Dear Sir,

Your application on behalf of the Orlando Unemployed Boys Club for the use of the Leake Hall for the mornings of week days and for the afternoons on the days the Hall is not being otherwise used, came before the Committee on Thursday last.

We know the Native Affairs Department will appreciate the fact that if the Club is granted the use of the Hall it will mean much extra wear and tear on the property so that the Committee will be obliged to charge a rent.

They feel that a fair rent for such continuous use would be £ 12 per annum. The usual charge for the use of the Hall for meetings when no money is to be made is 2/6 per morning or afternoon session.

We shall be glad if you will let us have an early reply if you are agreeable to this arrangement. The Club will be allowed to use the Hall until the Committee meets again on April 23rd.
