

SA SESDE DIVISIE TOER

'n RUGBYTOER van vier maande deur nege lande gedurende die noordelike winter van 1945/46 was vir die SA Divisie-spelers die kersie op die oorlogstydse rugbykoek.

Die vyandelikhede was toe geruime tyd al verby, maar duisende Geallieerde soldate moes nog die pas markeer in afgawting op vervoer na die lande van hul herkoms. En die bevelvoerders moes intussen die manne besig hou. Die oorblywende eenhede van die Sesde Divisie was in daardie stadium gevestig in 'n ry wit stranddorpies aan die Italiaanse Riviera toe die ou "Master" soos die legendariese M.M. (Boy) Louw bekend was – per jeep opgedaag het met 'n dringende boodskap van die hoofkwartier.

Dit het gelui dat die name, ouderdomme, massas en rugbygeskiedenis van bêlwende rugbyspelers in elke eenheid ingewin moet word en telefonies aan Hoofkwartier verstrek moes word. Die Kiwi's moet op 10 November op hul plek gesit word. As 'n sterk SA span op die been gebring kan word, is daar ook sprake van 'n uitgebreide rugbytoer na Engeland en die Vastelande van Europa.

Vier dae later was 60 hoopvolle jong spelers op pad na Rapallo in die mededistrik van Noord-Italië vir die keuringsproses. Die proefspelers het hul intrek in 'n hotel geneem en dieselfde aand het die aangewese kaptein, Piet Duvenhage, die oefenprogram aangekondig.

Liggamsoefeninge elkeoggend om 07h00; afrigtingsessies elke namiddag; oefenwedstryde al om die ander dag, en 'n halfbottel bier per speler per dag (behalwe Woensdae en Saterdae wanneer die rantsoen vermeerder is tot anderhalf bottel per man, as daar soveel was!)

Ná twee weke van sweet is 'n A- en B-span met vyf reserwes gekies en die res is terug na hul eenhede.

As 'n oefenlopie het die A-span 'n Britse gebiedspan met 45-3 kafgeloop terwyl die B-span ook ver gewen het teen 'n soldaatspan van Genoa. 'n Week daarna (op 19 Nov) het 300 rugbymal Kiwi's Rapallo binnegeval, terwyl lang konvoe vol rooilussiedraers van heinde en ver gekom het vir die uitdagwedstryd. Kapt R.E. Prescott, 'n Britse toetspeler, was die skeidsregter.

Die SA span wat daardie middag as oorwinnaars met 30-5 van die veld gestap het, was H. Swanson, Ian Frylinck, Cecil Moss, Jimmy Hearne, Frank Kingwell, Peter Stewart en John Youngelson, Dick Holton, Piet Duvenhage (Kapt), A.P. Greeff, Hannes Morkel, John Morkel, J. Botha, Stephen Fry en H. Schwartz.

Die rugbyprogram vir daardie wedstryd het onder die titel "The Book" verskyn. Op die onthaal ná die wedstryd was die "boek" dikwels ter sprake en is die verloorspan aan-

geraai om SA se rugbyboek te gaan bestudeer. Die denkbeeldige handboek oor rugby van SA en NS is in die oorlogsjare in die Noorde deur die spelers van die twee lande oor en weer vir mekaar voorgehou as die ware bron van rugbykennis.

Eienaardig genoeg het daardie groot loesing nie die Nieu-Seelanders afgeskrik nie. Hulle wou weer probeer, en tien dae later was dieselfde Divisie-span onderweg na Florence vir 'n tweede botsing met "'n versterkte" Kiwi-span. Dié keer is hulle met 23-3 geklop.

"Gaan dous nou maar die manne in Engeland op, julle is te sterk vir ons," het die Nieu-Seelandse afrigter daardie aand gesê.

Maar voor die 30 toetspelers met maj J. Burger as bestuurder en "oom" Boy Louw as afrigter kon koers kies Engeland toe, moes nog twee rugby-afsprake met gekombineerde Britse spanne in Italië afgehandel word. Dit is met wentellings van 19-3 en 17-10 beslis.

Op 2 Desember het die span per trein uit Milaan vertrek. Die rit deur Switserland tot by Calais het 36 uur in beslag geneem. In Londen is die span gul ontvang en tydelik erelede gemaak van verskeie sosiale klubs.

Die eerste twee wedstryde in Engeland teen die gekombineerde Gardebrigade op Caterham, en teen St Mary's Hospitaal op Richmond Park op betreklik droë velde, is

maklik gewen, al het die toerspan probleme ondervind met die vertolking van die reëls.

