To the Editor *Uitenhage Times*.

SIR,—I beg through the medium of your paper to announce that I am re-visiting the Cape Province and I am now at Uitenhage and district inviting donations and subscriptions on behalf of the Waterfall Farm Manual Training School, Salisbury, Rhodesia, which as its name indicates devotes itself to the manual training of Natives and other non-Europeans. An attempt is now being made to build a Girls' Hostel at this institution.

With the large and legitimate claims of the Native people within the Union, it may seem unreasonable for me to be appealing for Native work in Rhodesia. But it is for the uplift of the Native people of Africa in the larger sense that I am working; and I may candidly state that this appeal brings an enlarged opportunity to those who have power to help in this wider field of missionary enterprise and western civilisation.

I am indeed grateful to Magisterial Heads and other officials who have not in any way put an embargo and unnecessary embarrassment in my campaign but have certified to my "bona fides."

Needless for me to emphasise the fact how expensive is an agricultural institution but it has a great reward when Natives will be able to be contributors and not only consumers.

In conclusion I wish to quote the words of the late Booker T. Washington, Turkegee Institute, Alabama, United States of America: "In all things that are purely social we may be as separate as the fingers yet one as the hand in all things essential to mutual progress."
