Thank you for your letter of April 16th, which was as kind and nice as it could possibly be.

while, of course, we are all disappointed that you may not be with us at Rosswelt University, set our primary purpose was to get you to the United States, so that you could comence your decloral studies. That has been accordinated, and I an happy that you will be working at so eminent an institution as the University of Miscondin. Misconsin has, so I as sure you are suarce, a distinguished Department. ment of African Linguistics. I assume that your fallowship is in that Department.

I do have a suggestion showshy you could teach, if you choose to do so, at Received: University, while purenting your products user at Macanain. You may be aware that Made and the second of the second second second second second buses take anythere from twonty-five minutes to two hours to make the trip betheen these the cities. If you would care to do so, you could put adde one day in each week in order to teach two courses at Rossevelt University. In the norming, you would teach for 2<sup>th</sup> hours, and in the evening for another 2<sup>th</sup> hours. For each of these courses, Rossevelt University would put a stipend of \$1,000. Each course would be for one term, which runs from Soptember, 1970 through Janaary, 1971, and therefore we would put \$2,000 during that period. If you choose to contime the arrangement from Fobrairy, 1971, through June, 1971, you would reach to a madditional \$2,000, or a total, for the year, of \$4,000. This might help supplement your followship from Maccond. for the out small term.

I do not know with whom you have been corresponding, at Wisconsin, I assume it may be either Professor W. Groundow Long, Chairman of the Aritans Studies Program, of Professor Lyndon Harries, Chairman of African Languages and Literature. I have attempted to telephone both Dr. Young and Dr. Burtler, uthout success, and I a now taking the literature of sailing copies of this letter to each of them. I shall ask then two questions: (1) Does Macconsh have any objection to the arrangement which I have described aboved (2) If there is no objection, which weekay would seem to fit best into their plans for your Ph.