Daarna het die span egter teenspoed gekry op moddervelde en in stortreën. Die gevolg was 'n gelykopuitslag van 10-12 teen die Australiese Lugmag, en twee neerlae (6-9 teen die Nieu-Seelandse magte in Engeland) en 0-3 teen Guy's Hospitaal.

Op 28 Desember 1945 is die span na Bordeaux in Frankryk as die gaste van die Paradyse Universiteit.

Op 'n weeksdag voor 18 000 toeskouers het die toerspan ses drieë teen die gekombineerde studentespan van Parys en Bordeaux gedruk en met 18-13 gewen. Op nuwejaarsdag op die dorp Pau aan die voet van die Pireneë, het die toerspan sy gelyke tegekom in 'n suidelike streekspan met 'n hele aantal van Frankryk se internasionale spelers. Die SA span was effens gelukkig om met 'n gelykopuitslag (9-12) weg te kom.

Die laaste wedstryd in Frankryk teen 'n distrikspan van Bayonne is met 16-4 gewen. Daarvandaan is die span oor Parys, Brussel en Paderborn na Wuppertal in Duitsland, waar die Walliese 53ste Divisie, wat as besettingstroope ná die oorlog diens gedoen het, met 17-7 geklop is.

Die laaste toerwedstryd teen die 52ste Skotse Divisie in Münster moes gekanselleer word, omdat die veld klihard bevore was. In plaas daarvan is 'n naweek by Enschede op die Duits-Hollandse grens deurgebring, voor die lang terugreis na Italië aangepak is.

Dok Craven se spore lê diep in SAW rugby

PROF (dr) Daniël Harman Craven se naam is in Suid-Afrika en die res van die rugbyspelende wêreld sioniem met die spel en hy is ook bekend as 'n kenner van liggamlike opvoeding. Sy verbintenis met die SA Weermag op dié twee gebiede is egter nie allerwee bekend nie.

"Dok" Craven, soos almal hom ken, het in die jare 1938 tot 1949 diep spore in die SA Weermag getrap as rugbyspeler, afrigter en administrateur van die spel. In dié tyd het hy ook baie gedoen vir liggamlike opvoeding van lede van die SA Weermag.

Dr Craven is op 1 April 1938 as organisator van liggamlike opleiding in die Unieverdedigingsmag met die rang van luitenant aangestel. Toe hy sy uniform in 1949 vir 'n professortoga verruil het, het hy die rang van kommandant (destyds luitenant-kolonel) bekle. Deur dié verbintenis het hy steeds 'n sagte plekje vir die Weermagmanne.

Vanaf 1 Mei tot 30 Augustus 1938 het hy 'n liggaamlike opvoedingskursus by die SA Militêre Kollege op Voortrekkerhoogte bygewoon. Ná afloop van die kursus het hy op 16 September 1938 na die buiteland vertrek om 'n aantal liggaamlike opvoedingskursusse mee te maak en liggaamlike opvoedingstelsels te bestudeer.

Van 13 Oktober 1938 tot 26 Februarie 1939 – toe die oorlogswolke al dreigend oor Europa begin saampak het – het Lt Craven 'n kursus aan die bekende Reichs Akademie für Leibesübungen in Berlyn bygewoon.

In Brittanje het hy die bekende "Army School of Physical Training" besoek vir 'n kursus wat van 1 Mei tot 30 Junie 1939 geduur het. Daarna is hy na Stockholm in Swede waar hy die Zingiade en ander gimnastiekkursusse bygewoon het. Op 27 Oktober het hy na Suid-Afrika teruggekeer.

In 1940 word hy, as tydlike majoor, Hoof-instrukteur in Liggaamlike Opvoeding by die Militêre Kollege op Voortrekkerhoogte. Hy het ook gedurende dié tyd in die Nasionale Adviserende Raad vir Liggaamlike Opvoeding gedien. Van die waardevolle werk wat hy gedoen het, is die instelling van 'n nasio-

nale stelsel om soldate fiks te kry. Op 1 Januarie 1941 het hy gehelp met die instelling van die Liggaamlike Opleidingsbataljon en het hy 'n groot aandeel gehad in die remediërende opleiding van soldate wat herstelbare gebreke gehad het.

In 1949 het Lt Col Craven sy uniform vir die professortoga verruil toe hy as professor in liggaamlike opvoeding aan die Universiteit van Stellenbosch aangestel is.

