True Amateurs” of our world i.e. they do not play for money but for the love of the game, and their Club - “Bluebells United - The Peoples Team”.

As we today do battle for better playing fields, floodlights, better education, lower rentals, etc. so we are reminded of the struggles of the “Old Bells” - who fought the Johannesburg City Council for the right to play non-racial soccer at the Lenasia Stadium! With such a history it is obvious that Bluebells today stand opposed to their “New Deal” and continue to struggle for non-racial sport-free from unscrupulous businessmen and state interference!

In conclusion as members of the South African Council on Sport (SACOS) and as progressive sports people striving for forms of play which are not exploitative, but creative and free, where the joy is in the doing and not only the result - we need to struggle on

For Bells, the Federation and SACOS the words of hope from Bertold Brecht should be our beacon when he says “There are those who struggle for a day that is good, there are those who struggle for a year and that is better, and then there are those who struggle for twenty years and that is better still, and there are those who struggle all their lives and these are the ones we cannot do without.”

Bells are back and HERE TO STAY!!

THE BLUEBELLS UNITED STORY



When the annals of South African sport are rewritten, the story of Bluebells United shall be retold, for surely no other club has suffered for the principles of soccer as they have done.

From virtually obscurity in 1964, to recognition by F.I.F.A., the world body, in 1974: that is no mean achievement. Words and words would hopelessly fail to serve as a yardstick for their success, which can only be measured in the loyalty, dedication, determination, perseverance and utter selflessness shown by these gallant men.

In 1962, when the Natal Springs Sports Ground was finally closed, everybody accepted the situation: "as one of those things". In 1963, a handful of youngsters, then students at the Lenasia Primary School, decided to form their own club after successfully playing together as a representative school team in Durban. Naturally, this resulted in Differences between the players and their previous clubs. Here was born the first characteristic of this famous club, **DETERMINATION**: and so it came to pass that Lenasia's first independent Junior team came into being.

The following year the Dynamos Junior Football Club, as they were then called, affiliated to the Lenasia Junior Football Association.

Many problems arose due to the lack of finance. Then when the club was finally faced with a state of collapse, Sival Pillay stepped in with an offer for the club to serve as a subsidiary of the Bluebells Football Club.

Although the team enjoyed a fruitful season, winning all games on the field, they lost all by protest.

Through all this, the youngsters remained passive and sought to strive for recognition.

Thus in 1965, they once more affiliated to The Lenasia Junior Football Association, and Vincent Naidoo, then Secretary of the Bluebells Football Club, took the boys under his wing.

Dissatisfaction with the mother body forced the resignation of Vincent Naidoo, and this young man and his band of even younger followers began the unenviable task of rebuilding, both support and morale.

With the loyal support of youngsters, the likes of Louis Jeevantham, Alan Moonsammy, Farouk Hassen, Richard Frank and Rodney Moonsamy, the club persevered, ultimately winning the Junior League.

At the Annual General Meeting held in February, 1966, it was decided that the club should not disband, but seek affiliation to the LFA's Senior League. The name "Bluebells", which was honoured and respected was to be retained, and "United" was added to signify the loyalty and unified conceptions of all the members. This action brought new men to the club. Persons such as Jay Ramdin, Patrick Naiker, and Silvyn Naidoo, further strengthened the club and administration, and the Bells have never looked back.

Success followed success. Bluebells United became Lenasia's ambassadors of soccer, and also its most successful club, gaining promotion to the First Division in 1967, where they won the first League, and again in 1968 by becoming double League Champions (undefeated) and also annexing the First Division Knock-out.

Ever striving for higher principles, and realising that the LFA would not sever its ties with the Transvaal Indian Football Association, they sought affiliation to, and were accepted by the Southern Transvaal Football Union, in May 1969.

Although not attaining any major honours, they proved their worth and were reinstated as a contending team in the then Premier League. In 1970, Louis Jeevanantham returned to his club after a spell in the National League with Maritzburg City. The same year the club was honoured to have Louis Jeevanantham, Alan Moonsammy, Pregar Thandrin and Goona Padayatchi selected for the Transvaal United team. This was also the year they acquired the services of top coach Billy Morgan, and Yousef Eshack.

1971 saw Agmat Mohamed included in the Transvaal United line up. The Bells had by In a bid to obtain a suitable playing venue in Lenasia, the Bells spent in excess of R1500 00, in a vain attempt to erect their own ground. This noble venture was tragically thwarted by the ignoble efforts of some opposition parties.

To the brave men of Bluebells United, this move only resulted in their further unity and rededication in the struggle for soccer freedom.

When it would have been easy to resign, and return to the ranks of racial football, these men hung on to their principles in the fervent hope that one day these disappointments would be repayed with success.

DR SELMA BROWDE

This noble lady took up the plight of Bluebells United. What followed is history. In her own valiant manner, she fought for justice. The long-drawn battle, and the years of struggle culminated in success, for in July 1973, the gates of the Lenasia Stadium were finally thrown open to the Federation.

