Only two out of every five M.P.s voted for the Government's new German Army Plan. 60 per cent of the M.P.s did not vote one way or the other.

That such a large number of M.F.s did not vote shows the strength of feeling in the country. Action taken now can get these M.P.s to reject the German Army Plan.