Sommer met die intrapslag van sy loopbaan in die Univerdedigingsmag op 1 April 1938, is Danie Craven (toe 'n luitenant) as spankaptein van Garnisoen, soos die Weermagrugbyspan toentertyd bekend gestaan het, aangehou.

In 1938 het Noord-Transvaal van die res van Transvaal afgeskei en 'n eie rugbyprovincie geword. In hierdie beginjare van Noord-Transvaalse rugby het Craven sowel as Garnisoen 'n groot rol gespeel. Die meeste spelers in die Noord-Transvaalspan van daardie jaar was lede van die Weermag en het vir Garnisoen gespeel, terwyl Danie Craven wat kaptein van Garnisoen was, ook die kaptein van die Noord-Transvaalse rugbyspan was.

Die spelers wat vir beide die spanne gespeel het, was: Dr Danie Craven, Lt "Kalfie" Martin (later Lt genl), Lt "Snaar" Viljoen (ook wêreldbekend as atleet), Lt Matie du Toit (later Lt genl en Hoof van die Generale Staf en broer van die Springbok-skrumskakel Connie du Toit), luitenant W. Kriel, S. van Schalkwyk, A. Colenbrander en G.T. Moll (later genl maj) asook lugwerktuigkundige T. van Onselen en kpl A. Venter.

Garnisoen, en dus ook Noord-Transvaal, het 'n baie sterk rugbyspan gehad. Onder die leiding van dr Craven het Garnisoen daardie jaar (1938) die heel eerste wenner van die vandag bekende Carltonbeker geword. Die beker is in 1938 toe Noord-Transvaal 'n eie rugbyprovincie geword het, as die trofee ingestel waarom klubs in Noord-Transvaal meegeding het. Die afriger van Garnisoen was dr Jan Pienaar, die latere lektor by die Universiteit van Stellenbosch en afriger van die Maties. Lt Col H.V. Kopper, later Kommandant-generaal van die Unie-Verdedigingsmag, was voorsitter van Garnisoenklub.

DANKSY 'n borgskap van R100 000 (eenhonderduisend rand) vir 1989 sal Pretoria Weermag Rugbyklub 'n naamsverandering ondergaan en in die toekoms as Mascini Pretoria Weermag Rugbyklub bekend staan.

Sport het deur die jare en veral in die jongste tyd groot veranderings ondergaan. Vanuit 'n bestuursoogpunt het dit nodig geword om Pretoria Weermag Rugbyklub meer professioneel te bedryf.

Met meer as 1 200 spelers het dit tyd geword om die administrasie te moderniseer. Om die spelers se volle potensiaal te benut en uit te bou, het dit nodig geword om gespesialiseerde kursusse in bestuur, afrigting en buite Weermagverband by te woon.

Fondse is van die grootste belang indien rugby tot sy volle reg binne Pretoria Weermag uitgebou wil word. Dit is daarom met groot dank en waardering wat Mascini Group Holdings finansieel tot Pretoria Weermag Rugbyklub se redding gekom het.

Die klub word sonder enige staatshulp bedryf. Slegs bydraes van lede is aangewend om die klub te administreeer. Weens die steeds groter wondende finansiële behoeftes wat sport in die algemeen en rugby in die besonder vereis, het dit bykans onmoontlik geword om op eie stoom fondse te in en mededingend te wees. Dit is daarom dat borgskappe soos dié met groot dank verwelkom word.

Die borgskap van Mascini

Group Holdings gaan verder aangewend word om spelers te subsidieer mbt toerusting. Geen speler sal finansiële vergoeding ontvang nie, slegs gesubsidieerde toerusting.

Daar moet 'n duidelike onderskeid getrek word tussen die borgskap van Saambou Nasionaal en dié van Mascini Group Holdings. Saambou Nasionaal se borgskap is vir die SA Weermag Rugbyvereniging wat rugby op Interneenhedsvlak bedryf, terwyl Mascini Group Holdings se borgskap uitsluitlik vir die uitbou

van rugby by Pretoria Weermag Rugbyklub is.

Volgens mnr Leo Mascini van die borg word daar binne sy groep maatskappy besondere klem gelê op die feit dat 'n gesonde liggaam 'n gesonde gees huisves. Dit is daarom dat dié

groep besluit het om hom aan Pretoria Weermag Rugbyklub te verbind.