THE BRAVADOS OF BELL PARK

On the eve of the club's Ninth Annual General Meeting, a message of goodwill was received from the F.I.F.A. Headquarters, signed by Dr Helmut Käser (Secretary), with the club well for the future. The road was long, seemed almost endless, but these gallant men never lost sight of their ideals and principles, and in so doing, finally conquered against overwhelming odds.

Today, nobody can afford to be indifferent to the name "Bluebells". They who have sacrificed themselves no end, paving the way for others, so that eventually all may benefit.


We are quite aware of the gallant fight which these young men are putting up -- FIFA greatly admires such young men who dedicate themselves for the sake of sport.

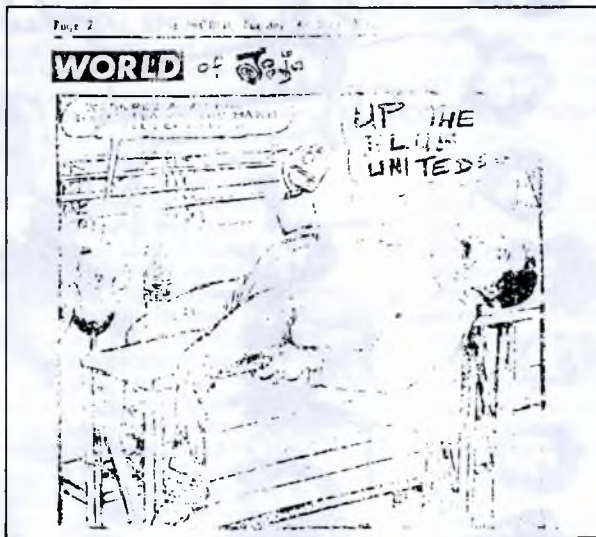

MANIFESTO

ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY AT THE SPECIAL CONFERENCE HELD IN CAPE TOWN ON AUGUST 20 and 21, 1983.

This mass conference of delegates and observers from non-racial sports codes and associated organisations through out South Africa/Azania has deliberated on and examined the position of the South African Council on Sports on the basic questions concerning sport in an apartheid society. The conference has once again confirmed and adopted the following concepts which serve to guide the policy and practise of non-racial sportspersons in South Africa as it is affected by the 'new deal'.

1. ON MULTI-NATIONAL SPORT

- 1.1 SACOS rejects the policy and practise of multi-national sport as being nothing more than apartheid sport. Non-racial sport is the direct opposite of and a threat to multi-nationalism which is the brain child of racial capitalism. Consequently, the practise of multi-national sport is a facade which is calculated to deceive the international community into believing that there is no racial discrimination in South African sport.
- 1.2 SACOS continues to hold that 'multi-national sport' is one of the pillars on which the ideological and political structure of the South African system rests. It is calculated to reinforce among the people of our country the belief that they belong to different 'nations' and 'ethnic groups'. Multi-national sport is the ideal policy in the sports arena to implement one of the main goals of the 'New Deal' strategy of the Botha regime, viz to divide the black working class in order to weaken their resistance to this bankrupt system.

2. ON THE MORATORIUM ON INTERNATIONAL TOURS

- 2.1 Apartheid is the expression of the system of racial capitalism that has developed in South Africa over more than three centuries. This system has aborted the development of the nation in South Africa in that the ruling class of white capitalists have, for their own profit, denied to the vast majority of people of our country full citizenship rights. Because of this, SACOS holds that no teams of sportspersons, however chosen, can at best represent South Africa/Azania. We are not willing to serve the sectional interest of the ruling class by encouraging teams or individuals representing foreign nations to tour South Africa, or by allowing non-racial sportspersons or teams to tour outside South Africa.
- 2.2 Any 'South African' team, of whatever colour, that tours outside this country represents nothing more than white domination, apartheid and racial discrimination. Only a future

South Africa/Azania free of oppression and exploitation will produce teams and individuals that can rightfully represent our people on the basis of dignity and self-respect.

3. DOUBLE STANDARDS

- 3.1 No persons, whether they be players, administrators or spectators who are committed to the non-racial principle in sport that practises or condones racialism and 'multi-nationalism'. The principle of non-racialism and anti-racism should be observed in all spheres of life and SACOS affiliates are expected to educate their members towards understanding the importance of this point. As far as sport is concerned, players and administrators who disregard this principle are held to be guilty of practising double standards and cannot therefore be members of any organisation affiliated to and associated with SACOS.
- 3.2 Any individual who serves on any government-created political or quasi-political body such as the SAIC, Management Committees, Community Councils, President's Councils or Bantusan Assemblies is held to be guilty of transgressing this principle.

4. A SINGLE UNDIVIDED NON-RACIAL DEMOCRATIC AZANIA/SOUTH AFRICA

SACOS believes that non-racial sport can only be played in a new South Africa/Azania free of oppression and exploitation. We believe therefore, that the struggle for non-racial sport is part and parcel of the liberation struggle and call on all non-racial sportspersons and organisations to promote and support in all possible ways this struggle on a principled basis.

5. BREAKING OF ARTIFICIAL RACIAL BARRIERS

SACOS calls upon all sports organisations of the oppressed to actively take steps to break down all artificial 'racial' barriers created by the state and to form single non-racial provincial sports organisations of the oppressed and exploited.
