The recently constituted Christian Council of South Africa has decided to form a medical missions committee under the aegis of the Council, and has requested me to act as Convener to form the Committee. I am not a member of the medical profession, but my work brings me into close touch with medical missions throughout Southern Africa and also into direct contact with Non-European medical and health needs. I shall be glad if by serving as Convener of this Committee I can assist medical missionary effort and the Non-European peoples.

I shall be grateful if you will serve as a member of the Committee. Most of the work will have to be done by post, by means of memoranda prepared by myself or by individual members of the Committee and circulated for the observations of other members. But it is hoped that it will be possible for members to meet together once in a while to consider important questions of medical missionary policy. The Christian Council will meet in Johannesburg or Pretoria in January next, and I hope that it will be possible for members of the Committee to meet in conference a day or two before.

The Executive Committee of the Christian Council has asked me to outline the terms of reference of the Committee, and I have ventured to draft these for the prior consideration of members of the Committee. I shall be grateful if you will let me have your views on them before OCTOBER 10th, 1936, as the Executive Committee of the Christian Council meets on October 14th. As you will note, the proposed terms cover a wide range, but it is not intended that all the items shall be dealt with at once. They serve to indicate, rather, the matters which the Committee may be expected at any time to consider and pronounce upon, or matters on which the Council may from time to time ask the Committee to advise it.

Dear Mr. Jones,

Thank you for your letter of the 23rd instant, and for the prompt action you have taken in calling a conference of those interested. The 27th really suits me in some ways better than the 13th. I have a few suggestions to make for your consideration.

**BOCHEM HOSPITAL.** I wrote to the superintendent of this hospital inviting him to the meeting I originally called for the 27th, but I have had no reply. I believe the Administration regards this as a mission hospital, but I am not sure what its position is really. Might it not be worth while making another attempt to get them to come in with us?

**SWISS MISSION.** I notice that you have invited three bishops to represent the Church of the Province. That being so, do you not think that it would be wise to invite the Superintendent of the Swiss Mission or his deputy in addition to Dr. Rosset? I think that the Superintendent is Rev. Junod. Elim Hospital is I think the largest mission hospital in the Transvaal, and gets the largest grants from the Province, and is therefore the ~~one~~ most likely to be affected by any change. I think we should see that they are strongly represented, and by those who have the final say in regard to their mission. I don't think that Dr. Rosset alone could commit himself to the acceptance of any proposals we make.

**OTHER MISSIONS.** I have heard rumours from time to time that the Methodist Church and the Dutch Reformed Church are thinking of starting hospitals in the Transvaal. Is it possible to find out whether their plans are sufficiently definite to make it worth while their taking part in this conference? I do not think that the Berlin Mission has any hospitals or is thinking of starting one. Bochem Hospital is not under them. At the same time I should like them to support the application of ~~this~~ <sup>my</sup> hospital for increased help from the Province.

**MEDICAL REPRESENTATIVES.** It appears as if Dr. Rosset and I are the only doctors invited to the conference, although I am not sure about two of those in the list you have sent me. In any case I think that the Medical Superintendent of the Jane Furse Hospital should be invited, especially as I had already approached him to come to the meeting I had called, and he had accepted the invitation.

**MATERIAL for CONFERENCE.** Will it be possible to obtain the popula<sup>n</sup>



tion figures from the recent census for each district in which there is a mission hospital at work? I can get the figures for the Sibasa and Louis Trichardt areas.

Can you send out a questionnaire before the conference to each of the hospitals concerned, so that we may have some definite figures to work upon? I think we at least need to know the following facts for each hospital:-

Amount of present grant.

What this grant represents on a patient-day basis.

The average cost per patient per day in each hospital.

I think that it will be very important that we should give the Commission a definite idea of what our proposals are likely to cost. Dr Rosset and I both feel that the grants should be related to the actual work done, that is they should be on a per patient per day basis. It may be useful to have a definite suggestion before us, and I should like to propose that we ask for the grants to be on the basis of 2/6 per patient per day, and ask each hospital to prepare a statement showing what this would amount to annually. In cases where Europeans are admitted it may be difficult to estimate a grant on this basis, and in such cases it might be well to have an estimate on the basis of 10/- per European pauper patient per day, and 2/6 per native patient.

Personally of course I think we should take this opportunity to urge that the Province should assume full responsibility for European hospitalisation and relieve mission hospitals of this altogether. At the very least if mission hospitals are to continue to undertake this work they should be subsidised on the same basis as the Provincial hospitals.



Dear Mr. Rheinallt Jones,

I have read with appreciation the proposed terms of reference which you have forwarded to me. I am highly honoured to serve as a member of this committee, and trust that much may be accomplished by it for the natives of South Africa.

The seven headings seem quite exhaustive. May I suggest, that one way of getting the committee into action, would be the appointing of different members of the committee to prepare articles on their special subjects. These articles to be circularized among other members of the committee, possibly extracts to made from them for the Press, possibly a whole article could be reproduced in the "S.A. Outlook". When each subject has been thus presented to other members of the committee, we would undertake to comment on, criticize and amend the ideas put forth. This method of dealing with the work to be done, would do away with the need for a great many meetings, and would get everyone interested in the work.