Hierdie borgskap van R100 000 van die Mascini Group Holdings is tot op hede die grootste borgskap wat 'n rugbyklub nog ontvang het.

'n Borgskaptjie van R100 000 is aan die rugbyklub van die Pretoriase Weermag oorhandig. Dié borgskap van die Mascini-groep is vir die 1989-seisoen en die grootste wat 'n klub in Suid-Afrika nog ontvang het. Die president van die rugbyklub, genl maj J. Kriel (links), ontvang die tjeuk van mnr Leo Mascini, die borgmaatskappy se besturende direkteur. Effens verskui agter genl maj Kriel is brig Faan Grobbelaar, die klubvoorsitter.



'Highlights all good memories'

MAJOR Neels Cronje, secretary of the newly-formed South African Defence Force Rugby Association, has certainly been around. On being introduced to Maj Cronje, one comes face to face with a neatly-dressed middle-aged man. He is soft-spoken and friendly and he looks like your ordinary man on the street.

But sit down and chat to this man and a story of success will unfold as he modestly outlines his life history, a story which includes his being capped as a Springbok rugby player, his qualifying for athletics competition in the 1960 Olympic Games and his interesting life as an airline pilot with the South African Airways.

Maj Cronje says he comes from the Free State – ask him where exactly and he says: "From all over. My father was a teacher and

he travelled around a bit, but I landed up in Bloemfontein where I matriculated at Shan-

non High School."

He volunteered for National Service in 1958 and spent a year at the Air Force Gymnasium. Thereafter he joined the Permanent Force and served as a regimental instructor. He studied part-time through the University of Pretoria and obtained his B Comm degree in 1962.

He received his commission in 1963 and went to the Central Flying School, Dunnotar, where he gained his wings at the end of 1964 – the same year he married Elsa Pretorius.

Prior to this, Maj Cronje's rugby playing was done with the Shannon High first team: "That wasn't too difficult to achieve because there were very few boys at the school.

"At the Gym I played Northern Transvaal under-19 rugby. From 1961 to 1963 I played for Northern Transvaal seniors. After I received my wings I was given permission to play rugby for a Springs club because there were not many players at my base. In Springs I played for Eastern Transvaal and it was while I was there, in 1965, that I was chosen to accompany the Springboks on their Australian Tour.

"I played in the first match against Western Australia in Perth. I was then chosen for the first test in Sydney but had to withdraw because of a hamstring injury," he said.

Another highlight of the wing's rugby career was representing the Combined Forces team in the only two matches ever played by the side. In 1960 he ran onto the field with Combined Forces against the All Blacks in Pretoria and in 1962 was part of the team in the notorious Combined Forces v Lions

match in Potchefstroom – a match marred by fighting.

Maj Cronje also excelled in athletics. He narrowly missed gaining Springbok colours when he qualified for the 1960 Olympic Games but was not selected for the national team.

"I competed in the 400m and the 400m hurdles and was up against tough opposition like Malcolm Spence and Gert Potgieter. I saw a lot of their backs during my athletics career!"

Maj Cronje was running in the same race when Potgieter set the world 400m hurdles record and then two days later was in the same event in which Spence bettered the Commonwealth 400m record.

Maj Cronje's sporting career ended when he joined the Airways in 1968. He worked his way up to the post of captain of the airbusses – aircraft used for local and short international flights.

"One of the highlights of my airways career was going to take delivery of 737's in Seattle in 1981 and 1982. I was involved in the delivery of six of them. It took us five days to fly those little planes all the way to South Africa."

His career in the Airways was cut short when he lost his pilot's licence after it was discovered that he was suffering from the incurable Parkinson's Disease, the same illness suffered by former world boxing champion Mohammed Ali.

He joined Defence rugby in July 1987 and now plays an important role assisting Col Henning Buitendag administering SADFRA.

"Looking back I would say there are no real highlights in my career. They are all good memories, the injuries and achievements. I just love being involved with sport."

THE year 1989 is historic in the development of South African Defence Force Rugby as it is the year that the powers-that-be decided to form a separate organisation to administer the sport which currently has between 6 000 and 7 000 adherents in the forces.

On 1 March 1989 the SA Defence Force Rugby Association (SADFRA) was established to

administer the sport because it was realised that the task was too great to be handled by the previous head committee.

A full-time staff was appointed under the leadership of manager Col Henning Buitendag and secretary Maj Neels Cronje and on 1 April the staff took their place in offices at the Ellis Park Stadium in Johannesburg.

The offices are situated in the south wing of the stadium at the home of the Transvaal Rugby Football Union (TRFU) and includes two offices, two store-rooms, two lecture rooms, a kitchen and ablution facilities. In addition to these premises, Defence rugby has the use of a private suite on the north wing of the stadium. All these facilities

were made possible through the generosity of the TRFU who are supplying them free of charge. This move by SADF rugby to become "independent" was boosted by a mammoth R600 000 three-year sponsorship by SAAMBOU, which was

sponsors and he handed over the sponsorship cheque to Gen Jannie Geldenhuys.

PARATUS decided to call on Col Buitendag and Maj Cronje at their offices to see how they had settled in at the premises. Col Buitendag was neatly dressed in a blue suit and proudly sported an Eastern Province rugby tie and shirt – he represented them as eighth man in the 1960's and early 1970's.

He began by explaining how rugby, like all other sports in the Defence Force, was previously governed by a head committee. Rugby, he said, then became too big a task for a part-time head committee and late last year it was decided to establish the full-time SADFRA.

The SA Navy splashed out for the original announcement to which rugby journalists from all over the country were invited. Mr Christie Kuun represented the

The former chairman, Maj Gen O.J.J. du Toit, then became the president and Col Buitendag was appointed manager with Maj Cronje, a former Springbok rugby player and top athlete of the 1960's and 70's, as secretary. The clerical duties are performed by National Servicemen.

Col Buitendag, a former teacher, lecturer and senior staff officer in the Air Force, attended school in Kroonstad before obtaining his BSc (Physical Training) degree at Stellenbosch. He later gained his BEd through UNISA. He then moved to Port Elizabeth where he taught at Cillie High School and then at Framesby High School.

After Port Elizabeth he took

up a lecturing post at the University of the North, Pietersburg, where one of his tasks was to establish a Faculty of Physical Education. In 1975 he joined the Defence Force.

During his travels, Col Buitendag has represented Northern Free State schools, Eastern Province and Border on the rugby field and has played for well-known clubs, Stellenbosch and Defence-Gardens. He has also served as a Northern Transvaal selector.

We asked the Colonel to explain the role SADFRA played. "SADFRA, which now has observer status with the SA Rugby board (SARB), is here to administer Defence Force rugby on a national scale because of the

sport's enormity. This task encompasses many facets including the organisation of the annual Defence Week, which this year will be held in Bloemfontein (3-8 July)," he said.

With 16 senior sides and 16 under-21 teams entered, this tournament must rate as one of the biggest in the country. "Any matters involving the national Defence team are dealt with by us. This includes the selection of the national team such as the one which played in Kimberley against the SA Feeder XV at the SARB Centenary Celebrations in April," he explained.

"Another project demonstrates how players are developed to the fullest. We have good contacts with clubs in Italy

and a number of Defence players have been sent there to play. Defence's main aim is to promote rugby in South Africa for the large number of rugby players that are doing their National Service. In short, we do not want the two years' National Service to be an obstacle in the development of our rugby players. We want to ensure that they get all the opportunities to reach their highest point of rugby achievement."

He added: "SADFRA are proud of the number of Springboks produced by the Defence Force since Dr Danie Craven became the first in 1938. To date we have 25 Springboks who were first capped while serving in the forces."



THE SADF basketball teams met with mixed fortunes whilst participating in three National Tournaments in March and May 1989. These tournaments were the SA National Club Championships held in Cape Town over the period 24-27 March, the SA U-19 Championships in Pietermaritzburg over the period 29-31 March and SA Jnr (U-21) Championships in Pietermaritzburg over the period 4-7 May.

The SADF team was involved in three of the SA National Club Championships and produced some exciting matches. In the second game played on Friday, 24 March, the SADF eventually won 64-62 after an exciting tussle with Lusitania. The top scorers for the SADF were Pte A. Laing with 22 points and Pte R. Laing with 19 points.

In their first game on Saturday, 25 March, the SADF met "All Stars" and after leading for most of the game, finally succumbed to the pressure of All Stars in the last two minutes and went down 71-75. Top scorer in this game was Pte A. Laing with 24 points.

The final game for the Servicemen was played on Monday, 27 March, against UNIAO. This turned out to be an exciting match with the lead constantly changing hands right up to the end. With a few seconds to the final whistle, Pte R. Laing missed a basket, resulting in them losing the match 60-61. Pte A. Laing was top scorer with 19 points. This proved to be the best game of the tournament.

- Final results were: SADF 79 - University of Natal (Durban) 70; SADF 64 - Lusitania 62; SADF 71 - All Stars 75; SADF 86 - UCT 110; SADF 107 - Dynamoes 60; SADF 62 - University of Natal (Pietermaritzburg) 68; SADF 60 - UNIAO 61. The SADF team ended in fifth position in this tournament.

Mixed fortunes for Defence basketball

THE SA (U-19) Championships also produced some exciting basketball with SADF being involved in two close games on the first day of the tournament.

In the game against Transvaal the two teams were all square at halftime. In the second half Defence took an early lead, but eventually Transvaal gained the upper hand to win 60-57. Pte P. Dittmar was top scorer with 21 points.

In the game against Natal Coasts, Defence allowed Coasts to gain the upper hand in the second half. With the score 57-57, Defence clinched the match 59-57 with one minute to go. Pte P. Dittmar was once again top scorer with 24 points.

- The results were: SADF 128 - N Tvl A 61; SADF 57 - Tvl A 60; SADF 59 - Coasts 57; SADF 71 - WP 87; SADF 70 - Natal A 106; SADF 107 - N Tvl Colts 29.

The SADF team ended 4th in the open section, playing for the Frank Armstrong Trophy which was presented for the first time at this tournament and donated by W01 F.C. Armstrong, Chairman of the SADF Head Committee for Basket Ball.

AT the SA Jnr (U-21) Championships, a high standard of basketball was attained with a Springbok team being chosen at the end of the tournament.

Defence played their first game against Transvaal. Transvaal led for most of the game, but Defence came back at 58-58 with four minutes to go. This remained so tight up to the last minute with Transvaal scoring the winning points to make the final score 67-66. The top scorers were Pte P. Dittmar with

26 points and L Cpl G. Erasmus with 18 points.

This was the only game that Defence lost. They won the other games by large margins.

Sweet revenge for Defence came in the final game on Sunday against Natal Midlands. In the corresponding game last year, Natal Midlands beat Defence 98-91 after two periods of extra time, but this year Defence convincingly beat them 80-62 with Pte P. Dittmar top scorer with 30 points.

IN the women's section, the SADF entered a U/21 side for the first time and although inexperienced, they improved with every game that was played. The results were: SADF 11 - Midlands 84; SADF 8 - Tvl 109; SADF 13 - N Tvl 65; SADF 13 - WP 54; SADF 10 - EP 126.

IN the men's section, there was a triple tie for first place between SADF, Transvaal and Natal. After a "slide rule" finish Transvaal was placed first as a result of beating both SADF and Natal. Natal, who beat SADF by two points on aggregate, finished second and SADF third. L Cpl G. Erasmus and Pte P. Dittmar were chosen for the Junior Springbok teams.

The next tournament in which SADF will participate is the National Championships to be held in Durban over the period 10-15 July 1989.


Kick-boxer Paul: 'I don't train to lose!'

ARM PAUL CAVE got a real kick in when he incorporated some boxing into his martial art, karate kai, and became a hit kick-boxer. Paul became the European Open Champion kick-boxer recently for the above 90 kg category in semi-contact, when he beat the previous champion in Milan. He is thankful to the SADF for allowing him to travel to Europe and to the Officer Commanding Southern Air Command, Brig Theo de Munnink, for arranging financial assistance.

For this National Serviceman, the Transport Clerk at Silvermine, dedication to whatever he does is the key to success. Says he: "I refuse to lose. I train to win. I won't dedicate four hours of training a day to lose." This motto has served him well.

At the age of five, Paul started training in the martial art of karate kai and achieved his first win at the age of six, in an interclub tournament. He became the SA Junior Champion in the same style for the under 60 kg category at age 13. He remembers those early days. During this fight he received a punch on the nose, breaking it. This complicated matters and after two rounds of fierce fighting the judges could not select the better



fighter. Paul's breakthrough came in the third round and he was announced the SA Junior Champion.

The age of 16 saw him as SA Senior Champion and member of a Springbok team touring Europe, but carrying top honours in South Africa for karate, didn't slow his urge for perfection.

In 1986 he joined the ranks of the kick-boxers, participating in both classes – that is

semi-contact and full contact. Paul says kick-boxing is a more western way of doing karate. Where karate is a pure martial art, kick-boxing is a real sport. It holds a more realistic challenge and is generally more exciting.


According to him, his mental attitude was always right. "As far as fighting is concerned, I have a natural ability for it. It isn't as if I have to work for years and years, it just happens."

Airman Cave was chosen to be a member of the very first Springbok kick-boxing team, who competed internationally, in the Olympic Stadium in Munich, West Germany, in 1986. He was then beaten by the current world champion in his division, Nasty Anderson from the USA. Nasty is a professional and Paul is looking forward to level scores with him in the 89 World Championships, to be held in October in Dallas, Texas.


To be successful in kick-boxing one has to be super fit, have exceptionally good hand-foot co-ordination, quick reactions and be very alert, says Paul: "While I am fighting everything seems to slow down. I observe my surroundings very much like a movie played at slow speed, it's weird to explain."

FROM the very beginning, sport has played a prominent role in the history of 21 Battalion. What they have accomplished over the past fifteen years cannot be measured in achievements but rather in comradeship and teamwork which forms the nucleus of the unit since 1974, when the unit was established, up to now.

During November 1973, the then Chief of the SA Defence Force, Gen Magnus Malan, decided to form a training centre for Black soldiers. In January 1974, ten Permanent Force members under the command of Maj M.W. Pretorius, now Brigadier, were sent to the Bantu Training Centre at Baviaanspoort for an orientation period.

In March 1974, sixteen recruits were trained as security guards and at the second intake in August, thirty recruits were enrolled and trained as regimental instructors.

In April 1975, authority was given for Black soldiers to join the Permanent Force and on December 1975 the Bantu Training College was moved from Baviaanspoort to Lenz. The unit was named 21 Battalion as it was formed on the 21st anniversary of the SA Infantry Corps.

The unit 21 Bn is an old Second World War base that was an ammunitions depot. When 21 Bn started, the sports facilities were those used by the Second World War troops, but with hard work and determination the sports facilities were improved to the present day facility.


The swimming pool, which was built in 1979, is used by all the members of the unit. WO2 Lefty Phashe and WO2 S. Mohafa are qualified swimmers and train the troops for swimming competitions which are arranged at inter-unit level.

The Officer Commanding 21 Bn, Cmdt H. Smith, was responsible for the laying out of a rugby field. Rugby is not very popular with the Black troops, but with professional coaching by National Servicemen a strong rugby team is gradually being moulded.

Blacks are not professional snottists, but since the erection of the Pep van Zyl miniature shooting range the unit has a strong shooting club. The troops participate in shooting competitions at inter-unit level.

21 Battalion has three soccer grounds because the majority of the Black troops are interested in soccer. One ground is used by the A team, the second for coaching and the third is kept for league games.

There are two volleyball grounds available – one for coaching and the other for matches.

Because 21 Bn is a training and operational unit, a golf course is not available at present. Golf players have access to a privately owned golf course.

In 1988 the Gymnasium was erected and it is fully equipped for gymnasts. There are four tennis courts as well as a practice wall. Tennis is slowly becoming a popular sport among the Black troops.

A ground has been developed for soft ball.

An athletics course and cricket grounds are still under construction.

Potted sports is another new venture presently being coached.

THE unit's first sports officer was Maj W. Schutte, who with the help of various

sports representatives, got the ball rolling from 1975 to 1976. In those days champions of the future were being moulded.

Others are WO2 S. Makhunga who received colours of the unit and Wit Command colours for soccer. WO2 W.M. Mohafa, SADF boxing coach, is the unit's no 1 softball ace and attended a PTI course which he completed at the SA Army College in 1987.

WO2 L. Maluleke, ace volleyball player of the Unit, received unit colours in 1979, Wit Command colours and was selected to play for Tvl B division in 1980.

Cpl A. Makofane won gold medals in several cross-country marathons and qualified as a PTI.

Mr E. Motlabiya, strong in golf, also received unit colours and represented the Command several times.

In 1989, Capt L. Hoffman represented Wit Command, with the unit's tug of war team leading in the whole competition until the team received gold and silver medals.

Of all the sports played, soccer is the most popular. Cpl Simon Makhunga, now WO2, was the most popular player. He played a leading role, taking the team to second place in the third division of the NPSL soccer league in 1983. This achievement only goes to show that it takes years of dedication to accomplish anything of note in sport. Soccer has always been and still is a popular attraction and a great remover of barriers in the unit.

Notable leaders of the early years were WO2 J. Jansen, who started wrestling and

tug of war. S Sgt "Whitey" Croukamp (badminton) with some of his players obtaining provincial colours, and Lt P.H. Vosloo, now Commandant, who during his reign at 21 Bn, boasts of the first Black Springbok boxer, Cpl "Tiger" Tsagae, who also represented South Africa in Latin America.

Under the guidance of Lt Vosloo, another "black prince" was borne into boxing – Sergeant "Whirlwind" Alex Nyembezi, who was the first Black man at 21 Bn to get SAABA colours. Highlights of the unit were when Sgt Nyembezi and Cpl Tsagae represented 21 Bn and the SA Defence Force during the Taiwan Boxing Tour and in Latin America in 1981 and 1982. On this tour Sgt Nyembezi was chosen as the captain of the group.

Wrestling is one of the less popular sports among our Black soldiers, but in 1984, Lt H. du Toit obtained Springbok colours. The unit is slowly making a comeback in wrestling spheres with a greater involvement of the Black troops who are picking up the wrestling skills very fast.

THE highlight of the year is the sports days held against Baviaanspoort, 111 Bn, 113 Bn, 115 Bn, 116 Bn, 121 Bn and Soshanguve Training Unit (114 Bn) and all

the other Black Battalions in the SADF. Each time 21 Bn, as the mother unit of all the Black Battalions, has showed them the skills of sports and the art of esprit de corps.

National Servicemen who are detached to 21 Bn have performed a big task in sport and their efforts are beyond description. Through these people the Unit is boasting a beautifully equipped gymnasium. The hard work of Lt Wayne Kotze must be complimented. The Unit also has a professional body builder, Pte Shangase, who has brought SADF and Springbok colours to the Unit. The gym keeps members of 21 Bn busy after hours. According to Lt Kotze, who is the sports officer of 21 Bn, the facilities of the gym are open to all military members and their families as well as civilians and the rules are the same as for any other gymnastic club in the RSA.

Softball started with Lt J.P. Wessels, now Commandant. The team is currently managed by WO2 "Schoolboy" Mohafa and boasts professional status in the S Tvl Softball League from 1978 to 1980. Since then the team has been very successful and in 1988 was affiliated to the West Vaal Softball Association (WEVASA).

Volleyball, under WO2 "Lulu" Maluleke, has also reached professional status playing in the Transvaal B League. Sgt Smith and Cpl Segopolo were chosen to play for the Transvaal team, the Kangaroos, in 1981.

21 Battalion is an operational unit with five successful border tours, and currently has troops in Soweto, but despite this heavy burden the battalion is very difficult to beat in sport.

Recently the Unit's soccer team beat Wit Command Signal Unit 12-0.

The big force of the Unit is the tug of war team with "Bid Dada", Sgt Moji, at the back of the rope. Capt Hoffman, a successful sports administrator in tug of war, is also a member of the team. The team pulled 121 Bn out of the gates of the unit and then pulled them out of the Tvl SADF Championships, winning the competition with one team receiving gold medals and the second



team receiving silver certificates. Watch them!

Every Wednesday, potted sport is enjoyed in inter-company competitions. This ensures that all the members of 21 Bn participate in sport.

Golf under Mr Edward Motlabia, and cross country under Cpl Makofane, are doing well and the members of the Unit are participating in civilian leagues in these sports.

New facilities and projects forthcoming are cricket, swimming and rugby. Because of a lack of facilities these sports could not be played.

Tug of war and volleyball are not very popular in the Black schools. However, facilities have been made available at 21 Bn for these sports and military coaches are at the disposal of any schools wishing to participate in these sports. Arrangements can be made with the Unit Commander, Cmdt Hannes Smith, who is also a very keen sportsman and a coach for the Wit Command Rugby Club.

The esprit de corps among the sportsmen of 21 Bn has developed the Unit into a close-knit family and I am confident that sport at 21 Bn will grow until it ultimately becomes an integral part of every member's career in the SADF and will also be a boon to the community. One must always bear in mind that it is not the winning or losing that counts, but rather the camaraderie emerging from having participated.

BY die Direktoraat Liggaamlike Opleiding en Sport van die SA Weermag werk die sportoffisiere nie net met sport nie, maar is daar verskeie lede van die personeel wat hulself op die sportvelde onderskei.

Ansie Rogers het tydens die prestige byeenkomste die Springbok Susan Leon-Cachet oortuigend in die spiesgooi vir vroue geklop en daarmee getoon dat sy steeds een van die beste spiesgooi-atlete in die RSA is.
